not only that, but the higher courts have decided that a two-thirds majority is not necessary to decide a popular question that a majority are in favor of.

In other words the majority have a right to be favored rather than the minority. While we are commending ourselves and extending mutual congratulations for what has been accomplished, let us make a further survey of our social and civic environments.

The sanitary condition of the home, the school, the streets and alleys, barns and hog pens, chicken roosts and pig sties, are of far more importance than streets, sidewalks, lawns or back yards. The neglect of hygienic precautions in matters referred to involves the question of good health, eye, life itself. Sooner or later your life or mine or that of some loved one, may be the price paid for our procrusteanism. It is only a question of time when we'll have water works. The plan and rough estimate of cost is practically understood by some of our business men.
