Dear Uncle James:

Just a word to say that I am on my way from London to New York and Chicago on a business trip for the Western Electric Company in connection with their automatic and semi-automatic telephone exchange system. I shall be in the U. S. about eight weeks when I will return to London.

Every thing is going on quite well in London in spite of the war. My all business is good and untroubled, as small as the war, so far has not materially interfered with my prosperity. It was necessary to leave Awerp, Belgium, and come to London on account of the war.

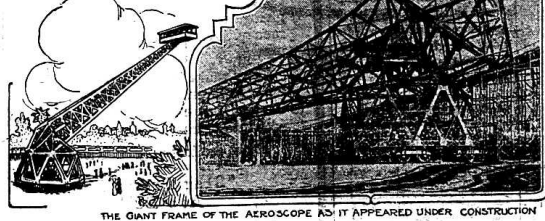

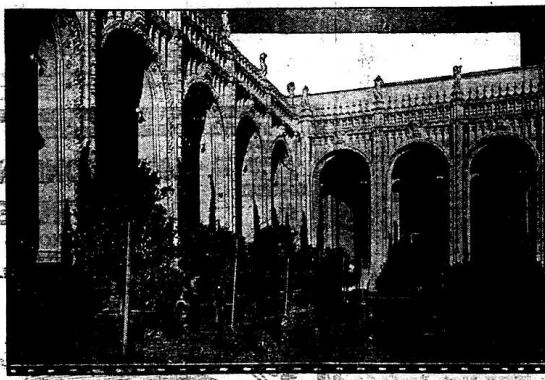
VISITORS ON THE AEROSCOPE 265 FEET ABOVE THE EARTH



THE GIANT FRAME OF THE AEROSCOPE AS IT APPEARED UNDER CONSTRUCTION

For the seeker of amusement there is opportunity aplenty in the unique mechanical achievement, the Aeroscope, on "The Zig-zag" at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition. The aeroscope resembles a giant crane of a novel and intricate design, its steel construction recalling that of the Bessemer bridge. At the extremity of the long arm of the crane is a two-story car with a seating capacity for 100 persons and standing room for 20 more. At the short end of the crane is a giant mass of concrete, which serves as a counter-balance for the car. Beneath the car are two great water tanks, which take on water or discharge it as passengers enter or leave the car, thus always preserving the balance to a nicety. When, for example, a man weighing 160 pounds enters the car an amount of water of equal weight is released from the tank, and when the passenger departs 160 pounds of water are automatically discharged into the tank below the car. The car ascends without perceptible motion, and perfect safety and a jarless ride of ten minutes is assured to passengers while enjoying the view of 25 feet into the clouds, or four feet higher than the Ferris wheel. Two motors control the ascent and descent in conjunction with the counter-balance of the huge car, and when it reaches its extreme height it begins to swing slowly around on the wheels at its base, giving a magnificent view of the exposition, of San Francisco and one of the city of San Francisco.

The World in Epitome Shown by Displays in the Vast Exhibit Palaces at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition.

Today the great Panama Pacific International Exposition at San Francisco is being widely exploited throughout the world by the millions of light-seers who have visited the exposition since its opening on February 20th last as the most beautiful, comprehensive and interesting universal exposition that the world has ever known. The wonderful exhibit palaces house the treasures of the earth, while the grounds, planted to million of rare plants, are a gorgeous mass of color and fragrance. To the visitor entering the gates for the first time, either by night or day, the scene is certain to hold the newcomer spellbound, as the vast panorama unfolds bit by bit before the gaze and the eye wanders from one beauty spot to another in an endless chain of amazing surprises. Entering the main gate at Scott street, for instance, the visitor sees the great Fountain of Energy directly before him its giant sprays sparkling and flashing in the light of the warm California sun by day, or assuming the appearance of masses of flaming flames by night under the powerful beams of the great batteries of searchlights trained upon this work of art. As the spell is lifted, the eye falls upon the Tower of Jewels, the great center piece of the exposition, and again attention is arrested until the eye has conceived the dizzy heights of this gem-studded tower, every cornice and figure radiating forth its share of dazzling lights.

The world's advance in all branches of art, science and industry is amazingly portrayed in the exhibits. Among the electrical exhibits, for example, is the Audion amplifier, invented by Lee De Forest. Through this invention the visitor in the Liberal Arts palace is enabled to converse over the long distance telephone with his relatives at the farthest section of the Atlantic coast and may hear the voice of the speaker in greater volume than was actually given into the transmitting telephone. The intensity of the sound is increased by passing through heat waves. Today it is possible for an orator in New York city to address through the telephone a large audience at San Francisco the sound being increased so that it is of power great enough to fill a large hall. This double system in the development of the telephone is paralleled in hundreds of other lines. The railroads have made low round trip rates and ample and comfortable accommodations are to be had in San Francisco and the adjoining cities.

Children Cry for Fletcher's CASTORIA

Medium Used to Promote Planting

Some of the remarkable properties of radium are being demonstrated at an exhibition in the Liberal Arts Palace at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, San Francisco, in connection with a new invention known as the radiating of water for medicinal purposes.

Demonstrating the power of the mineral promoting a substantial number of young plants, some existing with and some without the aid of radium, are shown. Those in the radiating soil are seen to be growing much more rapidly than those in common soil and to have more healthy appearance.

This inventor has found a process of transmitting rays of radium with radium-bearing minerals and (these) radium salts in water are said to give it remarkable curative properties. The porous bricks are most indigestible, losing only half their potency, it is estimated, in 150 years. Since the discovery of this mineral, has been found that many kinds of waters, as Carlsbad and Baden, owe their health-giving properties to radium. The inventor claims that his process produces in ordinary waters the qualities of these famous springs and the radiating of water is a process of fact of radioactive salts, which is known as carnotite, a formation found mainly in Colorado and Utah, and now producing three-fourths of the world's radium. The European mineral, known as pitchblende, from which the famous European springs are impregnated, is also displayed.

