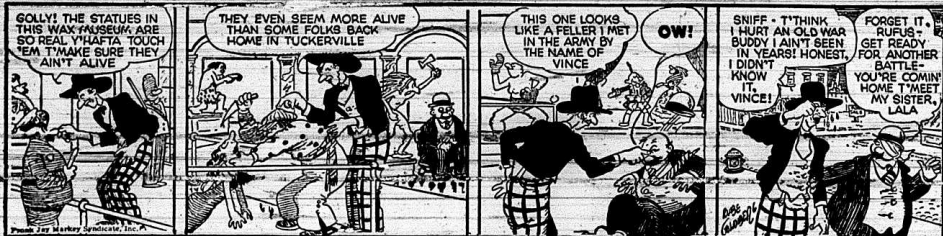

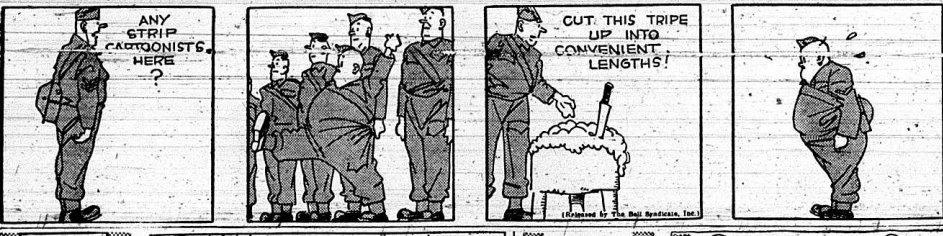

County Agent News

Seed Potatoes

It is important that all farmers secure their seed potatoes immediately. The price of seed potatoes is growing higher week by week. Now is the time to secure good seed potatoes. The county agent recommends sticking to certified treated seed even though the seed may cost a little more than the select seed. It has been proven over and over again that it is best to use certified treated seed to get the best results. Don't delay.

Hybrid Corn

From demonstrations in the county for the past two years, it has been established that the farmers have been able to get better results from the following Hybrids: Yellow Ky. 103 and U. S. 13 Whites, Ky. 69, Ky. 69B and Ky. 72. The county agent is in the office each Saturday all day at Mt. Vernon. Further information is desired as to Hybrids that can be secured by getting in touch with the county agent.

Tomato Plants

It would be a good idea to seed part of the tobacco bed to tomato plants. It will be easier and more satisfactory to raise the tomato plants on the farm where they are to be grown than to depend upon the hot house plants for two reasons: First, the hot house plants are too far from the place where they are to be planted. Second, they are not seasoned for the outdoor growth. Third, hot house plants may harbor insects to the place where they are to be planted. Fourth, the plants are not so many people in the towns and cities putting out tomatoes. Let's play safe and grow our own plants if possible. Bulletins on variety of tomatoes and proper cultivation may be had by getting in touch with the county agent at Mt. Vernon.

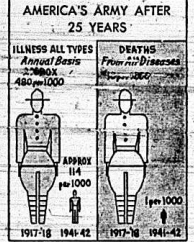
