Mt. Vernon's Needs In Sanitation

By Dr. A. T. LORRIL.

Through the columns of your paper as the best medium to reach the greatest number of our people can be reached, I beg to be permitted to send an important message to those who are most vitally concerned, and in plain simple language so that every one who reads may understand.

The town of Mt. Vernon is face to face with a problem of serious importance that must be recognized and solved for dire consequences will be the inevitable result.

It has been the boast of Mt. Vernon for generations that her water supply was ample and of the purest and best. Formerly this was true, but many changes have come to this place within the last decade. This valley thru which our whole system of water supply comes, has filled up with residences and manufacturing interests. With this rapid growth of the town, amounting to 12 percent between the census years of 1900 and 1910, comes the contaminating influence that invariably follows such conditions as we find confronting us now.

We have had twelve or more cases of typhoid fever with one death in our midst within a few months, something unprecedented in the history of the town. Yet this is only a mild hint of what is in store for us if we heed not the warning.

A glance at the topography and geology of the valley gives the key to the whole matter.

The town is built immediately over a cavernous limestone formation which rests on a solid compact magnesian limestone that forms what is called a water table. All the moisture from rainfall and the otherwise that comes into the ground and upper strata of limestone finds its way down to this water table and passes off thru springs or supplies our wells. These streams formerly so pure and refreshing, are now by seepage from salbers, privies, and other filthy products, sources, which come down thru crevices, concealed caves and the soil, carrying seeds of disease and death.

The remedy is clean up and keep clean and establish a water system that can be depended upon. This can be done by digging thru old lines as far as the town limits go and apply the statutes for such other regulations as may be required. All surface privies, cesspools, and improperly kept stables and garbage accumulations should be destroyed and replaced with other methods of dealing with the disposal of all refuse.

Septic tanks should be required in residences without exception in all places where closets are needed. They are cheaper and better than sewers costing only a small fraction of a case of typhoid fever.

A system of water works can be inaugurated here cheaper than at almost any other town in Kentucky; the water sterilized and supplied to your residence. For less money than you can possibly obtain thru a well of your own, when considering the elimination of dangerous typhoid germs. Until this can be done it is advisable that all water for domestic uses be boiled and that every citizen be "vaccinated" against typhoid fever. This is simple and easily done (if you know how) and renders you immune for a period of three to five years. The doctor should arm himself with a special needle made for the purpose and use the medicine three times covering a period of 21 days.

BRISTOL TO LEXINGTON

[Continued from last week.]

In order to accomplish this work, Kentucky only has to do as much as Virginia, and assuming that the Kentuckians will do their share of the work with the same progressive spirit that characterizes the Virginians, the highway will be an accomplished fact within the next two or three years.

Many persons laughed at the impracticability of constructing the Memphis-to-Bristol highway across Tennessee, but that road is now about three-fourths completed while the same spirit that prompted it, has aroused the Virginians to the task of constructing a similar highway from Bristol across the Old Dominion to the national capital. The same people are also constructing a highway from Bristol to Bluefield, W. Va., and the good road enthusiasts assert that this is the beginning of what is destined to be the Bristol-to-Pittsburg highway.

Leaving Bristol, the Bristol-Lexington highway runs nine miles thru Washington County, Virginia, which link has just been surveyed by the state highway engineer. The funds to build this link have been provided by bond issue and private subscriptions. Scott county adjoins Washington. This county has voted bonds for the building of its link of the new highway, and work is to be commenced in the spring. Lee county, which adjoins Scott on the west, has already constructed nearly fifty miles of the new highway. This means that the Virginians have provided for 75 of its 95 miles of the Bristol-Lexington highway, extending to Cumberland Gap.

From Cumberland Gap, Bell County, Kentucky, has constructed a macadam road to Middleboro, but from that town to Crab Orchard, Ky., a distance of 98 miles, the highway has not been provided for. At Crab Orchard the highway route connects with the Central Kentucky system of turnpikes, over which Lexington and other Kentucky towns may be reached.

The Bristol-to-Lexington Highway Association will take up with the county officials and with others in Kentucky the matter of pushing this undertaking to completion. It is believed, judging from information recently published concerning road legislation in Kentucky, that that state will soon be in a position to enter more actively into the work of road construction. The building of the link from Middleboro to Crab Orchard would be a notable triumph, since it would be the means of completing this highway direct from the southeast into Kentucky and Ohio.

It is doubtful if Kentucky could enter upon another single enterprise that would hold more significance to the people of that state than that of building the necessary links to make a complete highway. Lexington to Bristol, to other would Kentuckians, then be a direct route over the Blue Ridge to the South Atlantic states, but a familiar route eastward to Richmond, Norfolk and Washington for the Bristol-to-Washington highway will be completed before it will be possible to construct the links to complete the Bristol-to-Lexington road.

For a direct route between Kentucky and the Middle West States, the Bristol-to-Lexington Highway is the only one that is being built.
