NOTICE

AN ACT FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF THE PUBLIC HIGHWAYS OF THIS COMMONWEALTH.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, that:
1. That it shall be the duty of every owner, controller, and manager of lands bordering and abutting on the public highways of this Commonwealth for the distance which said land so abuts and borders, when so ordered by the Fiscal Court of his county, to cut, clear away, remove and carry from along side the public highways, all brush, weeds, stubs, and overhanging limbs of trees and other such obstructions along such highways and to keep all hedge fences along such highways so trimmed and cut back, that same, at no time, will become more than five feet high.

2. The brush, bushes, weeds, overhanging limbs of trees, and all other obstructions along the highways of the several counties of this commonwealth are to be removed therefrom between the first day of July and the next day of August of every year, and it shall be the duty of the county road engineer of the several counties of this commonwealth to publish in some county paper of the county in which they act, that it is legal and compulsory upon the owners of the highways of every year, to give notice by handbills posted in not less than ten conspicuous places in each such product of their

METHODISTS SHOULD GATHER NEW ZEAL

Centenary an Inspiration Says Dr. Fisher.

Dr. Fred Fisher of New York, who has been assistant executive secretary of the Methodist Centenary pageant, which will be presented at the Methodist Centenary celebration in Columbus, O., June 20 to July 13. He is outlining the campaign he has placed before 73,000 communicants of the Methodist Church, he says: "We must stress four things. First, this will be a big Victory Celebration. The Methodists of the United States have lived more in the past year than in any 10 previous years of their existence. Now is the time for them to get together and celebrate their victory."

"In the second place, this is an opportunity for Methodists to have visualized the scenes and activities of which they have been talking for so long a past year, but of which they have no personal knowledge. Of these 73,000 men, only a negligible per cent have ever had the opportunity of going abroad. At the celebration they can get the trip around the world at their own expense."

"Third, this is the time to finish the job to gather inspiration and information to enable the organized workers in the church to carry out the program which has been mapped out for the next four years. "Fourth, and most important of all, if the Celebration realizes the ideals which those who are back of it hold, it must be the inspiration for planning for the next century. As we look upon the marvels that have been accomplished we should gather inspiration to meet the new century, that can be measured only in terms of another century. We must, in a word, weld ourselves together in a great spiritual purpose to strike the bell's even."

Louisville, Ky., June 9.—(Special)—With the help of the city Artillery of Inspiration of the American Legion of Kentucky, the first formation in the formation of a great association of veterans of the world was in this state was taken. At the same time, Judge Henry DeWolfe, State Treasurer, following a meeting of the State Executive Council, announced that Kentucky has received its charter from the National Executive Committee of the American Legion and that the state is now in a position to receive applications and to issue charters to new units.

As the various local organizations formed at Columbus, Ky., are awaiting detailed information before actually forming, Judge Mooreman announced that a committee containing the names of the various organizations, and a list of the names of the members, is being prepared. It is desired, according to Judge Mooreman, that every cent of the money be for the benefit of the members.

"Filing of the Articles of Incorporation is expected to be completed in this part of the state, as the articles embody the broad statement of policy embraced by the constitution of the National Constitution. 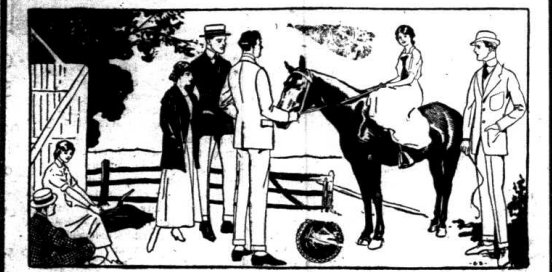

SUGGESTIONS TO SHIPPERS OF HOGS DURING HEATED SEASON.

I desire to call your attention to the suggestion from Mr. O. B. Livingston, of Madisonville, Kentucky, as to how he has been able to reduce shrinkage on hogs when shipping during hot weather. He stated: "Three times during the heated term of this summer, in oak lots, I have reduced the shrinkage at least 50 percent by the simple expedient of piping in back car with the hogs, three or four pipes of ice, upon the floor of the car at equal intervals. This ice costs 50 cents per 100 pounds or 80¢ per 100 lbs. but can be saved by its use in preventing shrinkage in the weight of hogs."

Try this simple suggestion for what it is worth. It may save you many dollars.

MEMBERS of both Senate and
House who have been advocating
permanent government owner-
ship of railroads are now begin-
ning to "draw in their horns" a
bit, due to the disclosure of fig-
ures showing how some of the
taxpayers' money has been spent
and is still going out to the
railroads in a seemingly never-
ending stream. Some surprising
figures have been dug up by
the investigating committees. In
the Senate it was brought out
that there are 150,000 more em-
ployees on the payrolls of the
railroads under government man-
agement than there were before,
so naturally the question is asked
as to how many more there will
be if Uncle keeps the train
wheels turning for years to come.
When the railroads were first
taken over, the idea was to cut
out the high salaries of railroad
presidents and other high rail-

road officials, and the talk was all
toward economy; but among the
figures that have come to light it
is shown that on the staff of the
director general of railroads there
are five officials who get \$50,000
a year each, two who receive
\$35,000 and so on down through
seventy-two officials, who draw
nearly \$1,500,000. These figures
startled Senators when compar-
ison was made with the amount
received by them in salaries.
Undoubtedly the pruning knife
will soon be cut deep into the
operation of the railroads, unles-
s all signs at the Capitol Building
fail.

In response to widespread
criticism, the War Department
has at last yielded to the clamor
that the public be given a chance
to purchase the huge meat sur-
plus bought for the use of the
army, but now no longer needed.
Circular letters are going out to
every canned goods and meat
dealer and to all State, municipal
and charitable institutions, offer-
ing the 143,000,000 pounds of
canned meat now on hand. In-
dividuals are to be permitted to
purchase small lots at the sup-
ply stores in Chicago, Baltimore
and Columbus, Ohio; also at other
places where the surplus is
stored. It was the original idea
of the War Department to keep
this meat off the market so as to
prevent a break in prices, but
the storm of protest, finally led
by Senators and Representatives
was too strong, and now the pub-
lic is to benefit.

The only thing that the politi-
cal enemies of Gov. Jas. D. Black

N.R.R. to give Bill Tye a pass

"I WAS there—at Verdun—in Octo-
ber, 1918—and the Salvation

"We'd been in the front line 86 hours.
We had moved so fast our kitchens
were lost and had no 'chow.' 'Zero
hour' was set for 5:30 next morning.
We 'went over,' and after three hours
in No Man's Land a machine gun bullet
got me in the leg.

"Litter bearers of Co. I, 127th Infantry,
picked me up. On the way back, before
we reached the first aid regimental
dressing station, they put the litter on
the ground, just behind our old front
line, and a Salvation Army man gave
me doughnuts, good hot coffee and
cigarettes. And, let me tell you, high
explosive and gas shells were falling
mighty thick around us!

"It was the first food I'd had in 39
hours. The pain was fierce, and I was
bleeding a lot. The doughnuts, coffee
and smokes did more than simply put
new life into me. The Salvation Army
was my best bet.

"As I lay on the litter waiting for the am-
bulance all I could think of was how good the
coffee and smokes tasted—my own tobacco
was too bloody to smoke.

"All of us knew the Salvation Army was
behind us. They were real folks, and we
knew we wouldn't have to ask for help if
we needed it. We knew we could count on
them, and believe me, it kept up our spirits.

"I sure wish I could get out and root for the
Salvation Army and tell you about them in-
stead of writing."
