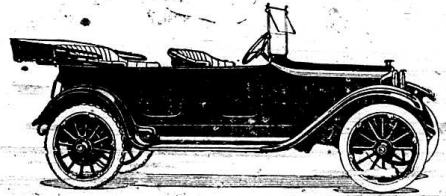

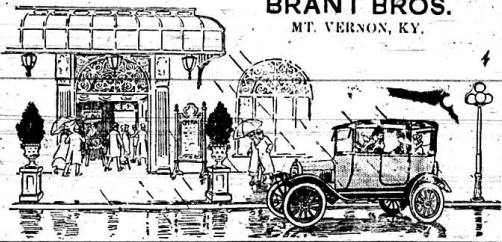

## Judge Clay Retention for Court of Appeals

Judge William Rogers Clay, Commissioner of the Court of Appeals has been widely and favorably mentioned in his district as the successor of Judge John D. Carroll, of New Castle, who will retire from the appellate bench at the end of his present term. Judge Clay is a loyal alumnus of Transylvania College, a graduate of its old Law School.

## Comparison of Prices

A most people seem to think that clothes prices are high. Measured in the number of dollars it takes to purchase a suit, they are. But measured in the prices of things which the producer has to sell, or in the wages paid for service performed they are no higher than they were before the war. In many instances, as a matter of fact, they are not so high.

Compare clothes prices, for instance, with that of corn, the great American money crop. In 1914 the Iowa farmer had to haul fifty bushels of corn to market in order to get the money to pay for a \$25 suit of clothes. Now he can get \$60. suit and a \$100 pair of shoes for his fifty bushels of corn.

"It may be that he doesn't haul corn to market feeds it to his hogs. On December 30, 1914, he had to sell four hundred pounds of hogs at the top price of the Chicago market he came within \$13 of receiving the money to buy a \$60. suit and there have been low periods in the last two years when he would have gotten from \$80. to \$95. for his four hundred pounds of hogs.

"If, on December 30th, 1914, he marketed a thousand pounds of corn-fed steer at the top price of the Chicago market he got \$91.50

## LACK OF HORSES IS MOST SERIOUS

PRODUCTION OF THOROUGHBRED BREDS MUST BE ENCOURAGED.

PRESENT SUPPLY IS SHORT

Army Would Need One Animal for Every Two Men Should We Be Called Upon to Engage in Military Operation.

Some loss of the magnitude of the task of the Remount Board of the United States army in organizing and maintaining a horse breeding and supply agency for the reserve forces of national defense may be had by a study of the reports of the remount officers of the Army for the period of 1917-1918. It was found in France that the old theory that the proportion of horse strength to man strength in armies should be two to five was erroneous. One horse for every two men was the correct proportion.

## NOTICE OF WARNING

To The People of Rockcastle County:

Those who have dogs which have not been tagged for the year 1920, are subject to a fine and imprisonment in the county jail. As the County Judge I will be forced to issue warrants for those who fail to get the proper tags and shall regret very much to do so. The owner who has the opinion that the old tags will do, are under the wrong impression. Each dog must be listed and a new tag issued for that dog each year. The Assessor has listed over 1500 dogs and the law makes it a heavy fine upon the sheriff if he sees a dog not properly tagged or knows of any owner of harboring a dog which has not been properly listed, he does not promptly arrest the dog and report the owner to the court, whose duty it is forthwith to issue a warrant of arrest for such person.

## SHERRIFF'S NOTICE

Each dog must be licensed or the sheriff will be forced to comply with the law, to arrest the owner and kill the dog. There is a fine of from \$10 to \$100 for each unlicensed dog. The sheriff is also subject to a fine of \$25 if he allows a dog to go without being licensed. If I do not have to be forced to enforce this law, I will not have to do so.

## DEDICATION Of Dixie Highway

Charles R. Hall, of the Chicago Motor club, arrived in Chattanooga Friday afternoon to confer with V. D. L. Robinson, of the Dixie Highway association, concerning the Chicago club's participation in the dedication of the eastern or western division of the Dixie highway in the fall of 1920.

DEDICATION NEXT SEPTEMBER.

It is the plan of the Dixie highway officials to have the dedication exercises some time in the early part of September, 1920, and dedicate the division that is completed by that time. A committee from the association will give out routes about thirty days before the exercises and determine which one is to be decided which shall be dedicated. If both the eastern and western divisions are completed by this time and are in good condition, a loop will be made over both routes and both divisions will be dedicated.

Members of automotole clubs throughout the country which the Dixie highway traverses will be organized for the occasion, and at a given time automobilists from the different points will start out over the Dixie highway going over the division that is to be dedicated, and a big meeting will be held at some place in Kentucky or Tennessee.

200 CHICAGO CARS TO COME.

In speaking further of Chicago's plan in the program Mr. Hall said that on Friday, that the Chicago people have already pledged 200 cars. In addition to the governor of Illinois and the mayor of Chicago, a number of prominent officials have expressed their willingness to go on the trip. The United States government has assured through the use of at least three government trucks, with wireless telephone and telegraphic equipment. They have also made arrangements with a large tent concern to make provisions at the various places where they are to stop each night to establish a regular tent city. They will furnish tents, cots and all necessary equipment. Hall also said that they have arranged for a rather unique part of the management of the trip. A motor club in each of the states will be elected each day and placed in charge of all arrangements. Health officers will be on hand at each stop. Plans will be run after the same plan as a city government. They have arranged to set apart one day during which the trucks will be placed in complete charge. Many other special features are being worked out by the club.

The American Bankers' Association has compiled and published the experiences of one hundred men who are successful in a considerable number of typical American men. The analysis gives some very interesting information, though this information may have a tendency to cause the average individual to shudder, as being those one hundred men as a basis the analysis shows that after a man reaches the age of 35 the likelihood of his success increases very rapidly from year to year. In other words, his chance for making a marvellous success becomes less and less very rapidly after reaching the age of 35.

Briefly the analysis as follows:  
At age 22: 100 men all strong and vigorous with good mental and physical capacity.

At age 35: 5 have died; 10 are wealthy; 10 are in good circumstances; 40 have moderate means; 35 have saved nothing.

At age 45: 16 have died; 3 are wealthy; 65 are self supporting but without resources; 16 are no longer self supporting.

At age 55: 20 have died; 1 very wealthy; 3 are in good circumstances; 40 are self supporting, but without means; 20 are dependent on children, relatives or charity for support.

At age 65: 36 have died; 1 very wealthy; 3 are wealthy; 6 supporting by labor; 54 are dependent on children, relatives or charity for support.

At age 75: 4 are dead; 10 those left are in good circumstances; 43 are dependent on children, relatives or charity for support; 95 per cent of these will not have sufficient means to defray funeral expenses.

In spite of all promising economy and thrift are not common qualities. The large majority of men insist on living up to the end of their lives. The success of those incomes. Such a thing is hard thing, yet so-called nine times out of ten is the secret of substantial success.
