MEMBER OF KENTUCKY PRESS ASSOCIATION



There are eighty nine passenger counties in Kentucky. There are sixty six counties without a mile of improved road. For the fiscal year 1913-1914 there was raised by local taxation the sum of \$2,000,000 for road purposes. Eighty per cent of this sum was spent for maintenance. But 20 per cent was expended in the construction of new roads. That is, Kentucky last year spent five fifths of \$2,000,000 for a mad tax.

These are facts to be considered in estimating the practical value to Kentucky if the State Aid Bill, passed by the House Friday, is passed by the Senate and approved by the Governor.

The State under this law, will raise for road purposes the sum of \$600,000 a year. This sum will be supplemented by a like sum from the Federal Government—the exact figures are \$588,000. If the amount raised by local taxation is decreased from \$2,000,000, say to \$1,200,000 a year, there will be available a combined sum of \$2,400,000 a year for the building of roads. With this sum Kentucky can in eleven years build a State-wide, county seat system stretching from State line to State line and making every county seat the center of a network of roads, 90 per cent of the county seats the centers of from four to six roads built by local taxation, with Federal and State aid, forming connecting links in the State wide system.

Local taxation would be reduced and yet the sixty six counties with no mile of improved road and the eighty nine pauper counties would fare as well as, or better, than their now more prosperous neighbors. Why? Because the State and Federal aid plan means the substitution of system, supervision and standardization for the present happy-go-lucky, devil-may-care lack of system which makes mad holes of six sevenths of Kentucky's roads for the winter months of each year. The General Assembly of 1913 created a State Bureau of Good Roads. Under the McDerby-Bosworth Bill no money will be paid out to any county until the roads built in that county conform to the standard of construction fixed by the Bureau of Roads nor until adequate provision has been made for their maintenance. The roads will then be part of a State system. They will not then be the plaything of the local politician and the occasion for an unending protest from their local victims. If the Commissioner of Roads fails to do his duty by each and every county, the Governor, who is the head of the State and responsible for his appointment, can be made, through the pressure of public opinion, to remove him. The State Aid Bill if it becomes law, means a State-wide system of good roads. It means a system of good roads; it means an equitable distribution of the money raised for good roads purposes; it means the substitution of organized effort for lack of organized effort; it means a definite and fixed responsibility for the expenditure of the public money for public needs. It could be no possibility be a worse system than the present. It may well be believed that for better systems can be devised—Louisville Times.

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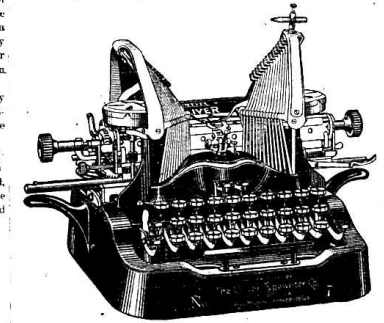
