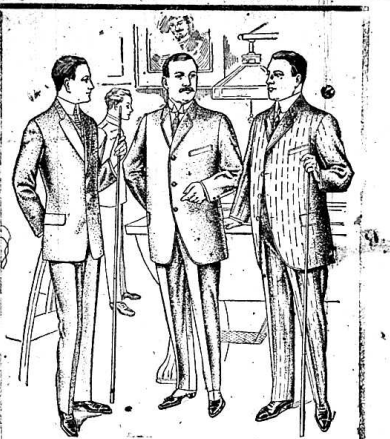

McCHESNEY THE MAN FOR VICTORY IN NOVEMBER

Temperance Vote In Country Districts and Mountains Will More Than Make Up For Liquor Men Who May Bolt—Elections of Last Few Years Prove This

EDWARDS FIGHTING POLITICAL MACHINES

Lines Up With Stanley Against Haly Machine at Frankfort and the Louisville Machine to Retain the Democracy of Kentucky From Their Clutches.

James P. Edwards, of Louisville, candidate for the Democratic nomination for Lieutenant Governor, is engaged with A. O. Stanley in a fight against two political machines, one in this state and one in Henderson county, both of which have only one object in view, the defeat of Stanley for the nomination for Governor and that of Judge Edwards for the nomination for Lieutenant Governor. In certain sections of the State the organization is supporting one candidate for Governor and in the city of Louisville another candidate is receiving the support. In order to overthrow the Haly dynasty at Frankfort and retain the Democracy of the State Mr. Stanley has asked his friends throughout the State who are supporting him for Governor to make the same fight in behalf of Judge Edwards for the nomination for Lieutenant Governor.

In the race for Lieutenant Governor last year Judge Edwards carried the Fifth Congressional district, which is made up of the city of Louisville and Jefferson county. The vote of the district was more than 5,000 votes, and it is claimed that with Judge Edwards on the ticket with Stanley for Governor the latter will be given a plurality over his opponent at Frankfort. For the purpose of letting his friends over the State know his position as to the nomination for Lieutenant Governor is conceded, Mr. Stanley, in an interview with the Henderson Gleaner, published in his home town, said: "On the State ticket I want to see the men who are working hard for my success nominated and elected with me. James P. Edwards is a candidate for Lieutenant Governor, will carry the city of Louisville for me and I want my friends in other sections of the State to do so much for him as he is doing for me in Louisville."

Commenting on the combination of Stanley and Edwards the Gleaner said: "Judge Edwards is one of the most prominent men in Louisville, and the class men he is gathering around him will carry every vote not controlled by a party club or a ward boss. It would be surprising to see Stanley get a substantial majority in the city where Judge Edwards has no ties."

FRAUD CHARGED!



For some weeks there has appeared in the Somerset Leader offering a prize in which it was stated that no fraud was charged against Kennedy in the famous case of Castillo vs. McBeeth. We quote said article.

PUT UP OR SHUT UP

"To Judge Bethurum: "In the issue of May 27, the Leader offered you or any supporter of yours the sum of \$50 cash if you would show there was any charge of fraud or deception of any kind made against Judge Kennedy in the pleadings in the McBeeth case that you keep so much about, or that there was an issue of that kind to try out. So far neither you or any friend of yours has ever accepted the proposition. The Leader now raises the offer to \$100. Get busy! This is money in it for you if you make good."

"The Judge has 'made good,' and in proof of this we quote from the answer of Henry McBeeth filed in the case April 2nd 1913, in which he charges as follows:

"And he says that the said Kennedy wrongfully and Praudently undertook to convey and did execute the said deed with the plainiff's position hereinafter purporting to convey to the said plaintiff and for the purpose and with the intention of Cheating and Defrauding the heirs of Jordan McBeeth out of the lands hereinafter described."

"The above is copied from said answer and is reproduced in order to further discredit Kennedy and his methods.

He has made another fatal blunder and another mistake. In conducting a campaign along his lines this is to be expected.

A candidate for the high office of Circuit Judge cannot attempt to take from an old innocent negro his little farm work, as the proof shows, from \$200 to \$400 for the sum of \$39.46 and expect to escape public condemnation.

He is branded as an oppressor by the Court of Appeals of Kentucky. This highest court of the state, "The consideration is grossly inadequate, and the transaction therefore oppressive if the installment is held to be a deed.

"Put up" is the \$100, Leader, and "Shut up" from this on. The Leader has "Shut Up" but strange as they have not "Put Up" their mystical \$100.

Do you believe, fellow-citizens, according to the above, which is as true as is the magnetic needle to the North pole that the Judge is free from bias and prejudice, is intelligent, sensible, and well informed to safely advise the good, honest people of this great district how to vote.

He is saying in his speeches all over the district that whisky is being sold in Somerset, Pulaski county, by bootleggers and in violation of the law. Now let us reason just a bit, and by so doing we can very readily see the predicament in which the Judge has gotten himself. He is sorry for this gentleman for it has been said that "A little knowledge is a very dangerous thing". He says that he knows where he speaks. Is he not the Judge of the county and what is his duties as such and what is the nature and substance of the oath that he was required to take upon the assumption of the duties of said office?

A Letter From Clinton

July 17th, 1915.

Editor Somerset Herald:

Through the columns of your paper I come to the voters of the 28th Judicial District of Kentucky in the interest of the Hon. B. J. Bethurum, not as a Republican, not as a Democrat, not as a Lawyer, Christ, and as such to present facts to the people in hopes that when the good people of these four counties go to the polls they will be governed by facts and not by gossip.

