To the Republican voters. My friends and to All Whom It May Concern: Some time ago, Mr. John S. Helton and myself caused to be published in the columns of the *Rockwell Democrat* a list of names of those who were supporting Mr. R. L. Langford for Sheriff and opposing Dave Clark for the same office. I have been asked by several people why I am against Clark as I had made the race with him four years ago. Now for the benefit of all those who want to know: Four years ago there were, to start with, three candidates for Sheriff, Dave Clark, Tip Langford and myself. I had announced myself as a candidate for high Sheriff, Clark and Langford had also announced. Clark's friends, together with some of mine asked us (Clark and I) to make the race together against Langford. I consented. A written contract was made stating that Clark should head the ticket and John S. Helton and myself should be the deputies. Each man of us was to pay a third of all cost of making the race and be equal partners in the proceeds of the office in case we were successful. It was further agreed that if we were defeated I should head the ticket four years from that time, and Clark and Helton were to be my deputies. About two weeks before the primary election Clark asked us to put in \$800.00 for campaign expenses, which was \$300.00 apiece for each of us. I went along expecting Mr. Clark to stand to his agreement. After he had announced himself as a candidate again, he came to us and tried to explain his reasons for violating his written agreement with me, saying that parties had told him I would not be in politics any more and that a part of the County officials had called him up and told him, the night of the general election, Nov. 1917, that they were for him for Sheriff the next time, and that it was his time. He said they congratulated him on the way John Helton precinct had gone and Clark said to me, "You can see I was working for myself."

When I put my hard earned money in a fund to help elect a man and he violates every confidence and a written contract, I cannot and will not support him. Your friend, Rose McNew.

The Sheriff, by virtue of his office is the chief peace officer of any county, a peace officer in the Sheriff of a county or his deputies. The duties of a sheriff or his deputies are the same. Now, what are the duties of a sheriff or his deputy? He must enforce the laws enacted for the protection of the lives of persons, property, health and morals of the people. He is the conservator of the peace within his county. It is his duty to prevent breaches of the peace which can be avoided. His duties have been greatly enlarged by the "Volstead-Prohibition Act" which was intended to carry out the 18th amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which amendment relates to the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors. This Act requires the Sheriff to cooperate with the Federal Prohibition Enforcement Officers and to apprehend and punish those who may violate this law. The Legislature of Kentucky added new duties to the office of Sheriff by enacting new and more stringent Local Option Laws. To further encourage the Sheriff to discharge his duties, under these new laws, the Fiscal Court of a county is required to pay him, for the arrest and conviction of a person violating the law by illegal distilling, a reward of \$50.00 for each person convicted. These additional duties have been imposed during the term of the present Sheriff, Mr. Tip Langford. There were no "moonshine stills" in this county when he went into office, and with proper vigilance and energy on his part, with the new laws at his command, if he had done his duty, there would be none now. The power, under the law, was given to the Sheriff to prevent and suppress violations of the "New Prohibition Laws" and under the law, if he has not, can the people of Rockcastle County expect anything better by electing his son to the same office? There would be no change whatever so far as the Sheriff's office is concerned. One of them is sheriff now and the other his deputy. The men would be the same. The present sheriff would continue to be, as he is now, the controlling influence of the sheriff's office. His will would be controlling.

Has Tip Langford, how Sheriff, done his duty as Sheriff? Until his son, Bob, announced himself a candidate, Tip Langford was not out of Mr. Vernon, our County Seat, as many as a half dozen times, during the term of his office. Liquor and Liquor men had been run out of the large cities and "Moonshine stills" were being put into operation in the country and some in this County. The Sheriff was appealed to, by the good people, not to allow this evil to take root in this County; and to these appeals, although coming from the most law-abiding, he turned a deaf ear, and he alone is responsible for the condition of this County. It is the Sheriff's place to give the church-going people protection and this he has not done. When I am elected Sheriff I will show the people what it means to have a sheriff in sympathy with law enforcement. At the time appeals were being made by the people not one bit of help or encouragement came from the Sheriff. He took the position and argued that liquor had always been made and sold, and that the laws against the making and selling had always been violated and the law could not be enforced. Men and Women, think of a sworn officer trying to uphold offenders of this kind. It was his duty, as a man when these laws were made and not to his liking, to have resigned his office and allowed the people to have selected another Sheriff, but, on the contrary, he held on and showed by his acts that he was friendly to such violations and as a result, if reports be true, we have "Moonshiners" in our county and the blame for it is on the Sheriff. It is a well known fact that he has never led a posse to destroy a "Moonshine Still". He has always been conspicuous by his absence when a raid was made far in the back-ground. His Chief Deputy, his son, Bob Langford, who is now making the race for Sheriff has been just as absent and just as conspicuous in his absence. These two men could have saved our County from the disgrace of the "moonshine" business but they failed, to do so. They have been weighed in the balance and found wanting. The reason they would not take the stand they should against this kind of crime is perfectly clear; they were both looking forward to this race and hoped to fool the people by playing both ends against the middle. I don't think the people of the County can be so easily fooled, for I have confidence in their intelligence.

I am calling upon the Republican voters of this County, both men and women, to give me and my deputies a chance and we will show you how the Sheriff's Office can be used for your protection and to your interest. We will make arrests and bring offenders into the Court House to be dealt with at the hands of the law. I am going to assume the responsibility of the office of Sheriff and will faithfully and impartially discharge the duties of that office.

## "Oppressive, and Consideration GROSSLY INADEQUATE"

Read the opinion of the Court of Appeals, and inform yourself how Mr. H. C. Kennedy, candidate for Circuit Judge, undertook to get for consideration grossly inadequate, the farm of an old, ignorant negro.

