GENERAL VILLA SAID TO BE A NEGRO

A story is going the rounds that Gen. Pancho Villa, the rebel leader in Mexico, is a Memphis negro. The story is that he joined the United States army at Memphis under the name of Goldsby. He was assigned to duty with the 10th Cavalry, where he became a sergeant. He served at Fort Riley, Kansas City, Fort Gibson, Oklahoma (then Indian Territory) and at Fort Chono, Texas, and which place he is said to have deserted while in the field scouting after hostile Indians. Fort Chono is only a short distance from the border and is a great distance from Chihuahua, Mexico. Goldsby's alleged desertion from the army might have been followed by his affiliation, with Mexicans in that section of the country, and due to his several years of experience in the army—part of it as an officer—it would have been easy for him to become a leader of a certain class of Mexicans and, later, of an army.

The newspapers of Texas and elsewhere have sought to verify the story, but have not been successful. Proof is wanting, but no denial of the allegations has been made.

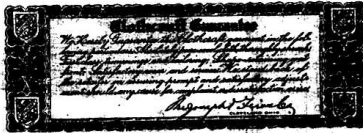