False and slanderous reports have gone out on Judge Bethurum; yet his character as a Christian gentleman, as an able jurist and also as an able and worthy official stands unimpeached, and unimpeachable when the slanderous gossip has gone out that Judge Bethurum has unjustly charged juries in certain cases tried in the courts of our county, justice only has to reach forth her hand and draw from our county his written charges, which in every case are as pure and unbiased as the law governing the case.

CANNOT ANSWER

On July 28th the Herald republished the letter of Hon. R. P. Morrow on the Griffin case, so called, in which letter Mr. Morrow completely vindicated Judge Bethurum from all the untrue and untruthful attacks appearing in the Somerset Leader. The Herald asked Kennedy (this means to charge Mr. Morrow with "obstructing and hindering the insurance company" in effect, and Kennedy has been silent on this question.

The Herald still asserts that the people and voters of this district will believe our next Governor about this Griffin case and will take Mr. Morrow's word before they will believe Kennedy. In fact Kennedy and his leaders have been silent on this matter of late and we

wonder if they are not finally made aware of the eternal fact that "truth is mighty and will prevail."

Again the Herald asks, does Kennedy propose to call our Republican candidate for Governor as falsifier and bungler? Kennedy will imply these untrue charges about Mr. Morrow in your next resolutions about the Griffin case? The Herald asks the voters to read Mr. Morrow's letter as follows:

Hon. B. J. Bethurum,
Commonwealth Attorney.

Dear Sir:

In the matter of the Commonwealth of Kentucky vs. H. L. Griffin, charged with manslaughter, I desire to make the following statement:

I was the attorney of Mrs. Lis Bowen, the administrator of Oscar Bowen, deceased, who was killed by H. L. Griffin, and Mrs. Bowen was also the beneficiary of an accident policy made in her favor by her husband in the Continental Casualty Co. After the death of Bowen, as the attorney of Mrs. Bowen, I handled the settlement of her claim against this insurance company. The payment of the claim was refused by the company upon the grounds that the death of Bowen was not the result of an accident but that he was purposely killed by Griffin and therefore an accident policy would not permit a recovery. At the instance of Mrs. Bowen and her father, John Camden, I investigated the matter; took the statement of various eye witnesses and presented such proof to the said company as to convince them that Bowen's death was the result of an accident instead of being the result of crime. For this reason they adjusted the claim upon the basis of an accidental killing. Very Respt.,

During the time that I was serving as County Attorney, H. L. Griffin shot and killed a man by the name of Oscar Bowen here in Somerset. The Grand Jury following the killing indicted Griffin for voluntary manslaughter. Judge Bethurum was Commonwealth's Attorney at the time. After the indictment was returned, Judge Bethurum and I were both anxious to try the case. The case was continued several times on account of the absence of material witnesses from the Commonwealth, two of whom had left the State. Finally the wife and father-in-law of the deceased came to Judge Bethurum and myself and asked that the case be dismissed and stated that they had made a thorough investigation of the case and found that the killing was the result of an accident and that the wife of the deceased had taken the statements of the eye witnesses to the killing and had convinced an accident insurance company that the killing was accidental and that the company had paid the accident policy which the deceased had taken in said company. I personally know that Judge Bethurum as commonwealth's Attorney used every effort at his command to have this case tried and that he refused to dismiss this case under any circumstances, but after consulting with me we both agreed that under the circumstances the best thing that could be done was to file the case with leave to reinstate, which was done. I most heartily endorse the action of Judge Bethurum in this case, because, in my judgment, it would have been impossible to have secured a conviction under all the circumstances surrounding the case.

Sheriff Cam Mullins Makes Explanation.

It has been reported in certain sections of this County that wrong doing would be resorted to by me at the coming primary election to bring about the nomination of Dr. R. G. Webb for Representative; and a letter has been written by a certain individual living in the eastern part of the County and is being privately used and contains the statement that I had said that I would bring about the success of Dr. Webb if I had to steal his nomination. I never made such a statement to any person, and the statement contained in said letter is a libel of the whole cloth, made for the purpose of injuring me personally, and with the hopes of possibly inducing voters in the legislative race. Furthermore, I will give \$50.00 if any man will make and furnish me an affidavit that he heard me make such a statement. I expect to go to the bottom of this matter. The idea attempted to be conveyed was that I, in my official capacity as sheriff, would select election officers who would corrupt the election. As Sheriff, I am a member of the County Board of Election Commissioners, and have no vote in the selection of officers except in case of a tie, the other commissioners being U. G. Baker and S. B. McKenzie. These Commissioners did not disagree except in the selection of two officers in different precincts and the officers I voted for were W. H. Jones in Roundstone precinct and Fritz Krueger, Sr., in West Mt. Vernon precinct, both good and upright men. The other officers were selected by said Baker and McKenzie from lists furnished them, and recommended, as the law provides, by the Republican and Democratic County Committees. I appended to, and made a part of this communication, a full list of the officers selected to hold the August primary and I ask the voters to say, in your own mind, whether, in your judgment, these men are selected for the purpose of wrong-doing or in the interest of any candidate. I write this, for the purpose of putting myself right with the voters of this county, and for the purpose of nulling the slander of me attempted by designing persons.

In conclusion I wish to assure the people that I will do all in my power to have the coming primary conducted in an honest and legal manner. I have enemies who would like to see the election conducted otherwise, but the public know that I expect both my friends and enemies to obey the law, which they must do while I am Sheriff.
