CONVICT WHO ESCAPED FROM ROCKCASTLE ROAD CAMP KILLED IN BELL COUNTY

Henry Wilson, escaped from the road camp in this county on June 5, last, was shot and killed July 20th at his home in Bell county, Ky., he was pursued by Road Supt. Chas. Green and Prohibition Agents Kacaanough of Lancaster, and Watkins of Jackson, and deputy U. S. Marshal Chas. Schwarz in charge of a government squad, while attempting to recapture him.

Wilson, after escaping from the camp there had gone to his home and again, engaged in the making of moonshine whiskey. It is said that Wilson had been a moonshiner, originally, and his life was sent to the reformitory for killing a deputy sheriff who was attempting to arrest him on a charge of moonshining and had only a short time longer to serve when he escaped.

Funeral Services held for Russel Price.

Funeral services were held for Russel Price, one of Rockcastles soldiers of the World War, Monday morning at the Christian Church, in Mt. Vernon, conducted by Rev. John Macmillan and Rev. H. N. Burnette. The pall bearers were ex-service men and after services at the church the body was taken to the home of his mother and laid to rest in Greenwood Cemetery. A vast crowd assembled to do honor to our dead and as the strains of "Taps" so familiar to the young soldiers floated over their graves, the hills of the highland home of the young man who gave his life for humanity, every heart was moved and the thoughts of many winged their way overseas to where thousands of our boys are sleeping amid the crosses, row on row. A final salute was fired over the last resting place of our honored dead whose body had been returned to sleep under the spreading trees and whispering grasses of his own beloved home land, and "we left him alone in his grave."

Russel Price, son of S. B. Price, was only 18 years old when he enlisted in the great war, was wounded in action and died in a German prison camp.

His father, as patriotic as he, gave his consent to his son's enlistment and in his eyes of this consolation, that his son died that others might live; that his body was broken for us all. He could not have died more gloriously.
