On last Friday the February social meeting of the Women's Club was held at the home of Mrs. Willis Adams, the hostess, being Mrs. Adams, Miss Adams, and Mrs. Ab Sparks. The following program was presented: Introductory remarks by the president, Miss McKrack, reading by Miss Adams, music by Miss McGraw and Mrs. Miller, and speeches by Rev. The court house was filled to its capacity Wednesday evening to hear the lectures of Dr. Lock, representing the Rockefeller Institute and Dr. Mark, the State Sanitary Engineer. Dr. Lock spoke at length on the different diseases and the prevention of same, but principally the Hookworm, which has been found so prevalent in Kentucky. Dr. Lock has conducted campaigns in a number of equities in Kentucky and is at present conducting a six weeks campaign at this time. It is marvelous to know how many people are affected with this little parasite, which is gradually saprophytic their life and they do not realize what or where the trouble is until it is evidently too late. Through the generosity of our Fiscal Court, which made a small appropriation for that purpose, Dr. Lock will come to this county sometime during the summer of 1913 and conduct a 1909 campaign in every community throughout the county where needed. Dr. Mark talked along the line of sanitation and paved the way for what we believe will be a better cleaner healthier and more sanitary county as a whole. One thing that Dr. Mark said in particular was the sanitary habits of restaurants for all weights, markets and every person of common ordinary intelligence realize that the more densely populated a town, the more important is this question. He dwelt at length of the importance of our schools, and before another year the subject will be thoroughly discussed in every rural district. This movement is for the welfare of the people and their co-operation is absolutely necessary to get the best results. Mt. Vernon is the first town of its size in this and other States that Dr. Mark has visited and we are glad to have him here.

one end of the sack and I'll carry it too. My children are no better than I am and I have made out with these roads and so can they. But listen your children are not going to make out with such roads. They will have goods roads and if you live long enough you may get to travel over them. Fields and see any article on good roads. I know people are still becoming interested more and Rockcastle will in the near future not be ashamed to have strangers pass over her roads. I am spending the winter in Florida where they have fine roads. One here can move more than do the work of two on bad roads. The climate here is fine and the people are lovely. The country level, people have a good easy time in general. Plenty of oranges cheap, winter gardens all green with mustard, lettuce, onions, beets, turnips, cabbages and kale. Farmers are plowing and getting ready to plant vegetables for early marketing. We have no mud at any time, all sand. You would say and lots of negroes. Yes there are a good many but are the real ones. No mulattoes and they certainly do know their place. They are like I use to know them when I was a child. A servant in a servants place. They are a real necessity here. They are honest. People tell me I need never lock a door at night or on leaving home. They all work and earn their living and they know they must do the right thing, otherwise they know the consequences. Farmers are plowing and especially the people I have met. We live within two miles of the largest orange grove in the world. The lumber and turpentine businesses are good here and truck gardening is carried on extensively all over the state. Living is pretty high. Board from 18 to 25 and 30 dollars per month. Strangers to say no one likes to 'keep board'. Every thing is higher here than at home. Any one can do their own work and live as cheap here as anywhere. Very truly, S. M.
