RECIPE FOR CIN PANCAKES.  
1 cup of oat meal, 1/2 tablespoon sugar, 1 cup of milk, 1 egg, 1 teaspoon in 1/2 cup butter, 2 tablespoons baking powder, 1 egg, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 cup sweet milk or water.

Mix the dry ingredients, add melted butter, well beaten egg and milk. Bake like ordinary griddle cakes.

These cakes are fully as palatable and nutritious as cakes made from wheat only. Eat your share of the country's wheat but are you entitled to more than 50 per cent of it? Kentucky only produces two thirds of the wheat she consumes. A 20,000,000 bushel back-lash crop for 1917, plenty of book-wheat, cakes in sight to take the place of wheat cakes.

### ONE THING TO MAKE FROM PUMPKIN

Pumpkin and Pineapple Mar malade:  
1 cup of pumpkin, peeled and ground, 1 cup of shredded pine apple, 2 cups of sugar, 1 teaspoon of ginger.

This to stand over night in a granite pan, or for several hours until the juice is extracted; add the juice of one lemon and cook slowly until tender and thick, then pack in hot jars and seal.