Most Repaid Photographs Ever Taken. The most remarkable set of speed photographs ever taken are a part of the war department's exhibit in Machinery Hall at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, San Francisco. They are pictures of a shell from a 12-inch coast defense gun in flight, the set including 200 various phases of the flight beginning just as the great projectile leaves its nose out of the muzzle of the gun.

The pictures were taken with a lens having an exposure period of one five-hundredths of a second, this being the fastest shutter ever manufactured. The exposure at the proper time in the flight of the projectile was made by breaking an electric circuit in a wire stretched across the path of the shell, and connected with the shutter. The picture shows the shell half-way into the muzzle before any smoke and gas has escaped. Another picture shows the shell just as it set out from the muzzle but hidden by a heavy cloud of smoke. A third shows the shell including the various phases of the flight beginning just as the great projectile leaves its nose out of the muzzle of the gun.

NATIVE LIFE OF THE FAR PACIFIC.



The photograph shows the cattle of the interesting Samoan village at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition at San Francisco. The structure in this village, comprising the entire inhabited part of the Samoan is as they were formerly called, the Navigator Islands, were brought in from the native villages and are absolutely faithful in all their features. There are many native families living at the village who for the edification of visitors perform the aquatic feats in which the islanders excel, and dance the rhythmic native dances. The life of the people of the Pacific coast is wonderfully illustrated at the Exposition, and of all the races none are more interesting than the Samoans who exhibit many traces of Aryan descent. Our townsman accepted the proffered position.

The Kentucky Gazette, established at Lexington in 1784, and recently revived in Louisville, will be the organ of the Kentucky Children's Daniel Boone League

A monument was dedicated in the Bryan cemetery at Mathiasville, Mo., on October 20, at the original grave of Daniel Boone and his wife Rebecca Bryan Boone whose remains were removed to Kentucky in 1844. The spot in the cemetery at Mathiasville was selected by the frontiersman for his burial place. Boone made his own coffin some years before he died and often got in to "see if it fitted him."

Tuesday's Vote in Other States.

In addition to defeating the suffrage amendment by about 200,000 votes the people of New York repudiated the new State Constitution drafted by a convention of which Eliza Root was president and for which Mr. Root had conducted a vigorous speaking campaign.

Samuel W. McCall, the Republican who will succeed David I. Walsh, a Democrat, as Governor of Massachusetts, won by a plurality of 6,663. The Republicans retained control of the Legislature. Republicans returned to power in Philadelphia, where their candidate, Thomas B. Smith, was elected Mayor by 75,000.

In New Jersey the Republicans gained two State Senators and two members of the Assembly and will continue in control of both houses of the Legislature. State-wide prohibition was rejected in Ohio by a majority of from 30,000 to 40,000. Last year the amendment was defeated by 84,152. The Republicans elected Mayors in Cleveland and Cincinnati. Charles M. Mitty, a Progressive was chosen Mayor of Toledo.

The city of Toledo voted against a twenty-five year street car franchise and will take over all lines controlled by the Toledo Railways and Light Company.

A proposal that the city purchase the local street railways was rejected in Detroit after a bitter fight.

The election of members of the Virginia General Assembly will send a heavy majority to the Democrats. It is expected that the enactment of prohibition legislation when the State goes dry by constitutional amendment November 1, 1916.

New York the proposed new State Constitution was rejected by a majority of approximately 480,000.

New York denied women's suffrage by the ballot by a majority of approximately 200,000.

Massachusetts vote against suffrage showed a majority of 132,082.

Pennsylvania's returns were slow in coming in, but indicated that the majority against suffrage would be less than first figures indicated. Estimates based on incomplete returns forecast defeat of the amendment by from 50,000 to 75,000.

Sammy Hall triumphed in New York City in the election. J. D. Smart Attorney for the first time in fifteen years, the Sheriff of New York county and a majority of the Board of Aldermen.

The Democrats apparently elected a Governor in Maryland and an entire State ticket, besides a majority in the State Legislature.

Mississippi, the only other State, except Kentucky to elect a Governor, went, as usual, Democratic. The only opposition to the Democratic ticket headed by Theodore G. Bilbo was made by Socialists nominated by petition.

In New York former Congressman William S. Bennett was elected in West-third district to succeed the Democratic Congressman, Jacob Goulden Bennett a Republican.

Republicans will succeed in the Thirty-first and Thirty-second congressional districts of New York and the Twenty-fourth district of Pennsylvania.

In New York the Republicans retained their control of the lower house of the Legislature, although they lost one Assemblyman.

They also elected in majority of the Mayors chosen in cities of the State.

Mr. Stoney was won, but by a narrow margin. It is doubtful if any other man the party has named could have done as well if the party is to retain power, if the State is to be made content with conditions, it is imperative that the people shall be pledged.

Kentucky has elected Mr. S. Hanley, a Republican, because he is a Democrat, not because he has taken him at his word that his election means the end of the invincible government, the wiping out of the State's debt, the building of the State's roads, the betterment of the schools, the overthrow of the tax system, a new system of taxation in which confiscation will not be attempted or perjury encouraged in short, that he needs recognized as vital shall be dealt with, not from the standpoint of a political spokesman, but of the responsible head of the State's government under which every Kentuckian has the right to expect equal measure of opportunity.

All that Kentucky asks is that promises made be lived up to.

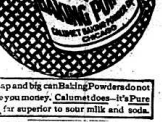
