

# **RECORD OF COUNTY** JUDGE EXPOSED

Promises Made Four Years Ago Not Kept.

## BOND FUND SQUANDERED

Reckless Extravagance and Mismanagement Shown By The Records.

TO THE REPUBLICANS OF ROCKCASTLE COUNTY:

TO THE REPUBLICANS OF ROCKCASTLE COUNTY:
Since making my formal announcement for the Republican nomination for the office of County Judge, two other candidates have announced against me. In my announcement I gave to the Republicans of this county the platform upon which I am making my race. Neither of my opponents have favored the Republicans of the county with a statement of wint they stood for, or what they would do if given the office; exagnt Mr. Griffin promises that if elected he will increase the load of taxation already heavy on the backs of the tax-payers of the county by taxing them to work the public county roads. Mr. Ballard makes no promises, whatever in his announcement, possibly because he made so many promises four years ago, none of which he kept. The republicans and tax-payers of the county have called upon me to give them some of the promises made by Mr. Ballard four years ago, and I hereby give the facts to them and you shall be the judge, from the facts, whether Mr. Ballard has kept his promises to the people.

His first promise was to serve the people as County Judge for \$600 per year. The first year he served-1914, there was paid him as County Judge the sum of \$816.00, \$216 more than paid him as County Judge the sum of \$\$16.00, \$216 more than he promised to serve for; in 1915 there was paid him as County Judge \$\$15, \$215 more than he promised to serve for; in 1916 there was paid him as County Judge \$\$815, \$215 more than he promised to serve for, and 1916 there was paid him as County Judge \$\$89.35, \$\$83.35 more than he promised to serve for people for. This record shows that he promised to serve the people for. This record shows that he has accepted a total of \$\$4,30.36 for his services as County Judge, or \$1,090.36 more than he promised to serve for. He promised also that he would only pay the County Attorney and County Superintendent a salary of \$600 a year and by making this reduction in his salary and heirs. save the taxpayers of the county \$\$2,400 for the four years. This he has not done.

Mr. Ballard promised to reduce the pauper claims of the county one-half and also furnish those in need. Prior to his administration there had been an allowance of \$1,500 per

county one-half and also furnish those in need. Prior to his administration there had been an allowance of \$1,500 per year to care for the paupers of the county. The records show that in the year 1914 there was paid out \$3,500.33 in 1915 \$3,518.31 and in 1916 the sum of \$2,584.03, at total of \$9,602.67 for three years. Instead of costing the taxpayers of the county \$1,500 a year, it cost them \$3,200.89 a year for the three years, and God knows what it will cost them this year.


