High Schools Aid In Developing Kentucky Fruit Growing. 60,000 TREES IN ONE PLOT.



60,000 NEWLY GRAFTED APPLE TREES. With four standard varieties of apple trees free of charge and has also agreed to advise and train the members of the association in the care and general cultivation of the young trees and orchards during the next five years.

When the newly grafted young trees were received by the association in Rowan county they were divided among the members, to be placed in home gardens for the summer's growth. In Harlan county it was decided best to plant and cultivate the 20,000 young trees in one nursery plot. While plans were being discussed as to the best place and manner of planting for this nursery work the agricultural class of the county high school offered to take the trees and carry them through the summer until transplanting time next autumn.

**BRIERLY PATHS AND ROADS.**  
The following extracts are taken from an excellent article by A. Fletcher, published in Southern Good Roads of Lexington, N. C., the best road journal in the South. The Grayson county spoken of by the writer is beyond Bristol in Virginia adjacent to North Carolina but is not in the territory of good roads inaugurated by Western North Carolina and South Western Virginia. Twelve counties in the latter portion of North Carolina has voted bonds in addition to large amounts already used, to the amount of \$1,440,000 for the construction of new roads. South West Virginia counties have voted one and a half million.

"I went back to the mountains last summer, back to the land where I was born and where my people before me, many generations of them had lived and died. I had been away many years. Newspapers and magazine work does not permit one to wander so far afield and my long unbroken sojourn in the lowlands had not been of my own choosing. My heart had been there; permy a time, but my work did not permit a vacation. Rarely was I there on a day morning that I did not hear in the gray staccato bark of the gray squirrel on the rugged sides of the 'Paddy' or over on the 'Nigger' to the east of my old home, and rarely a drowsy summer evening when I did not dream, just a few seconds, of the soul-stirring leap of the speckled r-out as he cleared the water and took my grasshopper along the banks of Beaver Creek or Little Buffalo, under the lengthening shadows of the grand old mountains of Ashe. Last summer in the middle of August, I broke away from my work and went back home.

(Here the writer tells of a county prominent family who had moved away on account of the bad roads) and that some, which had been one of the best in all the land, was nothing more than a memory in the community and the old house was rotting down. I other bright young men who had

walked around it and through it and one in declining, unkept orchard thinking on these things and I don't believe I ever spent a more miserable half hour. It was tragedy—that's all.

That was not the only empty house. I noted them all along the road. Between Roaring Gap and Sparta, in Alleghany county, I am sure there are, at the very lowest calculation, twenty vacant houses along the roadsides. Ten years ago every one of these houses, the most of them humble to be sure, but homes, or at least, that were occupied. Between Sparta and Jefferson, or between Sparta and Grant, Virginia, there are probably fifty or more. These are to be seen right along the 'big road' and no attempt is made to estimate the number of vacant houses that dot the covers and valleys of these good counties.

Ashe county, instead of gaining in population in the last decade, lost 507. Alleghany lost 14. Grayson county shows a gain but all of the gain is in three or four small towns which have grown up with the coming of railroads and were not in existence when the census of 1900 was taken. Every county township shows a decrease in population.

Bad roads, alone, is responsible. I met a boyhood friend and school mate, a young man, who, like me, was making a visit to home folks. He said he came back home to practice after he finished college and put in four years at the hardest work of his life, driving through mud, over stony roads, up well high impassable grades killing his horses and many times endangering his life. He woke to the fact that he was killing himself and doing his wife and babies an injustice by remaining there and he moved to a county prominent family who had moved away on account of the bad roads) and that some, which had been one of the best in all the land, was nothing more than a memory in the community and the old house was rotting down. I other bright young men who had

left the mountains because of bad roads, physicians, lawyers, farmers, dentists, preachers, teachers and business men. Everyone of them is making good.

