To The Republican Voters Of Rockcastle County

Both Men and Women:

After being urged by many of my friends and carefully considering the matter I hereby announce myself as a candidate for re-election to the office of Magistrate of fifth district, composed of Wildie, Conway, North and South Brodhead voting precincts to be held on August 6-1921. My record as Justice of Peace and also as a member of the fiscal court for nearly three and a half years is an open book and I invite your closest inspection. I have not pleased every body neither did the Lord the righteous please every man.
I have done my best as a Justice with that help and aid that I could get to make this country a more fitful place to live and raise our children. I have tried to make peace with neighbors instead of stirring up law suits to get count out.
I have tried to vote as a member of the Fiscal Court for the best interest of the tax payers. Remember that your tax is nothing more than virtuous gifts to keep up state and county affairs, there is 40 cents state tax to keep up state expenses. The Legislature passes an act making it law that the Fiscal Courts in each county should levy a tax not less than 50 cents on each one hundred dollars of taxable property and not less than 25 cents poll tax that goes to the school board, the Fiscal Court has nothing more to do with that, there is a 20 cents tax that goes to pay on the bond indebtedness that the people voted on themselves, 35 cents general fund, and 10 cents bridge fund to keep up the bridges of the county, 25 cents road and tax to keep the roads in repair, buy tools, lumber, nails, corrugated culverts, build and gravel roads, and buy right ways and claims for hauling to overseers, making a total tax of \$1.80, so you see the fiscal court handles only 70 cents of the tax money.
We realize the county does spend money while at the same time we hope that you will realize that the fiscal court has made more improvements within the last five years in the county than it has in many years before. The Fiscal Court is a court of record and speaks only through its record, the County Court Clerk makes a minute on the minute book of the orders made by the fiscal court and you can see the order book in the order book kept by him, if there is anything circulated around that you don't understand go to the order book in the Clerks office where the order is recorded in full and see if you can't have a better understanding about the matter.
So if I am nominated and re-elected I will try to make you a clean, sober and common sense officer as I have tried to do heretofore.

NO SALES TAX, MONDELL SAYS
Reduce the Burden, Don't Shift It
Republican House Leader Pleads.
REPEAL OBJECTIONABLE TAXES
Believed Hearings Before Senate Finance Committee on the Legislation Will Not Start for Another Week or Two.
Washington, April 19.—Congress will refuse to enact sales tax legislation, Representative Mondell of Wyoming, Republican leader of the house, declared. Mr. Mondell also reiterated his previous declaration that there should be a "lifting" instead of a "shifting" of tax burdens.
He indicated his belief that objectionable taxes could be repealed without providing any substitutes, notwithstanding President Harding's declaration in his address to congress that relief from tax burdens could be secured only by permanent cancellation of taxes and that the revenue from internal taxation must be kept up to a level of at least \$4,000,000,000.
Given Two Reasons.
"There is not going to be any sales tax," said Mr. Mondell, "for two reasons. First, a sales tax under the American form of government cannot be justified save as a war or emergency measure, and second, for the reason that the country needs a lifting of the tax burden."
Representative Mondell declared that the hearing going on at the present time is a part of the war effort and that it should be carried along until outstanding conditions are necessary in connection with the victory loan and then abandoned as a long term measure.
Time Means Taxes.
"The time is now, when we must repeal the objectionable taxes rather than be saddling our taxpayers with new methods of taxation," he said.
Present prospects are that the hearings before the senate finance committee on tax legislation will get started for another week or two, or until the emergency tariff bill is out of the way.
PAID UNION GRAFT ON DISHES
Manager of Hotel Furnishing Company Says Business Is Being Done.
Chicago, April 19.—The "dish" system which is said to pervade the building industry from recreation to service was alleged to go so far as to bring demands for money because of dishes used in north side hotels.
The hotel committee of the union, newly formed from the manager of a hotel furnishing company which was forced to succumb to his charges, says that the agent of the waters' union before the dishes and glassware used in the hotel was a thief on the job.
"Your dishes won't be acceptable to the waters," the manager was told.
"They're nonunion made, and union waters can't handle nonunion dishes." After the union was formed, the manager discovered that the waters would handle the dishes if the agent told them it would not mar the purity or uniformity to use that particular brand. The permission of the agent was "pure chance" according to the testimony, and the dishes are being used by day.
CROP LOSS IS \$25,000,000
Great Damage Caused to Fruit Trees in Three States by April Frost.
Chicago, April 19.—After one of the most unusual seasons ever being met in Chicago's history, in which lives were lost, a milk famine was experienced, and the city was the scene of a famine, the city awakened to a promise of better things. "Fid" with slowly rising temperature, "Fid" was the winter laid down by Forecaster Cox. But every one, nearly every, silver cloud has its dark lining. In his instance the black lining is a \$25,000,000 loss to fruit crops in Illinois, Michigan and Indiana. Peaches, plums and pears were frost-killed, but apples managed to weather the extreme fall of mercury for mid-April.
PLAN NEW HOMES FOR WOMEN
Building Valued at \$5,000,000 Each Will Be Erected at Tridley in Service of Women During War.
Washington, April 19.—Construction of a home for women in New York and another in Washington, as a tribute to the service of women to humanity during the world war, was tentatively decided upon by the House of American Penwomen at its sessions just concluded here. The buildings would cost about \$5,000,000 each.
Two Killed by Gas.
Burlington, Iowa, April 18.—Mr. and Mrs. Fred Shaw, pioneer residents of Burlington, were found dead in their home, death being due to gas.

The schedule of camps as announced by Mr. Buckler is as follows: July 4 to 8, Middlesboro and Simpson county; July 11 to 15, Ballard, Logan and Campbell county; July 18 to 22, Graves, Warren and Rockcastle and Madison county; July 25 to 29, Union, Barren and Knox, Clay and Bell county; August 1 to 5, Henderson, Hart and Whitley county; August 8 to 12, Boone county; August 15 to 19, Shelby, Taylor and Rowan county.

ROOSTER DESTRUCTION IS GOAL OF CAMPAIGN.

Many roosters on Kentucky farms are expected to be disposed of during the coming week as a result of a campaign being conducted by the Poultry Department of the College of Agriculture. A proclamation announcing May 23 to 28 as "Rooster Week" has been made and farmers asked to kill, confine or sell all male birds during that week and those following throughout the summer. Roosters running in the flock cause fertility eggs, which spoil rapidly during warm weather. Farmers are suffering heavy annual losses by reason of this, specialists in the department say.

Experiments have shown that fertile eggs are unfit for food after 24 hours in warm weather while infertile eggs may be placed in an incubator at 102 degrees and left for 14 days after which they are still suitable for food.

Representatives confederated since 1918 on the field show that the use of these two materials has resulted in the corn yield being increased an average of 128 bushels per acre, wheat 5.6 bushels, soy bean hay 1,558 pounds and clover hay 2,163 pounds an acre.
