What Is The Issue?

It is the purpose of this essay to inquire what is the real issue that divides the followers of Gov. J. B. McCreary and Ex Governor Beckham as well as between Senator Bosworth and Hon. C. S. Powers. There is somewhere a real vital issue that appeals to the minds of the intelligent Kentucky voter. If it is a matter of personal fitness for Senator or Congressman, it is legitimate to discuss it. If it depends on the attitude and previous activity of any candidate toward certain questions of national importance the voters should know it.

For example if the several candidates or any one of them had made a record, their friends are entitled to know, it before they cast their ballots.

It is not only legitimate, but right and proper to bring the candidates into "the limelight" and hand out the political record of each. I demand that the X-ray of decent social life be turned on, and in that light allow the citizens of the Commonwealth to make their choice.

There is a real issue in American politics, more than one, that vitally affects every citizen in the nation. Therefore let us as citizens, not as politicians, reason together, and find the best plan, and the best men, to carry our plan into effect.

All of the men who have announced their candidacy are presumably good citizens, with more or less of the political habit attached to their personal or political record.

Be this as it may, the conditions that confront us, the perils that environ us, nationally makes it the imperative duty, to put the best men, the most capable, men a woman too, God bless them, in the positions to plan for us and guide in our State and national assembly.

There will be, in fact there are now candidates representing three political divisions in the State, asking for recognition in the primary just ahead.

Mr. Creech, Mr. Bosworth and Mr. Powers all "honorable gentlemen" want to represent the eleventh district in the Congress of the United States.

Mr. Creech has the advantage or disadvantage of having no record, in the Senate, of Ky., or of Congress to recommend him. On the other hand Mr. Bosworth and Mr. Powers has the advantage of having had a long trial in active political life, and the added advantage of a record, as Congressman and State Senator, respectively. Let each of these gentlemen named make diligent use of the few weeks that remain to make their claims respectively, and their record as well. Square with the political demands in the Eleventh, and let each "tub stand

in its own bottom," and let each "tub stand for what he is judged by his political record and his social standing. If he is a temperance man, he knows the sentiment of citizens in the eleventh district.

To the many friends and patrons of the old Rockcastle Fair Ass'n. who have been visiting fairs at Brodhead the last 18 years I give you pleasure to announce at this time, that notwithstanding the old home of the Fair was taken away from us, it has only added a blessing to the enterprise, and to those who sought to take our grounds which they succeeded in doing, whether it was right or wrong we leave the public to judge but through this medium which we thought bite by to the end, it has only worked to our great advantage, so much so, that we have now a NEW Fair grounds second to none.

It has not been the object of the stockholders of the Fair Ass'n. at Brodhead to make it a money making proposition, we have not gone into this one with this end in view, however it has been the record that we have made in most instances a dividend to our stockholders. This was not due to our withholding anything that would help to make our fair a success, but altogether to the immense patronage we have always had, and we are pleased to admit the last three years in particular, our attendance has grown until we did not have half the room to accommodate our crowds. This year we can, we have under our fence 17 acres all to be used for Fair grounds only, seven acres of this area is a dense grove, shade is no object with us, for we have it to spare, not only around our grand stands and buildings adjoining, but around the stock barns sufficient for hitching purposes. To serve the stock brought to our Fair, we have well that will furnish enough water for Rockcastle county near the stock barns that is free to all. In addition to this we have another within our grove that will serve the people in unold quantities. These wells were dug during the drier weather and water was found in such quantities it was a difficult matter to get the filling in owing to the rapid flow from the stream, hence water will be no object as is always the case with most fairs and has been with us the past years.

We have arranged a sixty foot roadway in front of our entire grounds, consequently you may rest assured of not being crowded coming or going, and after you are done in the grounds, it will be no trouble for all parties to turn to the right, and a forty foot road will carry them entirely around

the grounds back to the place of entrance, which rule will be enforced the more abundantly doing so, meeting anyone while driving in our grounds. We have adorned our grounds with the most up-to-date grand stand ever seen outside of the city, being 112 feet wide and roof with a 50 foot overhang, in the rear of the stand, it is divided into six sections, reached by stair ways. Seats are elevated with walkways behind each seat; this will do away with all dirt being on the seats, the first row of seats being about five feet from the front, the remainder which is ten feet in width.

It is a pleasure indeed to furnish a state on Floral Hill, a model building to go by, and we can assure you to bring an article you may have for exhibit, we are prepared to take care of the same and that nicely and safely. Our entrants are being made so as to show the name of all exhibitors after having been judged, and their address. No one will be allowed to enter this hall until after the committee has opened the doors, and no one will be allowed to take in person any article from the display at any time as the committee in charge will obtain all articles from the hall for the exhibitor by the number given the exhibitor at the time of making the entry.

Our Hall will be arranged with plenty of light, another objection we have sought to remove. Dining Hall, a separate location of the same, dimension 30x50, will be handy as usual, and at the same popular prices of 25 cents for a good square deal. A full half mile track, 40 to 50 ft. wide, second to none, will bring the best stock in this section of the state. We propose to have nothing but clean and respectable shows on the grounds, something to entertain. A number of such concessions have already been booked. The committee is dealing with a variety of free attractions, and the public may expect to be entertained. We have never advertised any attractions at Brodhead we did not go, and you may rest assured that there is a nice surprise for you in store each day for free attractions, worth the amount of admission.

Notwithstanding all these things we have tried to prepare for the people's comfort at a large cost. We still hold the popular price of 25 cents at the gate and the first day will be free day for the ladies as usual. Our grounds will be completed by the time this letter goes to print, and we invite you to come and look for yourself and see if we have exaggerated in a single in-

stance. In fact, we prefer you to come, for we cannot describe you in words what we have for display. We now have everything ready and we waiting for the date which is August 12, 13 and 14. We invite all to come and see and see you all the courtesies that it is in our power to give.
