#### Kentucky Banks Make 132,000 Loans

Sixteen per cent of the banks in Kentucky, made more than 132,000 loans totaling \$163,000,000 to business firms and individuals throughout the state during the second half of 1940, according to the semi-annual survey of bank lending activity made by the Research Council of the American Bankers Association.

The A. B. A. Loan survey was participated in by 65 Kentucky banks, or 16, per cent of the 409 banks in the state.

These 65 banks reported that they made between July 1 and December 31, 1940:

55,922 new loans totaling, \$76,257, 010.

010. 72,523 renewals of loans totaling, 72,523 renewals of loans totaling, 84,340,492.

416 new mortgage loans totaling, 3,382,159.

The survey showed that business firms in the state used only half of the "confirmed open lines of credit." maintained for their use on the books of banks. A total of 10 banks in the sarger centers of the case "reported that they carried on their books \$41,93,350 in "open lines of credit." offered to and kept available for regular-borrowers for use as needed by them. Of this amount \$19,947,035 or 46,5 per cent was used.

The average number of loans re-newed per bank was 1,116 and the average renewal was for \$1,163.

#### Insect Control

By Robi Spence It's time to dust or -pray lon insect control if we wish to get the best re-sults from our gardens. The im-portant thing about dusting or spruy-ing to control insects is doing a thorough job of it. The material used will kill the insects if properly used. The best way of course is to have a duster or spray. The following sug-gestions are offered.

#### BEAN BEETLE

BEAN BEETLE

Dust—use magnesium arsenate I pound; hydrated Ilime, 6 pounds or calcium arsenate. I pound, dusting sulfur, I pound hydrated lime, 4 pounds, or for the pounds. Throughly might he dust before using: II.

Spray—Use magnesium arsenate, I rounded tables/pountul water, I gallor. The duster or spray must have upturned nozzles to put the material where the insects feed. Bean beetles always feed on the underside of leaves.

Rotonone—Rotenone is a dust on the market which kills insects but is not poison to people. It can be purchased at most stores selling other dusts or insect poison. It should be at least 1½ Rotenone. Use the dust where insect. feed.

Rotonone is one of the best all purpose dust for insect control—No danger in using it on beans when pods are formed or on cabbage heads, Dusting or spraying should be done every 7 to 10 days for at least three times for best results.
