OIL NEWS.

Mr. A. G. Jackson, representing the East Kentucky Oil Co., was in Mt. Vernon Tuesday looking after his oil interests in the county. Mr. Jackson is also connected with Mr. T. P. Curry, of Birmingham New York, in a private company. The East Kentucky Oil Co. has had Mr. C. E. Straube, geologist, in the county since Monday making a geological survey and located points on the leases held by the latter.

Mr. Jackson, on which drilling will be done. Messrs J. P. E. Drammmond, W. H. Ottongum and R. G. Webb went to Frankfort, Tuesday, to get the charter for the First State Bank of Livingston, which will be opened for business not later than June 1st.

All the stock has been subscribed, and a large per cent of which is held by citizens in and around Livingston. The cashier has not been named yet, although there are several applicants. The experience of the past few weeks, especially since the L. & N. began paying by check, has demonstrated the need of a bank for the convenience of Livingston business men.

The Rockcastle Patriotic League is now fully organized with a central committee at Mt. Vernon and a chairman and Executive committee of five members each in each of the five magistristerial districts. Work is proceeding nicely. Meetings are being held throughout the county at the various school houses in which every attendant is privileged and invited to speak on the most important subject before our people today - crisis, stock poultry and the conservation of crops. The central committee is making the work, assisted by the district committees.

GOVERNOR Stanley will appoint a board in each county who in turn will select three men in each voting precinct to take the registration of persons who are subject to the selective draft provisions. Due notice regarding the age limit, etc. will be given, and those included between certain given ages must appear at their voting places and register. There is a penalty for failing or refusing to register and such persons are liable to arrest and punishment.

Laurel county is preparing to have fifty men represent that county at the Good Roads meeting at Berea next Friday afternoon, and at Richmond the 25th. It is expected there will be at least a thousand guests at these meetings and all of them from Cincinnati south. The Rockcastle Fiscal Court expects to attend these meetings and it is hoped every one who can will go. The meeting will be in the interest of the missing link of the Dixie Highway in Rockcastle and Lure county.

Governor Stanley's movement for organizing every county for preparedness in food crop plan was well supported by Rockcastle some ten days ago. On the list, as lately announced by the Governor, on the Organ of National Defense for the State of Kentucky and committees for organizing Agricultural forces, appear the names of Rockcastle citizens as follows: W. J. Sparks, W. M. Bullock, and Dr. Walker Owens. Rockcastle is the first county in the state to get organized and the good work is moving along splendidly.

CUTS GERMANY'S ACQUAINTANCE.
The list of countries with which Germany is on speaking terms grows steadily shorter. Guatemala broke off relations last Saturday, and tendered to the United States the use of its harbor.
The reason given by President Cabrera is that Guatemala desired to stand with the United States in the fight for democracy and the preservation of international law.
BAVARIA UNPACIFIED.
Bavaria, the second largest state in the German Empire, is said to have had enough of Prussian leadership. The Bavarian Premier is reported gone to Vienna, to confer with the Austrian government on a movement for peace.
LOSSES BY U BOATS GREAT.
While the British troops have been making progress in the north of France, the German U. B. nets of the submarine situation. The daily average of allied and neutral ships sunk has lately doubled, counting only those over 100 tons. These figures show the average number of such ships lost per day: 2, 1, 2, 2, 1, 2, 5, 2, 2, 7, 3, 7.
As is still further to urge the Allies, the German Admiralty claims that only six German U. Bats have been lost in two months, while a thousand have been built.
It seems to appear the unless some way can be found to overcome the U. Bats, Great Britain and Ireland will certainly be starved before many months.
