To the People of Rockcastle County

In the Interior Journal, dated of October 5, 1920, under the caption of "No Deference Shown Democrats," the editor of that paper undertakes to create the impression that the Republican Election Commissioners of Rockcastle county, willfully, maliciously and deliberately perpetrated a great crime when they appointed twenty-one Republican women as Election Officers in Rockcastle County.

"Due," the editor says, "to a desire to always take advantage and do small things." The editor further says, "Not a single democratic woman was appointed in the entire county." That paper nor its editor seems to know nothing whatever of the State laws relating to the appointment of Election Officers. Now in order that the editor may better inform himself, we would suggest that he read Section 1596A Sub-section 3, of Kentucky Statutes. This law will explain to him just how election officers are appointed.

The County Executive Committee of the Republican party, of Rockcastle County, filed with the Board of Election Commissioners the names of persons wanted appointed as election officers to hold the Election, November 2, 1920, as the law provides. In that list of names were the names of twenty-one of our very best women. They were appointed, as the law requires, and will serve with credit to themselves and to the people of Rockcastle County.

The executive committee of the Democratic party, who were appointed to represent the democrats at the polls as Election Officers. Now, Mr. Editor, each and every person named by the democratic committee was duly appointed to serve. Mr. Wanker Owens the Chairman of the Democratic party in Rockcastle, through Mr. W. G. McRee, the Democratic member of the Board of Election Commissioners for Rockcastle County furnished the names of Democrats whom they wanted to serve. We appointed each and every person they named—not an argument over a single person. Satisfactory to the Chairman and Election Commissioner for the democrats in Rockcastle County and satisfactory to ourselves.

It is very clear to us that, if the Executive Committee of the Democrats had wanted women for election Officers they would have submitted their names. We, the Republican members of the Board of Election Commissioners would have been

only too glad to have agreed with the Democratic member of the Board of Election Commissioners and appointed women for the Democrats if they had given us the opportunity. The Democrats seemed not to have wanted women, and of course, we could only appoint those the Executive Committees of both parties asked for. The Republicans of Rockcastle county have always stood for woman suffrage and will continue to stand for and recognize them in every possible way. We want each and every woman in Rockcastle County, the State of Kentucky, and the Nation to go to the polls on the second day of next month and cast her vote for the nominees of the party of her choice.
