Four per cent normal tax on payable income up to \$4,000 in excess of exemption eight per cent normal tax on balance of taxable income. Surplus taxes for 1920, 1921, per cent on net incomes over \$4,000

Statement of the Financial Condition of Rockcastle County Prepared and Compiled by S. F. Bowman, County Court Clerk

Orders of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court which show the outstanding warrants against the County on the 29th day of December, 1920:

ROCKCASTLE FISCAL COURT. Call Term 29th of December, 1920.

At a meeting of the Fiscal Court held in and for Rockcastle county, Ky. Present Hon. Cam Mullins Judge presiding W. D. Abney, W. D. Mullins, J. R. Evans, Freeman Ketrone and F. F. Robins, Justices. There being a quorum present the following business was transacted:

On motion properly seconded it is ordered by the Court that the Bank of Mt. Vernon, be and it is hereby allowed the sum of \$1130.97, as interest to Jan. 1st 1921 on outstanding warrants bearing interest held by said bank amounting to \$21,359.05. Interest payable out of the levy for 1920.

On motion properly seconded it is ordered by the Court that the Bank of Mt. Vernon be and it is hereby allowed the sum of \$889.34, as interest to Jan. 1st, 1921, on outstanding interest bearing warrants held by said bank amounting to \$18,104.25. Interest payable out of levy for 1920.

On motion properly seconded it is ordered by the Court that the Citizens Bank of Brodhead be allowed the sum of \$318.00, as interest to Jan. 1st, 1921, on outstanding interest bearing warrants held by said bank amounting to \$4584.04. Interest payable out of the levy for the year 1920.

On motion properly seconded it is ordered by the Court that the First State Bank of Livingston be allowed the sum of \$143.52, as interest to Jan. 1st, 1921, on outstanding interest bearing warrants held by said bank amounting to \$1267.52, payable out of the levy for the year 1920.

On motion properly seconded it is ordered by the Court that W. M. Poynter be and he is hereby allowed the sum of \$65.34, as interest to Jan. 1st 1921, on outstanding warrants held by him amounting to \$884.84. Interest payable out of the levy for 1920.

On motion properly seconded it is ordered by the Court that S. D. Lewis be and he is hereby allowed the sum of \$112.59, as interest to Jan. 1st 1921 on outstanding warrants held by him amounting to \$1954.05. Interest payable out of the levy for 1920.

On motion properly seconded it is ordered by the Court that Dr. M. Pennington be and he is hereby allowed the sum of \$15.65 interest to Jan. 1st 1921 on the outstanding warrants held by him amounting to \$1043.00 Interest payable out of the levy for 1920.

The warrants amounting to the sums named above and now held by the various parties named are issues made for the years 1916, 1917, 1918, 1919 and 1920 together with the item of interest for 1919 are now a debt against this county, an interest bearing debt, as follows:

Table with 2 columns: Year, Amount. For the year 1916: \$ 5,771.44; For the year 1917: 12,282.89; For the year 1918: 15,441.61; Interest on same for 1919: 1,843.42; Total indebtedness Jan. 1st, 1920: \$42,000.33

Under authority of the Fiscal Court by an order made in April 1920, there was borrowed the sum of \$6139.92, from the bond sinking fund, and was used in taking up interest bearing warrants held by the Peoples Bank, and the same to be repaid to said sinking fund out of the general fund for the year 1920. This left outstanding warrants on which interest was paid for the year 1920, \$38,863.41.

In addition to the foregoing there are outstanding warrants issued during the year 1920, to the amount of \$123,215.21. These warrants will be taken up when the Sheriff makes his settlement for that year.

Claims allowed for the year 1920, as shown by the Order Book are as follows:

Table with 2 columns: Item, Amount. General Fund: \$24,571.87; Road Fund: 9,575.92; Bridge Fund: 3,170.33; Total amount allowed 1920: \$37,317.92

Approximately the collections for 1920, will be as follows: General Funds (less Sheriff's Com.) \$16,098.27; Road Fund: 11,706.93; Bridge Fund: 4,682.53; Total tax collected 1920: \$32,487.13

This will leave a deficit for the year 1920 of the sum of \$4830.79. This leaves a total deficit, the amount in which the county is indebted, Jan. 1st 1921, the sum of \$41,894.20.

The above statement does not include the bond indebtedness of the County for roads.

S. F. Bowman, states that he is the County Court Clerk for Rockcastle County, Kentucky, and that the statements above made are taken from the Order Book of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court, and from other official records, and that they show the true financial condition of said county on the 1st day of January 1921.
