Third Roll Call November 2-11

CAMPAIGN MANAGER ANNOUNCES DIVISION ROLL CALL QUOTA

The Red Cross Third Roll Call aims to sign up 2,490,000 Red Cross members for Red Cross service in 1920, according to an announcement made at Lake Division Headquarters today by Mackenzie R. Todd, campaign manager for Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky. Chapters in Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky, which number 347, have been supplied with campaign material from division headquarters in preparation for the November 2-11 drive for Universal Membership.

Each chapter has sent an order for 70,000 buttons over the number assigned; the chapter by division headquarters. Toledo has produced 90,000 at least and Dayton is counting on enrolling at least 63,000 members. Anshel has written Mr. Todd asking for double last year's quota. To date 56 of the 108 Ohio chapters—50 of the 144 Kentucky chapters and 69 of the 108 Indiana chapters have appointed special roll call trustees to conduct local campaigns for members. 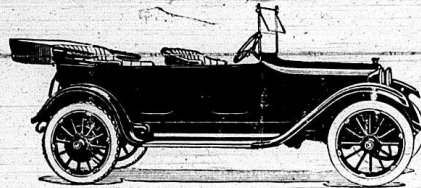

MOON SHINE STILL DESTROYED

Judge Cam Mullins and deputy sheriff, W. G. Niceley made a raid in the eastern part of the county last week and destroyed a still, one kettle and about three hundred gallons of beer. This was found on Power Mill branch, on the waters of Horse Lick creek, near Cruise Post Office. If the people who call themselves good citizens would assist the officers, the whiskey business would be a thing of the past in this county. But instead of helping the officers and backing them up, they are criticising them. Those who know anything say, be sure not to use my name, as I would be killed or burned out. Those who write letters have not got back bone enough to sign their names. God pity the man or woman who has not enough manhood or womanhood to sign his name, backing up his talk. From now on, when I get a letter without a name signed to, I am going to have it printed in the county paper. I have a letter in my possession now with no name signed to it. I will give the party who wrote it ten dollars (10.00) to sign his name to it. God pity the neighborhood with such citizens. I have had to send men to jail for contempt of court, to make them tell the truth. But the man who will talk about the officers not doing their duty, and at the same time is so cowardly that he will get behind the curtain and criticize the other fellow, is not worthy of any consideration. I have done all in my power to enforce the law since I have been in office and the good citizens of the county know it. The records of my office show this. Now, Mr. Citizen, what is your record? What have you done to assist the officers to enforce the law? Ask yourself the question, how many times have I gone to the officers of my county and told them of the violations of law that I know about? The county was organized and a committee appointed in each voting precinct, the members of which pledged themselves to report all violations of law to the officers. How many reports have you made? You can see that without your help the officers can do nothing. I hope that the good citizens in all parts of the county will stand behind the officers in the enforcement of the law. If you will, the violations of the whiskey law will cease in less than thirty days. No county can make good progress without good citizens.

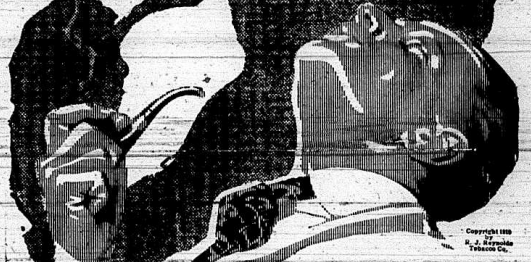

George L. Schon, superintendent of the Kentucky Children's Home Society, says that the success of the campaign will be a group of cottages on a farm ten miles from Louisville. This will provide wholesome surroundings for the children, and the duties connected with the management of the farm will give excellent training to the older children in the care of the Kentucky Children's Home Society. "It is not only a good, charitable cause, but a sound business investment," Mr. Schon said. "Instead of the constant yearly drain to provide for the Kentucky children that come into our care, we will have a group of ground upon which to raise produce, which will more than pay the cost of the food supplies. The Old Fellows' Home at Eunice, Ky., which cultivates thirty-seven acres of ground, raises more food than it consumes and there is a surplus to apply to other expenses."

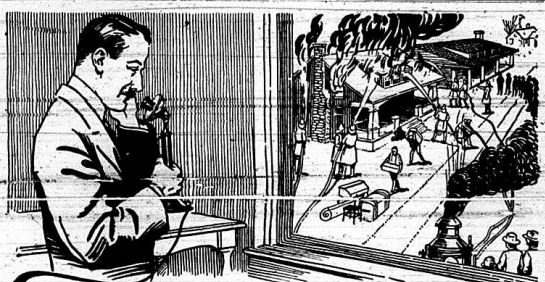
