Department of Agriculture Forecasts Tightened Civilian Rationing Orders; Losses Alter Nazi Military Strategy; Lend-Lease Reaches Ten Billion Yearly

FOOD OUTLOOK:

And Rationing

As the American housewife began to learn the details of the new point rationing system the department of agriculture took a look around at the 1943 food supply and forecast an extension of rationing which might even reduce dinner table leads to depression era levels.

Tip off on the situation came after a house appropriations subcommittee slipped its disapproval on the administration's food production subsidy program by rejecting to approve a request for \$100,000,000 for incentive payments to growers of potatoes, beans, sorghum, flax and certain vegetables.

FORECAST:

Finland's conditions for peace stipulated Finnish independence, a frontier compatible with Finnish honor and interests, and that the United States and Sweden should guarantee that independence and territorial integrity.

John L. Lewis Leading Anti-Wage Ceiling Fight

'Man-Who Came Back' Is Responsible for Battle Against Little Steel Formula of Increases.

WNL Service, Union Trust Building, Washington, D. C. There is a new candidate in Washington for the title of the "man who came back."

He has come back before so it is probably no great thrill for him but it is a terrific pain in the neck for a number of people who hoped this tall, dark ghost had been laid away for the duration, if not for longer.

Lewis may not be all the scary boss you think he is. He is a man who has fought labor's cause for many a year without affiliation with any group. He said to me:

"There are only two things that will keep from blowing the whole price control system into the high heavens. Either Murray and Green can turn their backs on Lewis, but aside their fears that he will win the struggle to get away from them by being the sole champion of wage raises and say boldly to their followers:

"We'll do what is best for you and everybody. Inflation will be worse in the end than the squeeze you are getting now."

Death and Tears (vv. 32-25). By the time Jesus came, Lazarus was dead and his family and friends could only weep as they said: "If thou hadst been here..."

But let us not fail to notice that as the friends of Jesus, we do not sorrow alone.

II. Faith and Hope (vv. 38-40). "If thou wouldest believe, thou shouldst see the glory of God," said Jesus to Martha.

Sorrow and unbelief would becloud our faith and thus rob us of our hope.

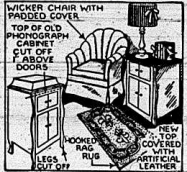
III. Christ and Resurrection (vv. 25-28). Majestic and authoritative are the words of Christ, "I am the resurrection and the life."

THREE "Don'ts" THAT WILL MAKE YOUR IRON LAST LONGER
DON'T use your iron if handle is rickety. The constant wiggling of a loose handle causes plug to rock back and forth on rigid terminals in iron socket. This in turn produces arcing or flashing of electric current inside the plug, which burns and pits the terminals, resulting in poor electrical contact and slow or irregular heating, or perhaps no heat at all. Always have your iron handle tightened at the first sign of looseness.
DON'T pull plug from iron socket while cord is connected to outlet. Each time you do so, the electricity arcs or flashes when connection is broken, gradually burning and pitting the terminals and eventually resulting in unsatisfactory operation of iron due to damaged electrical contacts. Always disconnect cord at wall outlet. If your iron is automatic, use thermostat to regulate heat instead of pulling plug.
DON'T drop your iron. Of course, you wouldn't do this intentionally, but use every precaution against it. Dropping your iron may break inside connections or damage the thermostat. More irons are put out of commission by being dropped than by any other single cause. Always set iron firmly on a stand or its heel rest... never on a sloping or slippery place.
OTHER TIPS on Iron Care: Avoid ironing over buttons, hooks, zippers and other hard articles that might scratch sole plate... Keep bottom of iron clean by wiping with damp cloth when cool or by using mild abrasive or fine steel wool if necessary... Never immerse iron in water... To remove starch, sprinkle a little salt on waxed paper and run warm iron over it... Never wrap cord around hot iron... Always let iron cool before putting it away.
