JUDGE SPIEGEL ELECTED MAYOR OF CINCINNATI

Cincinnati, O.—Judge Frederick S. Spiegel, Republican candidate for Mayor of Cincinnati, was elected by a plurality in excess of 3,000. Every candidate on the city ticket won with the leader, and the Republicans also have an overwhelming majority in the next City Council, having elected the six candidates at large and wrested several wards from the Democrats. It is likely that the latter will not have a membership of more than seven or eight.

Mayor Hight and his associates on the Democratic ticket were simply crushed by their defeat. This could not be believed that such a result was possible. Early returns at Democratic headquarters by telephone showed losses everywhere over last year in the vote between Hopkins and Eyrich for county treasurer, when the latter carried the city by 1,376.

BUSCHMEYER ELECTED

Democratic Maintains Hold on the Legislature in Kentucky Election

Louisville, Ky.—Wood F. Axton, Progressive candidate for Mayor, announced that he will contest the election of Dr. John H. Buschmeyer as Mayor of Louisville.

This announcement came at the end of one of the most strenuous days of politics ever seen in the commonwealth's metropolis. Mr. Axton in his statement bases his intention to contest the election on the ground of fraud.

Dr. Buschmeyer and the entire Democratic ticket in Louisville and Jefferson county won the day. With 45 precincts still missing, Buschmeyer leads 3,000. Bull Moose adherents are hopeful that precincts yet to be heard from will reduce his majority materially.

Complete returns from 163 precincts give Buschmeyer a majority of 2,463. George F. Wood, Republican has received only a few hundred votes.

Returns from the county race are not complete, but the indications are the Democratic ticket will be successful in the county as well as city race. Sam Green, Democratic candidate for County Judge, is running far ahead of the ticket.

The Democrats of Kentucky have maintained their hold on the State Legislature, the results of the election returning both Representatives and Senators to their positions at Frankfort with scarcely an exception.

BELL FOR INDIANAPOLIS

Indianapolis, Ind.—Joseph F. Bell, Democrat, was elected Mayor of Indianapolis by a plurality of 5,000.

Charles A. Bookwater, Republican, on the face of the complete official returns, received a total of 14,237 votes, 121 more than were cast for Dr. William H. Johnson, Pro.

The spike Democratic ticket was defeated by an overwhelming majority at that received by Bell.

The Republicans, in spite of the difficulties they encountered, conducted a fairly good organization and did better than last year, when Taft, for President, and Durkin, for Governor, ran a poor third.

The vote was heavier than anticipated, but the result was not unexpected. National Commitment Targert directed the Democratic organization and was much with friends throughout the day. He seemed to be confident from the start that Bell would win by a plurality of 5,000. Bookwater used every effort to get out a winning vote, but collapsed in the last few hours of the election that Bell had won by a plurality of at least 5,000.

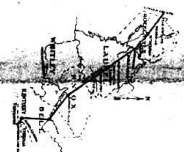


JUDGE-ELECT, G. M. BALLARD.

ROAD OF ROMANCE

To Connect North and South Over Trail Blazed by Daniel Boone in 1775.

After the treaty of peace between the United States and Great Britain in 1782, which put a temporary end to Indian warfare, Boone who had accumulated about \$20,000 started to Virginia with all his possessions. He was robbed of all on route. He then returned again over the same old trail and attempted to recover his forgeries in land claims. However his defective knowledge of surveying, combined with the absurd specifications of the Virginia land laws then in force in Kentucky, caused him to lose every acre to which he laid claim.

Boone never again attempted to follow the old trail eastward into Virginia, and finding Kentucky becoming rather more civ-

ilized than conformed with his manner of life, he went farther west. On the banks of the Missouri river, he established a settlement consisting entirely of his immediate family and his descendants. Here was found in 1819, a broken old man, but still haunting in the woods and roaming his own "boon of buck" over the campfire. He died September 26, 1820. Upon learning of the death of the aged pioneer, Governor Morehead of Kentucky, proclaimed twenty days public mourning. Boone's body was later removed to Frankfort where it remains to the present time.

The development of the trail which yet bears his name, was made in 1796, after the Kentucky legislature in 1795 had authorized the opening of the route, then known as "Boone's trace," as a public wagon road, thirty feet wide. It was in December, 1795 that the authority was given by the legislature for this development, the road to be opened from Crab Orchard Springs to Cumberland Gap. Upon proposals being advanced for, the old pioneer, realizing the peculiar fitness of the thing which had marked his early life in Kentucky, addressed to Governor Shelby the following characteristic letter which was found many years ago among the papers of that military governor. The copy below is accurate, even to the spelling, capitalization and punctuation of the original. The handwriting is rather graceful, showing some ease and freedom in handling the pen, although it is evident that Boone more readily made his mark with his rifle than

as a speller. february the 11th 1795.

