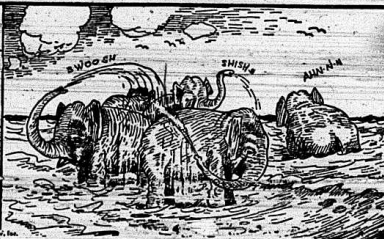

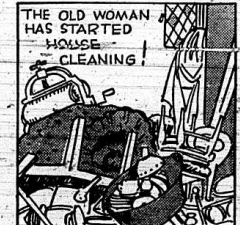

Java Defense Gains New Strength As Dutch Troops Get Reinforcements; Tanker Losses Indicate U-Boat Drive Against Eastern Petroleum Supplies

JAVA: Defense Impressive

Following the fall of Singapore, wailing women, many of them carrying babies, had arrived on rescue ships in Java, worried over the fate of their men who had been left behind. But all of them were highly impressed with the spirit and the heroism of the Java garrison.

There was every evidence that Java, whether it got sufficient reinforcements or not, would be able to stand up for the forces now on the island. The Dutch not only were massing all their air power, their ships and planes, but it was plain that they had some American reinforcements, largely believed in this country to be constituted of the very vital anti-aircraft guns and men to man them.

The fight that still had raged around Bill was a good curtain-raiser for what the Japs could expect when they moved in on Java. In fact, the 400-ton transport and the concentrated strength of everything the Dutch and the other United Nations had which had been sent to Java, were being used to meet the Japs. Churchill had said that the total Japanese land strength in the Far East was estimated at 29 divisions. The Japs were being met by the British, who had said that the number to come to Java alone, provided it was properly defended, was many times the Japs. The Japs did not react to them in Java.

Some military authorities believed that the Japs would be content themselves with bombing military installations, and with surrounding the island with their OCNs and other forces, and capable of taking part in East Indian defense, while concentrating most of the Jap forces on an invasion of Australia.

Recent Defeats Prepare U. S. for New Sacrifices

Armaments Production Continues to Increase As United Nations Equip World's Greatest Military Expeditions.

WNU Service, 1343 H Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. Now is the winter of our discontent and a still more disconcerting spring may not be far behind. Washington Valley Forge, Lincoln holds it must hunt down in their own lairs. The greatest military expeditions in the history of the world are now in the making. Soon the snow of the winter of our discontent will melt unnoticed—America will go forth without thought of wind or rain or snow or sun.

Meanwhile we have a long, hard lesson of restraint and sacrifice. In World War I the government issued insurance of more than 4,000,000 policies to members of the armed services with a total face value of nearly 100,000,000. The idea when these policies were issued, the government paying the extra premium amount of person standing up in the direction of machine guns, was that this was all that could be expected of a grateful recruit who was so bravely doing his duty. It was a very good idea.

It was a soft February day when we strolled up to the White House to see the President. The crowd passes to the policemen, filed into the Executive Wing and finally found ourselves in the President's office as the President was about to retire. President Rebores, **Rumor Mongers** There were no quips as we waited until the President was alone. And the President's easy smile was absent. Some of the crowd were asking for a rubber stamp of the President's signature. The President called them defeatists. He said that he would not sign any such thing.

President would comment on the visit of the British ambassador, there was an effort to lighten the gloom by talking of the President's ambassador on his way out and gotten no comment. The ambassador did not have a good lunch when he came out. And that remark expressed the mood of the crowd.

Why? Not because officials did not recognize what might be ahead of their reverse. But because they knew that they could do all that the United Nations could do, was to mark time while a tiny nation, Japan, with a population of 70,000,000, putting out \$3,000,000 worth of arms annually, was holding at bay a coalition of 200,000,000 people with a military output of \$100,000,000 worth of arms every 24 hours.

But we are marking time from a military standpoint only. Our people are being trained. Armed forces have supplies enough for the demand in Russia if we had the ships to carry them. Soon we will be turning the tables. And we are preparing an army. And that is the point. At first we thought that America had one task, to be the arsenal of the democracies. Simply the job of production. Then we saw that we must help get those supplies to their destination. And to protect the supply lines we needed to make bases. All this was before we actually were at war.

So far so good. But now, suddenly, we realize that the supply lines are threatened. Threatened at Rangoon, before this is written, within 100 miles of the Red sea and the Persian Gulf if Hitler breaks through the Middle East. Threatened with Japan's fanatical base studies and air-ship-glees which have now spread eastward from the Marshall Islands to Borneo and the Celebes and perhaps, before this is written, within bombing distance of Australia itself.

And so we learned that we might not be able to arm our allies but that we would have to arm ourselves. The attack on the Office of Civilian Defense was probably an excellent thing because it would have shaken the faith of a lot of people in the United States. They thought we were trying to dance our way out of our troubles. As a matter of fact, the entertainment features of the attack were a similar thing which had been tried out and found practical in England.

Great Value of Fighter Planes Now Being Understood by Using Defense of Britain as Example... Non-Defense Agency Heads Worrying...

WASHINGTON—Just as the effectiveness in military strategy distinguished from mere destruction and terrorism—the bomber was overestimated in the early stages of the war, so the fighter and torpedo plane, especially the latter, were underestimated.

The huge production program by President Roosevelt in his address to congress included all types of planes... There is a strong feeling, however, that a larger quota of the planes should be fighter and torpedo-planes and a smaller proportion of bombers than is now contemplated.

Curiously enough, the "fighter" plane is really more a defensive than an offensive weapon while the heavy bomber is primarily an offensive weapon.

Fighter planes are essential to protect bombers, as a fighter plane can make a short end of a heavy bomber or a torpedo plane if it catches one of these without protection from other fighters.

It was the concentration of British fighter planes against German bombers which was one of the chief reasons for the success of the British in crushing Britain early in the fall of 1940.

Strangely enough, the only battleship sunk by the British in the war so far has been a Japanese vessel, sunk by one of our army bombers.

The idea of bombing Germany into submission has been abandoned. This means that more emphasis from now on must be placed on other types of planes, against the use of expeditionary forces promised by the President.

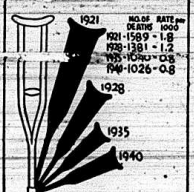

- 1. Isolation of the patient. 2. Dick tests on all contacts, including adults, to determine their susceptibility to the disease. 3. Cutting of material from the nose and throat of all contacts on blood in the nose to determine whether or not they are carriers.

When methods such as have been outlined were used in the care of scarlet fever patients in Evanston, Ill., the number of cases dropped from 188 in 1938 to 63 in 1939 and in a series of 117 consecutive cases there were no contacts.
