Rockcastle county is looked up by the traveling public to be a mass of rock covered now and then with a scrubby timber in the home of birds and rabbit.

All tourists pass through, over the Dixie Highway with many thrilling experiences. Scalford Cane Hill (Madison County side) is the red mud on the Scalford Cane Ridge Pike Hill to Livingston and Galesy Mountain. The women can be heard to say, Oh, isn't it just grand, wonderful. Look at the beautiful hills covered with ferns. I'd just like to roam in these hills the rest of my life. See the little cabin. Isn't it beautiful with that hill covered with rocks and cedars as a background. Look at that little artificial stream. These people ought to be the happiest people on earth, located here in these uncontaminated hills with fresh air and pure water. The men often say to the women, let me alone and go on with your looking, or we will all be spilled over the cliff. If this is the Dixie Highway I don't want to see the other side. In this county, if I ever get thru this time I'll never try it again.

A common question, "How far is it to London and how do you get out of this town?" Frank Dees is heard to say, Seven miles to London—Go back to the other end of town and turn to your right across the bridge and over Galesy Rockcastle County is a mass of rocks, limestone, the foundation of a good soil, covered with dirt, generally good, and so is the home birds, and rabbits which are the best friends to man.

Scalford Cane Hill is rough, Scalford Cane Ridge is sticky, Pine Hill to Livingston is rocky, Galesy steep, but there are little holes to be made and the hills are to be directed to the north. In the mountains in these hills, besides the crooked trees.

Readers of Signal:

After seeing an account of W. H. Fish and families' trip to Chicago I thought maybe some reader might be interested in our trip from Brodhead, Ky., to Woodrow, Fla. We left my home on the bank our way back, Mrs. Albright and myself left Brodhead, August 20th, and indeed safe and sound in Woodrow, Fla., September 2, one week from day we started. We made the trip without a puncture and only one blow out, this being caused by top being all greasy for free air and filling the tube too full. We were very anxious to make the entire trip without any tire trouble and came very near to the Florida line before we did, only about three miles from the line when blow out took place—a distance of 900 miles we crossed on the road and sure did enjoy this part of the trip fine.

At this time of the year is mid season, like December and January at home. But now that the truck gardeners begin planting for winter vegetables. The oranges are not yet ripe, but will be in about fifteen days.

There are some fine groves in this part of the State and those who have them are wise enough to have them are a very independent life—coal mine at home.

Lee county 100 by 40 miles and Woodrow is on the Atlantic Coast line. The road is very fine. South-east in the County is the Everglades and the big Cypress Swamps. We are one and a half miles from the Clinchatcha river where the first in the County can be found. We have been fishing several times. One day we took our lunch and spent the day. Our entire party this day caught about 50 pounds of fish, top catching about 100 lbs. pounds of these fish. The weather was very fine. We have made several good friends and the people are perfectly grand to us.