Sir— after my Best lōspts to our Excellency and family I wish to inform you that I have some intention of undertaking this New Road that is to be Cut through the Wilderness and I think MySelf intitled to the offer of the Business as I first Marked out that Road in 1775 and Never Re'd anything for my trouble and Seppose I am No Statesman I am a Woodsman and think Myself as Capable of Marking and Cu'ing that Road as any other man Sir if you think with Me I would thank you to write me a line by the post the first opportunity and he will Lodge at Mr John Miller sou' hinson fork as I wish to know Where and When it is to be Let. So that I may attend at the time. I am Dear Sir your very omble servant,

(Signed) DANIEL BOONE. To his Excellency governor Shelby.

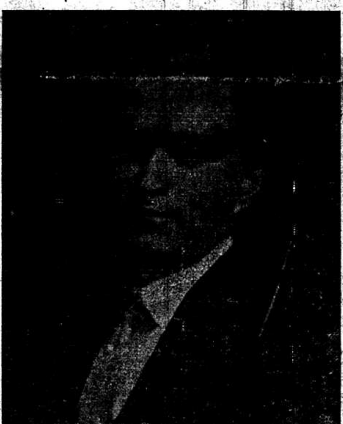
Boone did not secure this contract because he did not press his proposal. It appears that his restlessness led him westward to the Missouri, following always the receding wilderness as civilization advanced, before the time arrived for the actual construction of the road to be begun.

The road authorized from Crab Orchard Springs to Cumberland Gap by the legislature of 1795 was already the heaviest travelled route in us' between the east and the west, but was not improved. On March 1, 1797, the legislature appointed Joseph Crockett as a commissioner to collect tolls

along the route, which had been worked and materially improved during the preceding year, and to keep the road in proper condition for travel. The road known then as "Boone's trace," had really lost its identity with Daniel Boone and became known simply as "The Wilderness Road." It remained in use by the steady tide of westward emigration until after the Mexican War, when the travel over the National Road (from Maryland through Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois, took most of the travel away from the more mountainous territory. During the Civil War, however, the road was used constantly for military purposes by the armies of both the Union and the Confederacy until after Cumberland Gap was abandoned by both sides as a point of contention.

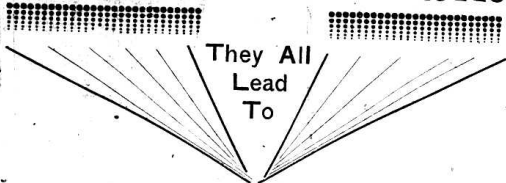
Shortly after the war portions of the road were entirely abandoned and have been practically not traveled at all, until prospectors and surveyors recently invaded its silent ways in locating the new motor pipe.

The promotion of the new motor highway to connect the north and the south through the Kentucky mountains has been due largely to the Commercial Club of Mt. Vernon, Ky., of which U. G. Baker, its president, Chas. Davis, vice president, and James Maret, secretary, Subsidiary to the Commercial Club, Mt. Vernon has a boosters' organization, known as the "Boone Way Booster Band," of which W. H. Fish is president, F. L. Durban, vice president, James Maret secretary and treasurer, and S.

calling for an appropriation to aid in the reconstruction of the old trail. Mr. Voshell's survey indicated that the route would cover ninety-eight and one-half miles and that a paved highway could be constructed over the distance at a maximum cost of about one million dollars. It is believed, however, that owing to the splendid drainage facilities in the mountain country, a rocky road will be serviceable and satisfactory as a water-bound macadamized surface and could be constructed at a much smaller cost.

The State of Kentucky maintains a public roads commission, consisting of three engineers, who are available for work of this character and will be called upon to assist in making the final survey of the route.

If sufficient funds are raised during the winter it is anticipated that work will be definitely begun early in the spring, starting at Crab Orchard Springs where the Louisville turnpike ends, and proceeding to the southwest. The work is estimated to extend north to Crab Orchard Gap by midsummer.

'UNJUST TAX LAW IN KENTUCKY

How Unsatisfactory the Present Tax System Works in This State

Most Unequal System Ever Devised and Established the Plan Used in Kentucky

The present state constitution of Kentucky provides that "Taxes shall be uniform on all kinds of property, and on the surface this seems to be so fair the average thinker can find no fault with it. In practice, however, it has been found to be the most unequal tax system ever devised, and most of the progressive states have abolished the plan. Its inequalities and unfairness may be seen from the way it discriminates in certain classes of property and explains why Kentucky seems to have the little intangible wealth as compared with other states. For instance, cash in savings banks draws only three per cent interest, gilt-edged bonds pay four per cent, real estate notes six per cent, stock in some foreign corporations ten per cent, while the tax on all is the same for state purposes, but varies for county and city purposes according to the rate.

This where the income is only 3 per cent and the tax 2 1/2 per cent it leaves the owner out 1/2 per cent interest, and where the income is 10 per cent and the tax 2 1/2 per cent the interest is 7 1/2 per cent. In this manner...

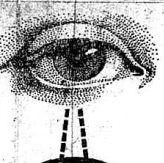
