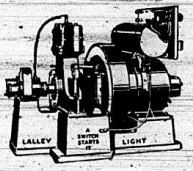

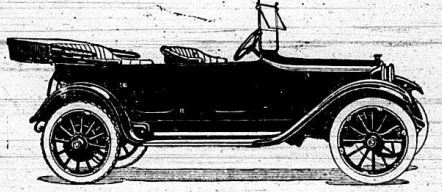

AMERICANS GIVE CHURCH TO VILLAGE OF CANTIGNY

Cantigny, France, Nov. 4.—This village where the American troops first "went over the top" in earnest after the Germans the first of the many towns and villages the American army liberated for France, will soon have a new church on the premises which will appear the inscription "Gift of the American people."

Until it is possible to restore the old stone edifice, the church will be located in one of the American Red Cross huts. The first ceremony to be celebrated there will be the marriage of the daughter of the mayor of Cantigny.

"DRYS" CARRIED STATE BY 10717

Frankfort, Ky., Nov. 24.—State-wide prohibition carried in Kentucky by 10,717. The vote on the amendment stood: Yes 208,352; No 98,038.

Amendment No. 1, that providing for the removal of peace officers who allow prisoners to be taken from them by mobs, carried by 26,247 majority. The vote was: Yes, 88,674; No, 42,130.

Throughout Maine and other northern potato producing States harvest is now on full blast. As the northern potato crop is below normal, both in acreage and yield, specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture recommend that the southern planters stock up immediately on seed potatoes for next spring's plantings. Such activity on the part of the southern growers not only will assure them of the necessary seed but also will enable them to secure high-producing, disease free seed selected in the field at harvest time.

FRENCH LIKE AMERICAN CANNING

France—the land where every one is supposed to be a good cook—likes American methods of home canning.

Four home-demonstration workers were lent to France by the United States Department of Ag-

riculture in June. They were to give demonstrations in the methods of home canning which have proved popular in the United States during the past decade. Their work in France has been attended with marked success. The first series of demonstrations were concluded early in August and the second was started.

In the first series the work, as planned by the minister of Agriculture and carried out by the Americans, was the teaching of Agricultural leaders, who in turn will teach the French people. Among those who attended this first series were four directors of agricultural colleges, two chiefs, one inspector general from the ministry of agriculture, 21 professors from different agricultural colleges, four wounded French officers, the wives of some of the professors, one dietitrician, and two teachers of higher schools—all one room in all.
