the Post Office. Department for
the Post Office on more to compen-isate the railroads for carrying
the parcel post, The Bill is based
upon estimates of the Post Office
Department that next yerr the
parcel post will handle 900,00-1000
packages; yielding a revenue to

Department that most yerr the parcel post will handle 600,000,000 packages yielding a revenue to the Post Office of 800,000,000.

The Postmaster General in his annual report of December 1, 1913, states that in view of the prospective. Pipendificus growth of the parcel post, "the parlending around the parcel post," the parlending of course will become entitled to additional compensation for this extra service imposed upon them and the Department is orgaged in gathering all sustituted data necessary for assertationing a correct basis for fixing a just, fair and adequate compensation for the service rendered."

On February 17th, the Railroads' Committee was advised by the Post Office Department that it had made a recommendation to Congress when 'you account of

it had made a recommendation to Congress that "on account of the increased weight of mails" due to the parcel post, the Post-master General should be author

master General should be authorized to add to the Compensation of the railroads not shore than one-half of one per coat.

This recommendations, would have added only \$250,000 to the mail pay of all the railroads in the

mail pay of all the rail roads in the United States.

Congress took no action on the recommendation, et deenly considering the proposal too trivial for consideration, and preferring to await the recommendation of the Joint Congressional Committee now investigating the whole subject.


