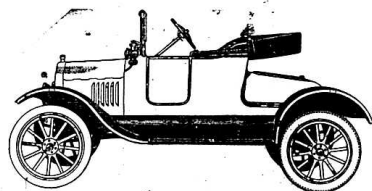


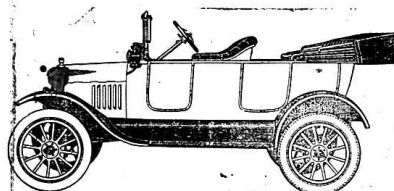

disclosure of the President or the urgency of the war should make necessary. Passed May 26.

Passed espionage law June 13, authorizing the government to deal with the activities of enemy spies and giving the Postoffice department power to censor the mail circulation of newspapers and magazines.

Authorized the construction of sixteen cantonment camps each capable of housing 40,000 men.

Passed a bill authorizing the President to commandeer and take over all ships under construction in American shipyards, and to take over and operate the German ships seized at the outbreak of the war.

Secretary of the Navy given power to commandeer all materials required for the construction of warships and munitions.

Creation of Priority Committee giving power to the government to route, freight and regulate urgent shipments of coal or other necessary commodities.

Creation of a Food Control Board headed by Herbert Hoover with power to fix the price of wheat and certain other commodities and to deal in food.

Creation of a Coal, Feed and Fuel Control Board, with power to fix price of coal and control its distribution.

Passage of revenue taxation law designed to raise approximately two billion dollars annually with heavy taxes on luxuries, excess profits and incomes.

Authorizing the President to proclaim an embargo on exports to neutral and other countries.

War budget authorized amounting approximately twenty-one billion dollars, the chief items being seven billions loaned to the allies; for soldier pay, clothing and shelter, \$3,642,000,000; for army and navy arms and ammunition, \$3,154,000,000; for warships and naval guns, \$357,000,000; for aviation, \$207,000,000; for naval fuel, ammunition and men, \$152,000,000; for civil government, \$570,000,000; for food control, \$164,000,000; for the President's private fund, \$100,000,000; for war risk insurance, \$45,000,000.

Wayside Notes

By "J. M."

One of our "boys", W. H. Williams, is a resident of Aztec, New Mexico. He is a brother of the late J. J. and D. N. Williams and of Mrs. J. W. Van Winkle, of Mt. Vernon. His very interesting letter follows: "I was born in Rockcastle county, 1855, left Mt. Vernon at the age of 18 and located in Carthage, Ill. Entered mercantile business in 1876 and continued therein until war broke out. Effected the service as orderly sergeant, promoted after six months and received four commissions during war; the last one being that of Colonel, dated November 10th 1864. Lived in and sold merchandise in Iowa, Kansas, Colorado and New Mexico. Retired from goods business seven years ago. Am president of the Citizen's Bank of Aztec, since its organization in 1903. Own 1060 acres farm and timber lands in New Mexico and Colorado, some town property, all rented out except home residence. Have three grand-sons in the army and several nephews and grand-nephews—from Kentucky of course. I am getting a little old but my brother, J. C. Williams, of Carthage, Illinois, beats me by 16 years; he is 92."

The charter members of the Mt. Vernon Organized Club, which was organized January 29, 1915, were J. W. Brown, Robert Cox, W. G. McFee, J. F. Griffin, U. G. Baker, C. D. Setton, E. S. Albright, W. M. Poynter, Chas. C. Davis, F. L. Thompson, E. C. Cox, A. McKenzie, C. B. McKenzie, D. A. G. Lovell, W. H. Fish, A. B. Ferush and Jim Maret, seventeen in all; to the list was added at subsequent meetings were the names of 28 others, including merchants, lawyers, doctors and others.

The good acquaintance by the efforts of this Club has proved of inestimable value to the town and county. It placed a great highway on the map, passing thru the Cumberlandians; brought the business and professional men of the town into a better understanding, made an impression upon the country people which caused a better feeling of unity in business and social relationship; caused more pavements to be constructed; aided in electing the best men for town officers. Without political prejudices entering therein; had streets improved; built electric light plant; sowed the seeds of good fellowship where petty jealousies had existed; aided in philanthropic affairs; schools and churches received their attention; in fact it did many other things, not mentioned here, for the betterment of conditions generally, for town and county. The work and influence of the Club reach farther to the betterment by following in the footsteps.

The Boone Way Association and the people generally along this highway have a mighty warm feeling in their hearts for Bartlett, the man who had faith in the "dream" of the little band of Mt. Vernon workers whose "vision" gave them courage to fight the battle through for better things for their people who were virtually shut out from the highway world for the lack of connecting highways. If we had a few more like Mr. Bartlett, in this old world of ours, it would brighten up things along the "pathway" of life.

Was in Mt. Vernon, Saturday afternoon till Sunday noon on a hurried trip. Had telephoned a friend to meet at Mt. Vernon, Dec 20. Plaintiff failed to come. From that point it has been macadamized about three miles but is not in a finished condition but will be overhauled and put in first class shape, by the contractor, before it is turned over and accepted by the proper authorities.

I was pleased to see the grading on the Livingston division of the highway was progressing nicely. Was assured by county road engineer Mattigly that would be completed into Mt. Vernon sometime in November. On account of some possible difficulties arising in connection with the routing of the highway at Livingston in getting over and around or under railroad tracks and yard to reach the proposed bridge site at month of Round Stone, some of our Livingston friends are a little fearful of the possibility of the road crossing the creek higher up thereby the town losing that for which they have fought so long and valiantly. It is to be hoped that all difficulties may be overcome and the road put thru over the route they desire.
