DEATH OF A GOOD WOMAN.

Her life had been given unselfishly to her home and family and her devotion had been appreciated. The tender devotion of her aged husband and six sons to her was very beautiful. A short and impressive funeral service was held at the Baptist church on Saturday afternoon, attended by a goodly number of those who knew, honored and loved her. She was buried in the cemetery at Mt. Vernon, her six stalwart sons acting as the pall bearers who bore the body of their mother to its last resting place.

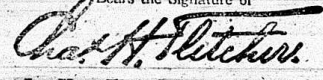

SMALL POX SITUATION IN MT. VERNON

Judge Mullins had a letter from the State Board of Health on Friday in which the Fiscal Court was warned that the county would be quarantined if the local authorities did not handle the situation. To quarantine the county would mean that no trains would stop in the county. No mail would come in or go out. A state guard would be placed on each road leading out and no one would be permitted to come in or leave. The state authorities would take control, but at the expense of the county. A meeting was called composed of the Town Board, Doctors, members of the Fiscal Court and citizens. An order was issued forbidding any child to attend school who could not produce a certificate of vaccination. The same order would apply to the Picture Show, Sunday schools, Churches, and other public indoor gatherings. The patients and homes are all quarantined. The local authorities seem to have the situation well in hand today. An exaggerated report of the situation at Mt. Vernon has been made by someone. The facts are that we do not have more than nine cases in the town. If you have been vaccinated, go to your doctor and get a certificate.

50 Akron Boy Scouts

Make Extended Pilgrimage

Fifty of Akron's Boy Scouts will make an automobile pilgrimage to the grave of Theodore Roosevelt at Oyster Bay, L. I., on July 1 to pay homage to "The Great American" and all that his ideals, courage and spirit of adventure stood for in the minds of the youths of America.

At the shrine of the lion-hearted American, the memory of whom will never dim, the scouts will hold a short service and pay silent tribute to the great leader of men whose life was an inspiration to the youth of the land.

The third annual trip to be given by the Boy Scouts by the Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company, will begin on June 26 and end on July 10. Selection of the 50 boys will be made within the next two months at a field day when various scout troops in Akron will designate their best scouts to take a competitive test of the scout work. The 50 who rank highest will be chosen to make the pilgrimage.

Unlike last year, the trip will cover an entirely different section of country. The big, pneumatically cushioned trucks from the company's Akron-Boston freight line will carry the boys 90 miles a day, with four hours travel in the morning and two and a half in the afternoon. This is to

avoid fatigue and to allow time for a relaxation each day. From the trucks will travel to Pittsburgh, Bedford, West Chester, Philadelphia and New York, with stopover at Oyster Bay. Perhaps the most pleasant and eagerly anticipated part of the trip will be the three-day stop at the national Boy Scout camp at Bear Mountain near West Point, N. Y. Here the boys will mingle with associates from other sections of the country and get acquainted with them in all letters and make new acquaintance.

On July 2 the return will be started by way of Goshen, Elmira, Avon, Buffalo and Niagara Falls, where the boys will be allowed time to view the mighty waterfall.