The people of the mountains do not fret and chafe under the weary load imposed by bad roads, as do the people of the lowlands, and this very fact discourages the friends of the good roads cause. They accept their lot with a sort of fatalism and trudge through the mud stoically, resignedly. Occasionally, a high-spirited, impatient youngster, who has been away to college and got a taste of the benefits that come from good roads, or who has caught a vision of something better, breaks away, as the young physician did, from the ways of his father and leads for better things, but the great majority of the young men of these mountain counties are following in the ways their fathers trod, bearing the same galling load that they bore and it has never even occurred to them that such a thing as a '365 day road' is possible.

When the future of this mountain section is to be none can tell. All around Grayson county there is progress. Wise, Lee, Smyth, Washington, Wythe and Tazewell counties are building macadam roads and perhaps Grayson will yet get in line. So far as I was able to observe, however, there was not the slightest indication of interest in road improvement. Ashe and Alleghany counties have not even good examples in counties surrounding to encourage them and it is going to be even slower there. In the South Western part of North Carolina, things are humming. Bond issues are being voted almost daily and great things are being done. In time this will reach Ashe and Alleghany but it may be a long time.

But—my mountain trip was not all vacant houses and bad roads. Far from it. There was enough brightness every day to overshadow the sadness and I put behind me resolutely the

evils of unprogressiveness that I saw. Inancing against them the goodness of the people of the mountains, their honesty, their fearlessness, their high standards and their unflinching clarity, and my faith in their ability to work out their own salvation, along lines best suited to them. I flashed out triumphant over time. I know that they will solve the road problem in time, just as they solved the liquor question and destroyed the cross roads grogshop and distillery years before the people of the lowlands took action against them. May their awakening be, not long delayed.

#### COPY OF LETTER

Which Senator Joe F. Bosworth Addressed the Louisville Commercial Club, on the Boone Way.

My dear Sir—  
Being a member of the Louisville Commercial Club and very much interested in the welfare of Louisville and its best interests my reason for writing this letter.

I was in Cincinnati on last Thursday and met a member of the Commercial Club and in conversation with him found out in some way that the Commercial organizations along the proposed Boones Highway had for some reason become miffed at the Louisville Commercial Club and the Louisville papers.

For the reason that they were not taking active interest in helping to secure legislation from Congress to guadamize the Old Wilderness Road or Boone's Highway and that the Cincinnati people were having meetings endorsing the movement and have actually already secured the support of the Ohio Congressmen to back the movement of this highway and in other words, they seem to have gotten it from somewhere in Louisville was against the building of this highway and was using all of their energies in other directions, and that Cincinnati saw a good opportunity to make a point in its favor and are actually making the best of it, and I believe are creating a feeling in this part of the state that will be very lasting in Cincinnati's favor, if Louisville don't get busy.

The Cincinnati people actually told me that Shelby, your Louisville Congressman would be against it and all their congressmen were in favor of it already. I believe it would be well for

your organization to take this matter up with the various commercial organizations along the proposed Boones Highway and set yourselves right in this matter.

JUDGE L. W. BETHURUM,  
FOR CONGRESS.

From Barboursville, the home of Caleb Powers, comes the information that not only will Powers shortly announce that he will not be a candidate next year for the Republican nomination to succeed himself in Congress, but that he will endeavor to throw all of his strength to Charles Finley. It is said an agreement was entered between Powers and Finley before the last congressional race that the former would step aside in favor of the latter provided Finley would not oppose him in that election, and that he has been called on by Finley and his friends to keep that agreement. Powers, it is said, demurred at first but the demands were of such a nature he realized he could not win the nomination with opposition from the Finley faction and was forced to submit. No matter which of the two makes the race for the nomination or if both of them decide to enter the primary he or they will have opposition in the person of Judge Leonard W. Bethurum, County Judge of Rockcastle county and a member of the Republican State Central Committee. Judge Bethurum has been a prospective aspirant for the nomination for several months but it was learned yesterday from a close personal and political friend that he will shortly make a formal announcement. Judge Bethurum is regarded as one of the strongest Republicans in the Eleventh district, and in addition to his own strength can command the strength of his brother Judge B. J. Bethurum, presiding over the judicial circuit composed of Pulaski, Rockcastle, Clinton and Wayne counties. This combination, the politicians say, will be hard to beat.—Louisville Times.
