## DEMOCRATS Not Allowed To Vote In Primary, August 6th, 1921

Sub-sec. 19, Par. 1550, Kentucky Statutes give the qualification of voters in the Primary election as follows:

Every person shall be qualified to vote in the Primary election he shall possess all the qualifications now prescribed by the Constitution and as are now required of voters in regular election. Every person of the United States of the age of 21 years, who has resided in the state one year and in the county six months and the precinct in which he offers to vote sixty days next preceding the election shall be a voter in said precinct and not elsewhere.

He shall, in addition to said qualifications, BE A MEMBER OF THE PARTY FOR WHOM NOMINEES HE INTENDS TO CAST HIS VOTE, AND SHALL HAVE AFFILIATED WITH SAID PARTY AND SUPPORTED ITS NOMINEES and no persons shall be deemed to have affiliated with the party in whose primary he seeks to cast his vote, if he voted against the nominee or nominees of such parties at the last general election. Said qualifications shall be determined as of the date of the Primary, without regard to the qualifications or disqualifications as they may exist at the succeeding regular election.

The qualifications above described shall apply to candidates and voters alike.

### PENALTY

Any voter making a false statement as to any of his qualifications shall be liable to indictment and conviction for false swearing. Any judge of an election knowingly receiving a vote of any elector who is not qualified, as provided in this Act, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined \$100, for each offense and any person, voting knowing that he is not qualified as provided in this Act, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined \$50, for each offense. In any case to be recovered upon information or indictment in any court having jurisdiction.

## McBeath Case

The conduct of H. C. Kennedy in connection with the Jordan McBeath land case is so thoroughgoing of harmony with correct and honest dealing that it at once brands him as absolutely unfit for public office of any sort, much less the high office of Circuit Judge. He, as the evidence in this record shows, went to the humble home of this old colored man, seven or eight miles from Muncieville, and procured the signature of himself and wife to a deed which conveyed their little home and farm of 71 acres to Kennedy, by pretending to them that the deed was a mortgage. The consideration that passed was \$50.00, and, to the surprise of all, he tried to take the farm from the old darkeys, and the case finally landed in the Court of Appeals, where the court, of last resort held that it would be oppressive and unjust to allow this transaction to stand. All the proof in the case showed that the farm was worth \$500.00 or \$550.00. Note that the attorneys of these colored folks had to say in their legal argument before the Court of Appeals in this case:

"We now ask you, Judge Kennedy, to explain to this court why you went there alone, took the acknowledgment yourself as Notary Public? When if you did not intend to put one over on these old darkeys, why did you not take some Cleve McGary with you, and let him explain the nature and effect of these papers? Does not his conduct in refusing to answer the letters of Henry McBeath and his evasive answer of December 17th, only nine days before the six months for redemption expires, and the fact that he hastened to convey the land of his father-in-law after December 29, 1912, all argue strongly the reason why he went there by himself and took this acknowledgment?"—Somerset Commonwealth.

"Judge Kennedy is a lawyer. We charge he knew that for him to take the acknowledgment of these old people to a deed to himself was an unusual thing and would create at least a suspicion that something was wrong. Then why if this transaction was to be fully understood by these old ignorant darkeys, did you not get someone to accompany you, and if not take the acknowledgment for you then be able to bear you witnesses that you had fairly and fully explained the transaction to them?"—Somerset Commonwealth.

## Hon. J. Austin Brown

Hon. J. Austin Brown, in his speech at Wilton's Chapel in Rockcastle said in part:

"I can't presume you have ever heard of much of the tergivers connected with the life and history of Judge Kennedy, and yet you should know all that it is possible for you to know about him before you cast your vote at the coming primary election."

"This man would do nearly anything in the world to make money. He jumps on Judge Bethurum because he is a poor man, and has not accumulated a fortune while Circuit Judge. The salary of the office merely meets

the living expenses of the Judge, and it is to the everlasting credit of him that he has not grown rich in office what would have indicated that he had other income than the salary of the office. But Kennedy would do most anything to make money. I know what I am talking about. He went about pretending to represent, and preach Christ and Him Crucified for several years, and because he thought there was more money in it, he quit the high and sacred calling of a Minister of the Gospel, and set opened up the most disreputable saloon that ever disgraced a town. He went to Muncieville, Ky., and ran it for several years in the terror of the good citizens of that town."

"This was made known six years ago during the race for Circuit Judge, and Kennedy did not attempt to deny it. He even

deny it. This is all most people would require to prove him unfit for the office of Circuit Judge. Mr. Brown is doing the district a real service by exposing the true nature of this man Kennedy. Republicans, come to Somerset on the 30th of July (next Saturday) and hear Brown expose the true life of H. C. Kennedy. He knows all and will tell it.

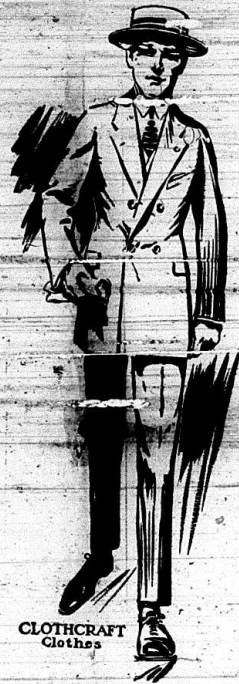
