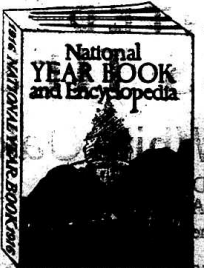

Mr. W. E. D. Stokes, proprietor of Patchen Wilkes Stock Farm near Lexington, owner of Hotel Ansonia, and a noted builder, who has erected more than a thousand houses in Greater New York, is taking quite an interest in Mare's forthcoming history of Daniel Boone, Trails and Highways, and is furnishing some splendid material and electrolytes for the work pertaining to Boone and other in tersely interesting subjects.

The first mill built in Kentucky was located on Boone's Creek Fayette county, three miles from Clay's Ferry, and was erected by Eli Cleveland about the year 1784 or '85. Cleveland was a partner of Green Clay in Clay's Ferry, and was the great grand father of S. C. Franklin of this place.

The Three States, of Middleboro, of Friday last, said the iron furnace there would go in blast this week. To Mrs. A. A. Arthur the widow of the founder of the people city, was given the honor of starting the fire. Employment will be given three hundred men.

Bell county has ordered an election to vote \$1,500,000 additional for road purposes. This would be bonds already issued will place the total amount at \$400,000.

## JIM MARET, THE BOONE WAY MAN

TAKES A WHACK AT KNOXVILLE.

The business men of Knoxville will take a swing around the circle in Tennessee, North Carolina, Virginia and Kentucky during April, on a full tour of steel coaches. The train is due at Mt. Vernon, going south, at 4:10 p. m., on April 12th.

Why does Knoxville propose to run a train load of boosters thru the mountains of Kentucky?

To gain more mountain trade. Does Knoxville deserve more trade from Kentucky?

We think not. What has that city done on every occasion during past three years when solicited, and even appealed to donate a little mite toward postage and printing fund and in promoting the movement of building Boone Way thru the mountains for the relief of our people?

Turned the cold shoulder and probably would have turned the hose on us had we been in reach. Yet, they will spend thousands of dollars for this steel coach train and other expenses to make the proposed jaunt, and advise us how dearly they love us, (especially our trade).

Did the Knoxville business men know the situation when applied to for co-operation? Yes. The Mt. Vernon Commercial Club and the business men of Mt. Vernon advised them fully a number of times, and fully as requesting the Knoxville Board of Commerce to take the matter up. Nothing doing.

Was Knoxville asked to contribute to a building or construction fund?

No. Only requested to aid in the postage and printing fund promoting the highway movement. The mountain counties thru which it was proposed to run highways, were to be asked to vote a bond issue to bear the expense of building the road. There were expenses connected with making up a pamphlet for the road, sufficient to carry bond issue.

Did the bond issue carry? Yes. In every county and with out the lifting of a hand by Knoxville.

What replies were usually received?

On replies come (they didn't come on every occasion) they contained such encouragement as this: "We will take the matter up." And "Stick 'em tight." "We are with you." They were with us for trade, but contributions, nil.

After the Kentucky mountain had put the bond issue over, what move did Knoxville make? "Now," said Knoxville. "That Boone Way is assured an road thru the mountains is it right, it makes the routing of Dixie Highway possible over routes via Knoxville and then on the Boone Way from Cumberland Gap to Mt. Vernon. We will just step over to that big Chattanooga convention of the Dixie Highway Commissioners on May 20, 1916, and put the matter up to them."

What was the result? The Dixie Highway was so routed. Had there been no Boone Way the Dixie wouldn't have come near to Knoxville than Chattanooga.

Didn't Knoxville know these facts, and didn't they then have a change of heart? Knew it, yes, and acknowledges the fact. No appreciable change was evident except that after getting what they wanted in the routing of Dixie they seemed to fall safe and solid over the prospect of receiving the benefits that Boone Way would be able to bestow, and its future usefulness was secured to them without even a mite contributed to the postage fund in the campaign.

Were later applications and representations made by any of the Knoxville mountaineers to the Knoxville Board?

Yes, as late as in March 1916, the matter was again called to their attention, from Mt. Vernon, to the fact that one of Mt. Vernon's citizens had put in three years work in promoting this mountain highway, without any salary attached, and that in that time, paid out \$250 for legitimate expenses in excess of the amount of contributions received. Here is the reply: "The Board of Commerce has no money for such movements no matter how deserving it may be." Isn't that rough enough to jar the hinges from a barn door or to break the whistles of a bill goat.

Who contributed toward paying the expenses of the campaign? Mt. Vernon Commercial Club first, paying the larger portion; then in rotation, Louisville second, Middleboro third, Crab Orchard, Barbourville, Pineville, Covington, Lancaster Heroduband, Danville, London Livingston, Hansford, Hiatt, Bromo, Indianapolis, Chicago, etc.

Was there no good come of (Mazareth) that busy city that by the Tennessee in the Halesville valley?

Yes, two notable exceptions. The wide awake and enterprising house of Daniel Briscoe & Co. and one of Knoxville's popular traveling salesmen, J. P.
