Pently Of Eggs; Consumption Low

Enough eggs are being produced in Christian county, Kentucky, to supply home needs, Keith Venable, assistant county agent, told a "Better Farm Living" committee. Consumption per person, however, averages only about 10 dozens a year, whereas good health standards require an egg a day. There are seven hens per farm person in the county, and they lay an average of 28 dozen eggs a year. "Better Living" plans include better care of chickens, more fall and winter eggs, the preservation in waterlarks of spring and summer eggs for fall and winter eating, and the canning of more chicken.

Every week stores in Richmond, Danyille and Lexington send out large circulars to all boxholders in this county. It costs lots of money to do this and if it didn't pay dividends they would soon stop.

Half the business that goes out of town might just as well stay in Mt. Vernon, Brodhead and Livingston.

Wholesale opposition is the secret of any town's prosperity. We could write editorials that would fill a book about the many things that Mt. Vernon should do. Some of the things that we do have not only realized after the hardest kind of work.

Our association with most of the business men has been extremely pleasant and we have come to the conclusion that those who never help on community projects just don't understand the importance of co-operation. With friendly and willing help Mt. Vernon can climb the tallest mountain that stands in the way of civic betterment.
