FINE FOR FARMERS. Helm Works Out Plan to Help Them Sell Their Produce By Mail.

News comes from Washington that Congressman Harvey Helm has induced the Postmaster General to send instructions to the Postmasters at Cincinnati and Louisville to install in these cities the system of bringing producers and consumers together that has been inaugurated by the Postmaster of the City of Washington.

The experiment of bringing farmers and city consumers together thru the medium of the parcel post was initiated at the Capitol City by Postmaster Peager, under instructions from Postmaster-General Burleson and has proved a success; the department states.

Under the operation of this plan the Postmasters at Cincinnati and Louisville will invite farmers in all of the contiguous territory to send to the Postmasters their names and the produce they are willing to ship to the city consumers thru the parcel post. These lists will be posted in printed form in the postoffice, and city housewives can select the farmers with whom they wish to deal. The empty market basket will be sent to the farmer, who will fill it and send it back, by the cheap rates of the parcel post.

In each postoffice there will be posted minute directions for packing and mailing produce to be sent by the parcel post. In this way the Postmasters at Cincinnati and Louisville will become the agents thru whom the producers and consumers will deal and the middle man will be eliminated from the equation.

Mr. Helm will send out letters of instructions to 25,000 interior journals.
