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COUNTY AGENT NEWS

It will be remembered that a few weeks ago several farmers and business men went before the Rockcastle Fiscal Court and asked them to make an appropriation of \$5,000 to pay for keeping a County Agricultural Agent in Rockcastle another year from July 1st next. This matter was turned down flat by the Fiscal Court on two occasions, once in October and again in November.

Several progressive farmers and business men got together and formed the Rockcastle Agricultural Association, and the members of this Association have been active since that time to raise the funds necessary to keep a County Agent in this county another year. At a meeting held at the Peoples Bank about two weeks ago it was decided that if the people of Mt. Vernon would raise half the amount the rest of the county ought to raise the balance if the people really want a County Agent. Mt. Vernon's \$250 is ready and there is about \$80. more money on deposit which has been contributed by persons living in the county, so there remains now a balance of about \$170. to be raised by the people of the county to insure a County Agent for another year.

LAKE DIVISION FINANCIER ATTENDS GENEVA COUNCIL OF THE RED CROSS LEAGUE

APPOINTMENT of five American delegates to the first meeting of the General Council, League of the Red Cross Societies, is announced by the American Red Cross today. The delegates are: Willoughby O. Walling, of Chicago, vice-chairman of the Central Committee of the American Red Cross; Otis H. Curtis, of New York, former manager of the Insular and Foreign Division; Mrs. Wm. K. Draper, vice-chairman of New York County Chapter and formerly chairman of the Women's Auxiliary of the American Red Cross of Cleveland, former member of the Central Committee; and Eliot Wadsworth of Boston, member of the Central Committee.

Henry P. Davison, formerly chairman of the War Council of the American Red Cross, chairman of the Board of Delegates, will accompany the delegates, when they sail on the steamer "Lafayette" next Wednesday. Mr. Davison is the present chairman of the board when the League of Red Cross Societies was formed at a meeting of delegates from all America and other principal Allied nations last spring. The meeting, which will open in Geneva, Switzerland, and will continue up under our trials and crosses within a few days of being reunited with them to part no more. 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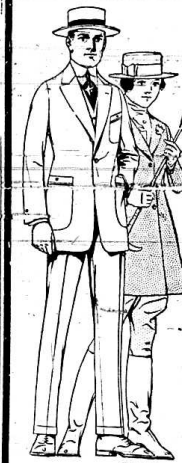

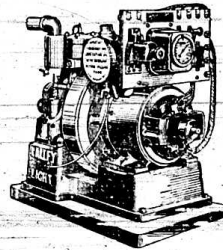

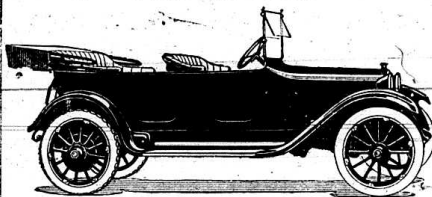
