Unscrew wire from the plug. Snip off the frayed part of the wire. Re-insert wire in plug.

Wrong way: Wire not drawn around prongs.

Right way: Wire drawn around prongs. When cord is yanked or kicked, the pressure is put on the prongs.

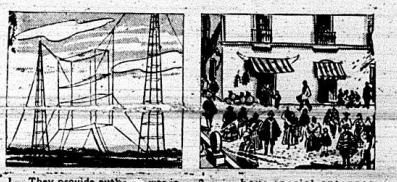

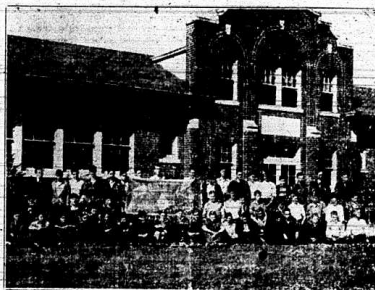
