The Louisville Boosters—The Commercial Club met Tuesday night and made arrangements for welcoming of the "Heads of Houses" and boosters of Louisville, whose train will arrive here on next Friday afternoon at 5 o'clock on its way home from Dixie.

Teachers Employed

Saturday, June 5th is the day when the teachers of this county will be employed. All teachers should have written application in the hands of the trustees by that day.

The Cemetery Improvement Association held a meeting on Wednesday afternoon, looking to pushing the work of side walks around needed work about the city of the dead. We are advised that the work will go forward.

Geo. L. Wren of the Boones Gap section was in town Wednesday and says the Conway route is the best way to the Madison line while John Luvville of the Scaffold Cane section says the Scaffold Cane route is the ideal route.

Must Be Submitted To The State, Terrell Advises Fiscal Court of Jefferson County.

A communication was received by the Fiscal Court at its meeting yesterday from R. C. Terrell, State Road Commissioner, in which the court was advised that all roads built with funds from the State must be under the direction of the State Road Commissioner and that all specifications and contracts must be submitted to that official for his approval.

Kennedy on Baptism.

Mr. H. C. Kennedy, who is making the race for the Republican nomination for Circuit Judge against the present Judge, while he was holding himself out as a minister of the Gospel, wrote a booklet upon the subject of "The Mode of Christian Baptism", in which booklet he assailed and sturred those who believe in immersion in the following manner:

"First, I shall offer some objections to immersion, and to exclusive immersion in particular. To my mind the objections to this practice seem many, and several of them at least are insuperable. I, therefore, submit the following: 1st, The INDECENCY of the practice; and of this I shall say just as little as possible, because it is so well understood, and has been observed by so many that it needs no comment here. Women know more of the INDECENCY of the practice than men. Upon numerous occasions they have been constrained to surround their lady friends who had been immersed, in order to shut off the gaze of VULGAR lookers-on. On every occasion where ladies are immersed, there are vulgar lookers-on, who never fail to get a glimpse of PRETTY ANKLES AND FLOATING SKIRTS. But this VULGAR throg does not make the practice VULGAR, IT IS ITS VERY NATURE TO BE SO, AND VULGAR lookers-on, can ADD TO ITS INDECENCY. Imagine the BIG-FOOTED IMMERSIONIST plant himself in the stream, and take hold of a pretty girl by the waist and nape of the neck, and knock her."

The above silly language is taken from said booklet, chapter 2, page 15, and is here reproduced that the people at large may have an opportunity to read it, and form the proper estimate of one who seeks the high office of Circuit Judge. He is not satisfied to slander and libel his opponent, but is willing to slur the Holy Bible and cast a reproach upon the Savior of the World. It matters not what particular church you may be affiliated with. No matter on distinction. If you are Methodist, Baptist or member of the Christian church, and have been immersed, according to Kennedy, you have engaged in VULGARITY AND INDECENCY.

The following is a copy of Letters which Hon. R. J. McBryde, Jr., President of the Kentucky Good Roads Association, is mailing out to the Press of the State. The letter in part is as follows:

"As you know, one hundred and four counties in Kentucky have applied for and been granted State aid. Under that law, the State guarantees State supervision. The law permits the head of the State Good Roads Department to employ such assistants as may be necessary for this work. As yet but three supervising engineers have been employed by the State. Four others have been lent by the Federal government, and one of them has been recalled. It is an obvious impossibility for six engineers to exercise effective supervision over road building going on simultaneously in 104 counties. So far the Governor has not been brought to realize the necessity of increasing the number of supervising engineers, although the money for their employment is available from the State Aid Fund, the Automobile License Fund and the appropriation for the Good Roads Department.

"All of us know that the failure to have good roads in Kentucky has not been due to lack of funds. Kentucky for the past year has been spending \$2,000,000 a year on roads. The fault has been lack of intelligent and honest supervision that the State aid law attempted to supply. It can be supplied if the Governor will give his consent to the employment of the necessary engineers.

The need for more road engineers in Kentucky, as expressed in the above letter is a matter of vital importance and to secure the desired results, the immediate and hearty co-operation of the people is necessary. Don't wait until tomorrow but arrange for some kind of concerted action. This is of importance to every section of our county and the commercial clubs of the county and citizens generally should take heed to this timely warning from our most worthy Good Roads President before it is too late.

Don't fail to see that all scraps of paper, rubbish and trash is taken from streets before next Friday afternoon when the Louisville Boosters train will arrive here.

