#### PAY-AS-YOU-GO PLAN: Would Withhold 20%

The new pay-as-you-go tax program was not the Ruml plan, nor the proposal advanced by the treasury department. Somewhere between both, the new congressional plan would withhold 20 per cent of taxable income from the 3,000,000 wage and salary earners beginning July 1.

Sponsored by Chairman Cooper at the house ways and means committee in the house ways and means committee's subcommittee on pay-as-you-go taxation, the plan would provide for weekly, semi-monthly or monthly deductions from income which would be accumulated and applied to actual taxes computed at the year's end.


