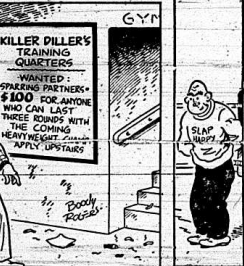

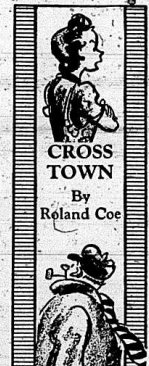
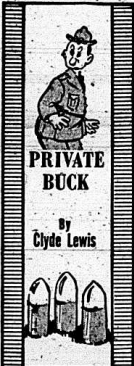

SNAPPY FACTS ABOUT RUBBER

Scientists have determined that rubber latex as it drips from the tree, is about 90 per cent water, 28 per cent chemically pure rubber, the balance consisting of proteins and sugars.

Crude latex is water-proof by the usual rubber being added in England and in the U.S.
