The first Saturday in August in this year a general Primary Election will be held in every township in this State.

throughout the whole State, and in which Primary Election all parties will nominate candidates for their respective parties to be voted for at the following: November Election. This will be the most important Primary Election held in this State since the new primary law was enacted. Candidates will be nominated in said Primary Election for the high offices of United States Senator, Judge of the Court of Appeals and Member of Congress from this District.

It is highly important that this, as well as all other elections, should be free from the corrupt influences of money and bribery of every sort, and I, therefore, call upon the members of all parties of this District to see to it that the coming Primary is conducted along proper lines and in strict conformity to the law.

For a number of years past there has been the practice of many politicians of all parties, I am told to indulge in the use of money and whiskey in elections in order to induce men to vote for their choice among the candidates in the Primary, or for their party at the general election. In other words, it is reported that they purchased votes on election day to control the election. Many good men in the past, no doubt, have engaged in this business without stopping to consider the morality of the act, or without realizing they were violating the law of the land.

I am issuing this statement, and having it published throughout this District in advance of the Election, in an effort, if possible, to stop this unlawful traffic in human votes, and to warn those who expect to do this in the coming election, and all subsequent elections that if they resort to bribery, or the use of Money or Whiskey, in an effort to influence voters in the Election they will be considered and to this end, I shall in the future call the Grand Jurors to thoroughly investigate violations of the election laws and indict those who show to be guilty.
