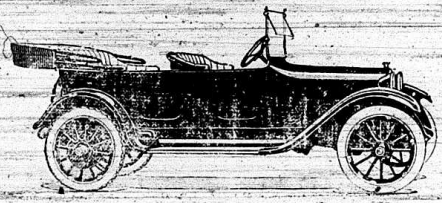

These four railroad bartheods are again asking more money of threatening to strike. They are asking big increases in pay for several hundred thousand men and yet the railroads cannot make enough money to pay them at the exorbitant freight and passenger rates which are being charged. They are also asking that the government take permanent control of roads, and there is no telling what else they will want. Railroad men are the best paid men we have to day and yet they are not satisfied. If the spirit of Bolshevism is not being manifested by railroad men it is certainly something that is very close akin. Ex-President Wm. Howard Taft, who has shown himself to be one of the big men of our country, and who has at all ways been fighting for the right, regardless of political, religious or civic conditions says of the unwarranted and unpatriotic request:

"In regard to the railroad men's proposition to congress to buy the roads and turn them over to the unions, former President Taft takes a firm stand against it as socialism run wild and says that such Soviet designs should be brought to a finish in this country which has no place for such movements."

In his address to congress, proposing remedies to check the high cost of living, the president said

that existing laws were made and promulgated that were not intended to be circumvented. He pointed out that the law provided with substantial penalties for profiteering, and that a good remedy lay in passing limiting the time on each storage and shipment of goods that did not comply with the provisions be excluded from interstate or intrastate transportation. All goods should be marked with the price printed on labels, they would not be stored and the price when they left the producer and a federal system of licensing corporations engaging in interstate commerce be adopted, which would insure competition and prevent unreasonable prices.

of marketing. He maintained that the high prices were not justified by the shortage of supply present or prospective but were created in many cases by speculation and deliberately by various practices. The law of supply and demand no longer cuts any figure in the present situation. He expressed with the desire to fast prices without regard to reason.

The president reminded his hearers that the problem of the high cost of living could not be solved alone by legislative or administrative action, that the producer, the manufacturer, the retailer and other handlers of food, stiffs and merchandise can help in the solution by honest and fair dealing and not try to get all they can at the expense of the general public, which should be guarded against such practices. He said that such practices only make matters worse and the settlement of grievances can be made while men are in a temper and unwilling to consider the general interest.

The speaker also gave the senate a job by saying that it was in a measure responsible for the general unrest, by leaving up the ratification of the treaty and adding to the movement of light that now disturbs the world and, he urged it to promptly ratify it and the league of nations and thereby not only establish peace but insure the means by which peace may be maintained. If the sen-

ate will do this and congress let it go in all things. To up- hold the law is a duty. The most serious thing about the law is that the Federal Government shall come to the aid of the large measure of the country and give his list of goods that are to be put in the hands of the people. The law, any one failing to comply with this law, will be fined not exceeding \$1000. I am asking you to come in and work with me. My name will be placed on a list of the best of the people. C. T.