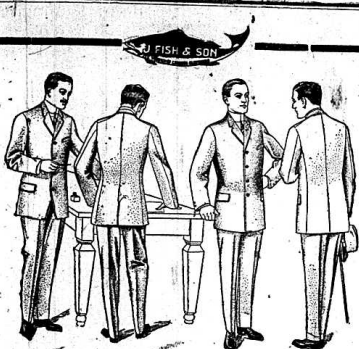

Rev. J. S. Abbott Repudiates

To Whom It May Concern:
My attention has been called to an article which appeared in the last issue of the Somerset Leader and which is being scattered broad cast over Pulaski county, purporting to come from me, and over my signature. This article makes some severe reflections on the character and grave charges against the official conduct of Judge Bethurum. In justice to myself and in fairness to Judge Bethurum I make this statement to the people:

Note a line of the article was written by me, and my intention to become mixed up in a political controversy is foreign to me or my profession. If H. C. Kennedy has my signature to any paper of a description of the letter in circulation, the following explanation will disclose whether it is really by reason of my desire or whether unwittingly I have been made the instrument of craft and guile.

Several days ago I was in Somerset, and meeting Judge Kennedy on the street he accosted me and invited me to his office. I went with him and soon afterwards he asked me the following questions: "How long have you known me?" and I answered, "About 25 years." He then asked, "How long have you known the book on Baptism that I wrote?" I then answered, "About 20 years."

Then he asked me, if he was not elected County Clerk and County Judge of Wayne county after the book was published, and if since he had not married in a prominent Baptist family of Wayne county, and I replied in the affirmative. He then asked me if I would object to certifying these facts to the people and I replied that I did not then he pushed me a paper to sign assuring me that it contained only the aforesaid facts, and I signed it and left.

I was completely dazed and dumfounded when I read the article to which my signature was attached, and I at once hastened to Somerset to investigate it and repudiate it. Evidently it is the production of Kennedy himself, and whether the original is the paper to which he obtained my signature or he was written after my departure I do not know.

All the discussion about his own religion, the mixing of religion with politics, and the criticism with regard to the appearance of the book on Baptism in this campaign are the production of Kennedy, and it is a grave injustice to place such insinuations and charges against a good and just official in my office. The only ground on his own liberal and Christian character is his and not mine.

The people know the issues in the campaign; they know who is capable, honest and upright, and it would be out of keeping of my profession to attempt to defame the name of the people's choice. I have known Judge Bethurum from the time he became Commonwealth Attorney and I know that office fearlessly and creditably. Since he became Circuit Judge I have watched his course and as a Christian and a minister of Christ I can certify in my mind, he has made an able, fearless and righteous judge. And yet the article sent forth over my signature charges him with unfairness and intimates corruption. Unhesitatingly I repudiate these and reaffirm my full faith in his integrity, honesty and ability. The article makes me charge discrimination in the selection of juries, and yet I know nothing of the procedure of same, save to my knowledge the juries selected in Pulaski and Wayne counties have been composed of good men.

I have been a minister of the Baptist church for eight years, and is an incentive to my ministry in thus drag me into this controversy and without my authority, make me sponsor and father an article not in harmony with my views and not in keeping with decency and justice. In conclusion I will say that I believe Judge Bethurum has made a faithful, honest and able officer and deserves a re-election. (Signed)

Little Sisters Live Like Siamese Twins

Two happy, smiling little girls, twins and absolutely inseparable, are at Rochester, Minn., where at the institutions of the Drs. Mayo they hope to be parted for the first time since their birth, two and one-half years ago. The little ones are Hingjoo's twins, Guadalupe and Josephine, who are bound together in a manner similar to that in which the Siamese twins were bound.

The children were born in Havana, Cuba, and the family has recently been in Mexico. They are of Spanish blood and the parents, who have arranged for the operation, are accompanied by an interpreter, Emamilio Sicre.

The binding connection of flesh joins the children in front at almost the center of the stomach, and is thirteen inches in circumference. The twins can walk forward with ease, each putting a little arm about the neck of the other. The band of flesh is elastic enough to permit them to change sides as they walk.

One of the children can lie on the edge of a bed and the other can stand beside it, their bodies making an X, so resilient is the connection. Medical men to a large extent are of the opinion that one child may be laughing and the other crying at the same time. All of their body functions seem to be independent.

The babies are very fond of each other and kiss and hug at times in a loving, sisterly way. But like other children they sometimes "fall out" and then there is a merry little "scrap" at close quarters.

At birth the babies weighed 12 pounds and at present weigh 45. They look very much alike, and prettier, brighter youngsters are seldom found.—Fairmont Sentinel.
