FLOODS DO VAST DAMAGE

IN THE RIO GRANDE VALLEY—LOUISIANA TOWN IN DANGER.

A Number of Towns Are Wholly or Partly Inundated—Cotton Is Ruined.

Western Newspaper Union News Service. Austin, Texas—Reports received from various points along the Gulf coast, from the Sabine river to the east to the Rio Grande on the south, more than 700 miles tell of destruction wrought by unprecedented floods. Rain is still falling and rivers and smaller streams are higher than ever known before by unrecanted floods.

Among the places that have suffered losses from flood are Orange, Brownsville and a number of smaller places. The inundation in the lower valley of the Rio Grande has caused heavy loss to sugar cane planters and others. For more than 100 miles along that river on both the Mexican and American sides the water has run out over a wide scope of valley, and washing away many houses, part of the population is being destroyed the growing crops. The rice tract of Upper Gulf coast territory is badly damaged by overflow and extensive rain.

It has been raining all day off and on at Central Texas since the cold rain, Illinois and other rivers are rapidly reaching high-water mark along their respective courses. The unbroken cotton is being ruined.

VOLUNTARY PRISONER REBUKED

Aburra, N. Y.—Thomas Mott O'Brien, who as chairman of the state committee on prison reform in the Auburn prison under the alias "Tom Brown" to study the prison system at that point, was disciplined on the grounds and will be discharged before he leaves the institution. He looked back on his life as a convict as a disgrace and later, while marching with his company, the broom-sweep gang, got out of the prison and ran a race circle tour in the prison yard, and again was rebuked.

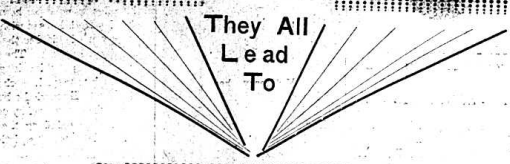
