### Two More Leading Progressives

#### URGE PRESIDENT WILSON'S RE-ELECTION.

Announcement was made at Democratic headquarters yesterday that Prof. George Ragsdale, of Louisville, and Aubrey F. Adkins, an attorney of Covington, two of the leading Progressives in Kentucky in 1912, had announced their allegiance to President Woodrow Wilson and the Democratic ticket this year, and that both will exert all their influence to carry the State in November. Atorney Adkins was one of the organizers of the Progressive party in 1912 and was in charge of the campaign headquarters, station-

He called at Democratic headquarters yesterday and conferred with Chairman Cantrill and Mr. Rouse and professed his services to the cause of Democracy, and announced that he will take the stump in the State the last three weeks of the campaign. He said that in his opinion President Wilson is the only true progressive with progressive ideas now before the American electorate and felt that a large majority of the progressive party will be found supporting him this year because of the beneficial legislation along progressive lines enacted during the past three and one-half years by the Democratic Congress under the leadership of President Wilson.

**PREPARES ARTICLES.**  
 Prof. Ragsdale was perhaps as closely identified with the progressive party in Louisville and the Fifth district in 1912 as any other man in this city and county. Like Attorney Adkins he feels that President Wilson has more progressive ideas than any man now in public life in America and that it will be for the best interest of the country for the former Progressives to vote to retain him in office rather than forsake the principles of the party and vote for the Republican opposition. Prof. Ragsdale has prepared a series of articles and turned them over to the Democratic State Campaign Committee which will be used by the committee between now and the November election. The first of the series, "Wilson and the Progressive Movement" will be seen to day, and the other four will follow during the next four weeks.

Albert Krell, president of the Krell Piano Co., who has voted for seven consecutive Republican candidates for president, announced Monday he would vote for Woodrow Wilson.
