GOVERNOR JAMES D. BLACK, of Bourbonville made a rousing speech to a large and enthusiastic audience last Saturday at Richmond, in opening his campaign for the Democratic nomination for Governor. I would have no end to subservience beyond that of giving to the people a clean, business-like administration of affairs along lines of economy and industry. I would not want or have any need of any political machine. I am not a politician and am unacquainted with the ways of the politician. The political mousetrap and I have nothing in common. While I am wholly unacquainted with his tricks and the shady road he goes, I know him and his ways well enough to avoid him and his snares. I am one of the plain folks and my friends are those who want honest government, and believe I would do right. The wily politicians are not for me. They do not trust me, for they know they cannot control me. I belong to no faction. I belong to the people."

The demand for the construction of a pike from Mt. Vernon to Somerset is daily growing. Judge Cam Mullins is taking the lead in this important matter and Judge Tarter, who presides over the County Court of Pulaski and who is an advocate of good roads, is heartily co-operating with our Judge in solving this important problem. That a pike should be built along the most direct route with the best grade obtainable all will agree. It will go through one of the very best farming sections of Rockcastle and would in a few years pay for itself. The farmers are waking up to the absolute necessity of having better roads and will unite with the two courts in planning and financing the cost of its construction. The Signal recognizes the great benefit to be derived from carrying out such a plan and we believe that the Fiscal Courts of the two counties, with the help of the people, will be able to accomplish this important task.

In days gone by, when state and district conventions were held, very much to our shame, no one ever appeared as a delegate from Rockcastle. But things have greatly changed and very much to our credit. Last week the State Christian Endeavor Convention was held in Winchester, where the State Sunday School Convention was going on in Lan-

caster. At Lexington at the same time a political convention was in session. To all of these great gatherings Rockcastle had a large number of delegates, who not only attended but were active in the various doings of each. This proves how rapidly Rockcastle is advancing and the good influence she will exert. The Signal is proud to proclaim this new era of progress and feels confident that as time goes on the delegates will grow in numbers and expense in useful work in the convention.

Many people here and elsewhere rejoice to know that the members of the Christian Church are seriously considering the construction of a new church building in Mt. Vernon. Throughout the whole country the construction of new church buildings has been going on and many beautiful structures have gone up as a result. This is a much needed improvement in Mt. Vernon and it is greatly hoped that one will be built which will be an everlasting monument to the membership of the church as well as an ornament to this community.

What are the "City Dads" doing? As officers of this town, they should be studying and planning something to improve the look and meet the demands of this community. We believe the people of our town deserve better and more modern things and should show the world that Mt. Vernon is made up of aggressive, high-minded and up-to-date business people, who are daily advancing the community morally, intellectually and commercially.

ROCKCASTLE CIRCUIT COURT

May Term, 1919

THE COMMONWEALTH vs. Plaintiff
vs. Judgment on Demurrer
To Indictments.

Boyd Kelly, John A. Ward, G. W. Smith, Moses Burkhardt, Bradley Burkhardt, Ewell King, Dwight Face, Lloyd Middleton, Pearl Noe, George Dean, Wright Wynne and Joe White, Defendants.

Came this day into open court the defendants, John A. Ward, G. W. Smith, Moses Burkhardt, Bradley Burkhardt, Ewell King, Lloyd Middleton, Pearl Noe, George Dean, Wright Wynne and Joe White, in custody of Tip Langford, the sheriff of Rockcastle County, defendants being arrested and brought into court upon the charge of the murder of Lather Shipman. The said defendants being in custody of the court by counsel, L. W. Bethurum, C. C. Williams and W. F. Hall, appeared and under protest filed and entered their demurrer in the indictment and the court hearing read the indictment and having heard the argument of counsel for the Commonwealth and for the defendants and being now advised upon the matters of law arising upon the indictment against the demurrer in, John A. Ward, G. W. Smith, Moses Burkhardt, Bradley Burkhardt, Ewell King, Lloyd Middleton, Pearl Noe, George Dean, Wright Wynne and Joe White, is sustained and the Commonwealth not desiring to refer the said indictment to the Grand Jury the said indictment is dismissed and the said defendants are ordered and adjudged to be discharged from custody. To all of which ruling of the Court the Commonwealth's Attorney being in court and not objecting thereto it is ordered by the court that the said Boyd Kelly be, and he is, hereby allowed to execute bond in the sum of three thousand (\$3,000.00) dollars, for his appearance in the Rockcastle Circuit Court to answer said indictment on the 2nd day of its next August Term, 1919, until which time this case as against Boyd Kelly is continued.

RHEA RETIERS

Slaughtered in the house of his supposed friends, Hon. Thomas S. Rhea has withdrawn from the gubernatorial contest. When it was noted abroad that Perc Haly and Senator Beckham had split in their advocacy of candidates, Beckham being for Rhea and Haly for Denhardt, we felt that the house divided against itself could not stand and that a contest would have to get out Haly's backing being regarded as paramount to Beckham's the question was easy of decision. It is said that in order to accomplish his ends Gen Haly gave wide publicity to the charge that Rhea was also the candidate of Governor Stanley and followers, believing that it would be a hand cap. This is the way the situation looked till Mr Rhea issued a statement denying the allegations and saying that they were no only not true but that he quit over the protests of his supporters, whose loyalty is as great as over a man possessed. His reason for withdrawing he says is because he did not want to engage in a factional fight within the party and he would not. A good many supporters will regret his decision as Mr Rhea is held in high esteem by both alleged fac-

tions of the party, which he has done much to unite. The question of how his following will line up is now engaging the politicians, some claiming that Judge Carroll will be the beneficiary and others that Gov. Black will fall heir to most of it. Rumor has it that Beckham will get behind the chief justices and Stanley will be for Black. It is also rumored that Dr. Alexander, of the Democratic Forward League, will announce for lieutenant with Col. Denhardt, which may or may not add to the latter's strength. Things political are warming up and we look for them to be at fever heat before long.—Interior Journal.

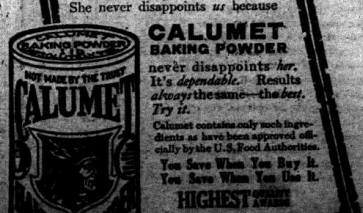
