

Peach Men To See Hardy Varieties At Experiment Station

Peach growers have been invited to the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station at Lexington August 14 to see hardy varieties of peaches as they appear on the trees. Studies are being made at the Lexington experimental farm of varieties that are not only hardy in bud in the winter but also frost-resistant at blooming time. All the varieties being tested are especially selected for their high quality.

Among the varieties which have attracted considerable interest are South Haven and Hale Haven; the Canadian varieties, under such names as Victory, Valiant, Vidette and Veteran; the Polly, a white, freestone peach developed in Iowa, which is said to be extremely hardy, and the Sun Gold, also from Iowa. The Hardee, which originated in Ohio; the Niles Elberta, a hardy, yellow, freestone, which ripens a few days after Elberta, and other varieties from the New Jersey peach testing laboratory, are carrying a good crop this year, and the ripening dates can be studied as compared to such standard varieties as Bell of Georgia and Elberta.

The Station apple orchard is carrying a big crop of all varieties. This will be inspected on the same tour. The meeting will begin at 1:30 p. m. daylight saving time.

Farm Women Crowd Defense Meetings

The interest of farm women in national defense is revealed in the attendance at meetings held by county home demonstration agents in Kentucky in the last month or two.

Reports summarized at the State College of Agriculture and Home Economics show that 35,028 Kentucky women attended 2,134 meetings held to discuss general problems of national defense. Attendance at 1,387 meetings to discuss nutrition totaled 49,292 women. Consideration was given to home food production, including gardens, dairy and poultry production, canning and storage. One thousand and forty-two meetings were held to consider the production of more food for Britain.

In addition to the women attending these defense meetings, thousands of homemakers were reached with letters and informational material mailed by county home demonstration agents.

Crops Cut Early For Making Silage

Legumes and grasses are cut a little early when intended for the silo, says a new circular of the Kentucky College of Agriculture and Home Economics dealing with grass silage. Stages of maturity should be about as follows—when such alfalfa, one-fourth bloom; red clover and Korean lespedeza half to full bloom; soybeans, pods half filled; sweet clover, half to full bloom; bluegrass, before bloom; timothy, before bloom; grains, early milk stages. These crops should be allowed to wilt one to four hours, depending on weather condition.

An Explanation

I feel it my duty to inform the people why John Niceley is asking the voters to vote against T. J. Niceley for County Court Clerk:

So on the day the farm was put up for sale I bid it in, but was not able to furnish necessary bond and this sale was set aside and re-advertised, and the day it was to be re-sold I went to Mt. Vernon and called on T. J. Niceley for help in saving my home, so he said he would do his best to help me, and he got some men together in the Clerk's office, and among them was John Niceley, and they went into this sort of agreement: (They agreed on John Niceley to bid the farm in and the others were to sign his bond, and with the fair understanding that John Niceley would sign his bid over to me when the time came for the deed, if I could make arrangements to pay off the sale bond) so when the day came for the deed and to pay off the sale bond I got Mr. Tschanz to go to Mt. Vernon with me and loan me the necessary money, get my deed and give Mr. Tschanz a mortgage; but to my surprise John Niceley refused to sign his bid over to me unless I would pay him \$500.00, claiming he had bought the farm and was going to keep it unless I would pay him \$500.00. So T. J. Niceley told John Niceley that he must not treat an old helpless woman like that and he must stand up to his agreement and sign the bid over to her as we all agreed to do, but he still refused to do so, then T. J. Niceley told him we would take the case up with the Circuit Judge, and T. J. Niceley employed a Lawyer and we took the proof before the Circuit Judge and the Judge, after hearing the proof in the case, as stated above, promptly ordered John Niceley to sign his bid over to me and directed the Master Commissioner to make me a deed, which was done. I then mortgaged the farm to Mr. Tschanz and he furnished me the money to redeem my home.

TO THE REPUBLICANS OF ROCKCASTLE COUNTY:

During the whole of my campaign seeking the renomination for the office of County Judge, I have attempted to maintain the campaign upon the level in keeping with the high office to which I ask the voters to renominate me. For reasons known only to my opponents, one of them has seen fit to drag this campaign so deep into the mire as to cast reflections upon our Republican Party, which reflections are wholly unjustified and to which the Republican Party in this County in no manner deserves. It is now, and has always been, my idea that a political campaign should be made upon the records and facts relating to one's public service. This issue my opponents have avoided.

Under the sponsorship of the County there has been built 79 1-2 miles of County roads on which stone has been placed. Under the same sponsorship the County has more than 40 miles of graded roads built during my administration. Since I went in as County Judge, the County has paid slightly more than \$40,000.00 on indebtedness left my administration by the preceding administration of which J. H. Lambert was a part. The County at this time has in the Bank of Mt. Vernon more than \$22,900.00 in bonds and money. When J. H. Lambert went out of office as a member of the Fiscal Court, the same time I came in office, a County warrant, or in other words a check on the County, could not be cashed at its face value. If you wanted to get the money you had to give from 10c to 35c on the \$1.00. Not one warrant has been issued since I became Judge which was not worth 100 cents on the dollar. Do you want some more of the Lambert warrants? I think not. In addition to the above, when Mr. Lambert went out of office, the County was in debt for funding bonds and floating indebtedness amounting to more than \$116,000.00. This indebtedness has been refunded during my administration thereby saving \$3600.00 each year. Mr. D. P. Newell of the State Finance Corporation stated less than two weeks ago that our County was in better financial condition than any other County in the mountain section of Kentucky, and further stated that it was the only one without a floating indebtedness.

Below is a list of some of the things J. H. Lambert helped to do as a member of the Fiscal Court, all of which are of public record in the County Clerk's office.

For the year 1933 issued warrants in the sum of \$1830.16 for which there was no money to pay.

July 31, 1930 bought Ott Finnell \$227.50 worth of wire fence.

Lost \$23,775.52 in the Peoples Bank for the reason that the County Treasurer was not bonded at the time as required by law.

\$240.00 for auditing treasurer's account which was \$190.00 too much.