The Wayne Circuit Court decided the case against Kennedy, and he carried it to the Court of Appeals. The judgment of the lower court in the following language: "On February 27, 1911, Jordan McBeath, a colored man about seventy years of age, mortgaged his banking company the sum of \$39.46, and executed his note therefor with H. C. Kennedy as surety. In order to indemnify Kennedy, Jordan McBeath and wife conveyed to him a mortgage conveying a two-litre interest in the tract of land containing about seventy acres. As Jordan McBeath owned only a two-thirds interest in the tract of land, it is claimed that his interest was described as two-thirds of a two-thirds interest, to wit, one-third of the whole. Kennedy executed his personal note to the bank and took up the old note, signed by himself and McBeath. When the new note matured, Kennedy paid it. On June 26, 1912, Kennedy went to the home of Jordan McBeath and secured from him and his wife a deed conveying their two-thirds interest in the land to Kennedy and quit claiming any interest as to the remainder. At the same time Kennedy executed a collateral agreement by which he bound himself to convey to Jordan McBeath, or to any of his children, the tract of land, provided Jordan or any of his children repaid to him within six months from the date of the deed the sum of \$39.31 with six per cent interest. The collateral agreement further provided that in no event would the tract of land be sold to Kittle McBeath, the wife of Jordan, should have the right to keep the same as a home during her natural life, unless she should abandon the place, and Kennedy bound himself to make a deed in repayment to him of the sum above specified, to make a deed in accordance with that agreement. Jordan McBeath died, leaving a widow and two children. The land not being repaid prior to the expiration of the six months provided in the collateral agreement, Kennedy conveyed the land to his father-in-law, Mike Castillo, who knew of the circumstances under which Kennedy acquired title. "Castillo brought this action in replevin against Henry McBeath, one of Jordan's children, to recover the land in question, and set out in his petition the above proceedings, by which he obtained title. The defendant pleaded nullity in respect to the part of Jordan McBeath's indebtedness to Kennedy, and also that the deed was intended to defraud the plaintiff. The plaintiff denied the allegations of the consideration expressed in the deed. On final hearing, the chancellor adjudged the deed to be a mortgage, and denied plaintiff relief prayed for. Plaintiff appeals.

of the entire tract, the consideration is grossly inadequate. The collateral agreement provides for a redemption within six months upon the payment of the debt and interest. These old negroes evidently believed that Kennedy, by virtue of the mortgage, could take their land, and were induced to execute the deed because they believed it gave them a longer time within which to redeem the land. Thus there is present in this case every element which would ordinarily induce the court to adjudge a deed to be a mortgage. The deed was made to secure a debt. The grantors were left in possession of the land. A collateral agreement permitting the redemption of the land on payment of the consideration with interest. The consideration is grossly inadequate, and the transaction therefore oppressive if the instrument is held to be a deed.

## Who Got the Indictment Out Against Judge Jasper AND THE MAGISTRATES?

Note What Jasper's Own Statement Says About This

Recently there appeared in "The Commonwealth" a sworn to by Mr. Simpson Phelps, an attorney at the local bar, in which was set forth in graphic manner all that was done and by whom, in the investigation made by the grand jury at the May term, 1917, Pulaski Circuit Court, at which time the said grand jury found a number of indictments against Judge Jasper and others. This statement is corroborated by the statement of Judge Jasper himself, made June the 12th, 1917, and which was published by said Jasper, and scattered throughout Pulaski County at that time. Note what Jasper said in that statement. We copy it in part as follows:

"E. C. Tartar made a statement in the 'Semi-Weekly News' of February 9th, that if things went on as they had been going he Circuit Court would have to intervene, and protect the taxpayers of Pulaski County, and before the beginning of last term of the Grand Jury, Simpson Phelps and E. C. Tartar in the Clerk's office and Tartar was giving Phelps figures which he was taking down. I also saw Phelps in Tartar's office, and then it was announced that Phelps would expose graft on the part of myself and the Fiscal Court, so the first day of Circuit Court, and then after the grand jury had been empaneled, Phelps began his tirade of abuse on me, and charged that violations of the law had been committed by myself and the Fiscal Court, which was the echo of Tartar's rant, and the delivery of what he had drilled into Phelps. Tartar hiding behind Phelps, and that for the purpose of injuring me and benefiting himself. The grand jury returned several indictments against me and the Road Engineers and the Magistrates. I claim that politics was at the bottom of it all and my opponent, E. C. Tartar, responsible for it, and that for the purpose of injuring me and benefiting himself."

The complete statement issued by Judge Jasper, at that time and from which the above is taken, is in "The Commonwealth" office, and anyone desiring to examine it may do so.—Simseset Commonwealth.

"The deed which Kennedy took not only conveys, with covenant of general warranty, the two-thirds interest covered by the mortgage, but in addition thereto grants the two-thirds interest in the possession of the remaining two-thirds interest in said tract of land, and, as to this part, the grantors warrant the title against themselves, their heirs and assigns only. It is true Jordan McBeath had deeded to only two-thirds of the tract. There is no doubt, however, in going to show that the remaining interests had been given to him; or he had title bonds thereon. Certain it is that he had been living on the land for about 35 years. The whole land is worth at least \$200, and probably as much as \$400. At the time the deed was executed Kennedy had not paid the debt on the bank. He executed the new note on December 26th. The old note on which he was surety was never surrendered to Jordan McBeath. Even if he accepted Judge Kennedy's statement as true, that he never mentioned the word 'mortgage', he practically admits that he told the grantors that he wanted to give them six months more in which to redeem the land. If he had motive for taking the deed upon his own head, he has been merely to a deed for that to which he already had a mortgage, as a matter of fact, he acquired all the title that the grantors had to the land in controversy. The consideration expressed in the deed was the exact amount of indebtedness. Compared with the value
