feel that there ought to be a change Mr. Powers recently made a speech in Congress, and got worked up to such a point of continuing in Congress for a long term that he proposed, Champ Clark in support of his idea that a man ought to be in Congress twenty years. We can not agree with Mr. Powers, if we try a man eight years and he cannot show some results, we think we ought to change and try a new man.

DID NOT VOTE AGAINST THE WAR.

Mr. Powers talks much about being against the selective draft law, and about being in favor of Col. Roosevelt going to France, and about being against the war. The truth of the matter as we understand it, Mr. Powers did not vote or speak against the war resolution. If he was against the war, and thought our country should not enter the war, he should have spoken against it, and voted against it when that question was up for consideration. He failed to do so. He let the war be voted, then got out in the district talking about the war. If he wanted to save our boys, he should have acted on this matter in Congress. We pay him to act for us here. He did not act on this important matter.

Col. Roosevelt is not seeking because he did not get to go to France. He and all other great Republican leaders have been for months speaking and standing squarely behind America, and denouncing such men as La Follette, Powers and other men who are saying that this is not our war, and telling the America people in effect, that only certain people ought to pay to clothe, feed and support our soldiers.

Mr. Powers talks a great deal about his sympathy for the boys in the war, but what has he done? He is a rich man, and he has money to feed, clothe, and pay these boys.

After many years of acquaintance with Mr. Powers, we are forced to the conclusion that Powers is for Calah, and Calah is for Powers, first last and all the time. The people of Knox county have found this out, and Mr. Powers' strongest friends said that Judge Robison will defeat his overweening pride here.

We have been in several counties in the district, and have talked with a great many Power readers in the district, and they are feeling as we are, that we have done enough for Mr. Powers, and that we ought to select a man who will do something for us. If Mr. Robison runs, we think he will, there will be a landslide in August 1918. Mr. Robison is a man that cannot be ousted by Mr. Powers' statements that "He is stronger than he ever was."

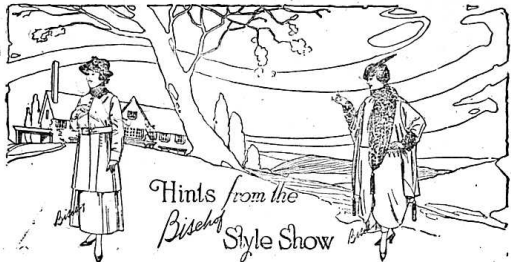

CONGRESSIONAL OUTLOOK

The following from the leading republican papers of their respective counties, would indicate that the present incumbent, Caleb Powers, will not have the republican nomination handed to him on a silver platter in 1918.

There has been a persistent rumor in the air that the coming Congressional race will not be a one man affair. We gather from the press of the state and especially from the press of the eleventh Congressional District that Judge J. M. Robison, of Barbourville, is the likely candidate to succeed Mr. Powers. While we have not heard directly from Mr. Robison himself we have a pretty strong inkling from the general aspect of political affairs that he may be "in the ring McDoodle." Altho we do not know whether he is to run or not we say, after due deliberation, in the event he does his opponent had better get busy at once and stay about his business pretty regular, or some thing will be doing that he won't like.

It may be that our present member "Smells a Rat" and is shooting through the "good old district" to take a peep at the political situation as well as to inform us on the outlook of the war and of his attitude on same. Mr. Robison is well acquainted and well liked throughout the district and should he run and be elected, as we believe he would be if he becomes a candidate nobody can say that we haven't a real live wire in Congress.

We predict an almost certain republican victory in the next Presidential Campaign and in that event and Robison in Congress our District would receive recognition to which it is entitled and even with the handicap of a Democratic Congress and President they would not say in the language of our old friend, G. V. Philpot, "We had as well write a letter as to have sent that feller".

Judge Robison is an eminent member of the Knox County Bar and was one of the delegates from this District to the Chicago convention which nominated Mr. Hughes. He is a republican of the first water and well qualified for the office. — Clay County Clarion.

We see in the last issue of "The Mountain Advocate," the paper as we all know that is issued in the home town of our present member of Congress, Mr. Caleb Powers, a very strong endorsement of Hon. J. M. Robison for the seat in Congress now held by Mr. Powers.

We have not the time just now to comment on the endorsement of that distinguished Lawyer, able Jurist, good citizen, openhearted Christian gentleman, whose ability throughout the State stands second to no man in his chosen profession, other than to praise and say "We most heartily endorse the sentiments contained in that Editorial and expect, if Mr. Robison enters the race, to throw the columns of The Corbin Times open to his interests, with our best wishes and most earnest efforts to forward his already great promises of success."

For many years in this portion of the State, Mr. Robison has been most favorably known at the Bar as an acknowledged leader; as a neighbor and friend he is always welcomed; to the poor and needy, his hands and purse are always open; to the Churches and Schools his reasonable friendship has been sought; not in vain, but answered with a liberality that is always appreciated.

We feel that the mantle of Congressional honor could find no shoulders that would better bear the burden than those of

lect that would more nearly bring Kentucky's past standard of greatness among her former Congressmen up to her old time level of respect from the whole Nation, than would J. M. Robison.

Mr. Powers, has handed to us for publication his announcement for Congress for the August 1918 primary, and it appears in this issue of the Advocate. The Editor of the Advocate has supported Mr. Powers for more than twenty years, both with money, his vote, and whatever influence he had. The Advocate has always stood squarely behind him, and we are getting old in his service, and we feel that before we die we would like to support some other good Republican at one time at least. We have come to the conclusion that Mr. Powers feels that he owes the Republican party, and will demand that it keep him in office with a salary top of about \$9000.00 a year, as long as he lives. We shall be forced to quit some time and we have decided that now is as good a time as any to quit. We have said to Mr. Powers several times that he ought to step aside and not ride his friends to death, and that the party had done enough for him, and that we could not conscientiously be for him any more but with all, he insists upon junking. We think that this early announcement and his participating thru the district this fall is done with the sole purpose to bluff some other good strong Republican in the district. The Advocate can not and will not support Mr. Powers in this race. When Mr. Powers was elected the second time he stated that he would not be a candidate any more, and he had the same talk the third and fourth time; and now he has made up his mind to disregard the wishes of his friends, and hold it until he is defeated, and in our judgement he will be defeated by a large majority this time. This is a great Republican district. It has great interests at stake. Mr. Powers' most ardent supporters concede that he is without influence at Washington, and has been ever since he has been there, not only with the Democrats, but with the Republicans likewise, and he has been unable to accomplish anything of importance for this district, and since he has taken his position against the Government as he has, he will have even less influence, if this could be possible in the future. Mr. Powers has been drawing about \$3000.00 a year for this district, and we are getting nothing in return. Looking at it from a plain common sense standpoint, we
