### Tidbits Of Kentucky Folklore

#### SPEAKING OF HAIRTS

Every community has its haunted houses and its legends too great a novice as respectability. In other times, we like to think people were more primitive than we are, and rather enjoyed the tales of things that seem literally true. A story exists with a definite spooky place to visit on the blue circuit north of New Lenox with the legend of Burmies of white and whippings of Quakers and scolding of whites, looms much later in the minds of people than some new frontier, or relatively new where everything that happened can be remembered by the older people now alive.

Fidelity was settled early in the eighteenth century, as soon as the white hunters from the Indians. It is probably the oldest of the area. A hunter had already explored the land as a squatter. When I came along, these quarters of a century after the earliest pioneers, nearly every legend in the area had its legend. When we drove to the county seat, Father on Big Brother posted on the wall where some one had been hunted, where a man was found dead, where a hundred had stood. These were the legends, unfortunately, were seen in broad daylight and with the self-importance of having gone to work to stating it. The really scary things were the ones near home. The ones we had to pass when we went to see our girls up the creek, that magic land that I have already chronicled. For instance, there was the Fidelity graveyard, the last resting place of so many of our neighbors. Mrs. Susan Wilkins, noted for her beautiful garden, was found walking around in that graveyard one night in her nightgown, trying to catch a horse to eat her sick mother. (The old lady had) been dead thirty years when her daughter dreamed of this spasm dream. Her father, returned from a mining trip, saw this strange apparition, and accustomed to night as he was, felt no fear. He was only temporarily demented person or some-

nabulist rather than a haint was walking among the graves. He tied his hands to the fence and caught the horse, leading her gently back to her home some three hundred yards away. She was so frightened when he and give her an ointment to calm her hysteria. That happening somewhat spoiled the natural beauty of that graveyard for my windowpane. I ever overcame this fear as long as I stayed at Fidelity.

And there was the haunted house, Joe Thurston had built it, back about 1870, or his wife to be. Just before he died, he got married, she ran away with another man. Joe had already finished the house, rather a magnificent one for that time and place, and had furnished it from top to toe. He refused to live in it or to let anyone rent it. Three shingle roofs rotted off and were replaced before 1910, when he decided to spend his declining days there. Not long after the unfortunate break in his life, he died. His wife, when the house was built, died whether from heart-break or from cruel treatment no one seems to know. Anyway, her spirit, so said the fearful passers-by, came back to arrange the furniture, the dust off the accumulated cobwebs. By daylight when daring ones looked through the dingy windowpanes there was not a sign of any earthly person's having moved among the ancient dust and cobwebs. When Old Man Joe died, he got a family to occupy the house and board him (he had never married). He lived some 3 years in his dream house before dying, old before his time, in the early sixties. Needless to say, only the very brave went by that place alone at night. When that was fine as any other house I just saw the place, it seemed near Fidelity.

See-Saw Offensive Rage on Red Front as Nazis Hurl New Divisions Into Drive; Battle Lines Drawn for Skip-Year Taxes; Aerial Action Paces Activity in Tunisia

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GIVE AND TAKE: In Russia

Khar'kov had fallen once more to the Nazis and still they pushed eastward. This was the first time from the Ukraine sector of the broad Russian front...

This and the fighting around the anchor point of Orel were more immediately important to the Russian front...

While Russian sources admitted that Khar'kov was important they also pointed out that a strong defense line had been established beyond the city and further claimed that Hitler's troops found nothing but dead Germans on the city's streets when they took it.

TUNISIA: Aerial action

Bad weather which has slowed ground activity in Tunisia has been no barrier to the growing Allied Air Force.

As a prelude to General Montgomery's expected push against Marshal Rommel, Allied planes have been pounding the Mareth line.

After a month of offensive operations against the American and British lines in central and north Tunisia, Rommel has pulled in his wings.

MORE TIRES: On April 1

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Washington Digest Wickard is Made target Of Farm Policy Critics

Attack on Agriculture Chief Seen as Continuation of Farm Bureau Assault on Farm Security Administration.

WNU Service, Union Trust Building, Washington, D. C. You will read in your newspaper that congress is out to 'get' Secretary of Agriculture Wickard.

In the first place, the folks who have been leaning back with their feet on the Washington cracker-barrel and watching administrators...

The fight in congress today on the surface is the farm bureau, the big farmer (who isn't a big in any case) versus Wickard and his staff.

One farm policy oligarch shifted his stogie, took down his feet and said to me: "This is just politics. The idea is that 1944 is coming up."

"But," I interjected, "what about the war effort, what about hiking up the farm prices and smashing down the political oligarchs..."

"What is this 'extension service' versus Farm Security fight? Well, it's a political game..."

In the old days, the extension service, the idea of the 'county agent' was financed by the states with the help of federal grants.

The organization pushed certain ideas for attacking purposes not very different from what the states developed later.

The farm program grew worse, a farm conference was called in Washington in 1932. This group put out a policy containing many features similar to those finally incorporated into the Agricultural Adjustment act.

Later, the Farmers Union came into the picture. It was started among the low income farmers in Texas. It was the left wing of agriculture and to the other farm groups, it was "pink."

Wickard was accused of turning right by one group but that didn't save him from the wrath of those who were on the left.

So the storm rages. Farm Security will probably be the beneficiary of anything with even faintly pink complexion is a red flag to congress.

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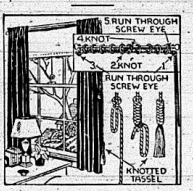
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Here's Easy Way to Make Draw Curtains



It is easy to make draw curtains with the fixtures you have, plus a pair of large screw-eyes, some wood or brass rings, and about five yards of cord.

The screw-eyes are placed just under the hooks for the curtains. Then run the cord through the screw-eye at the right; then through the rings, knotting it to the left; then through the rings and the screw-eye at the left; and back through the rings, knotting it to the right.

Now pass the cord through the rings and the right screw-eye and then make the tassels. Sew safety pins to back of curtains so they may be fastened to the rings.

### Farm Topics

#### Soil Management Aid To Increasing Yields

Farmers Co-operating in Test Get Good Results

Larger yields of grain and better stands of hay are becoming increasingly important these days when the demand for cereal, meat and dairy products for war and civilian needs has reached such record peaks.

That such crops respond to soil management is evident from tests carried on in a number of Wisconsin counties in which fertilizers containing phosphorus and potash were applied to small grains and seedlings of clover and alfalfa.

Farmers co-operating in the tests laid out demonstration plots on their land, leaving one area unfertilized. The results in the form of grain and hay crops that followed them in the rotation were checked and compared.

The harvests showed that not only was the output of the small grains boosted, but the production of hay that followed in the rotation was greatly increased. The tests showed, too, that the soil improving treatments had a valuable carry-over benefit.

Typical of the results obtained were tests on farms in Portage county.



### Crisp, Cool Salads Bid Spring Welcome

Use a lemon juice dressing for these orange slices, salad greens and cucumbers, then serving all for other household uses.

Outdoors it may be little tufts of green grass and tender shoots on the trees that let you know spring is on the wing, but indoors you can do the trick by bringing fresh vegetable plates and crisp salads to your table.

Salads and vegetable plates are truly the first hangings of spring when it comes to menu-making. Oh, yes, I know you've been serving salads and vegetables during winter, but with spring you have many more choices of fresh colors from which to choose.

Several attractive combinations of vegetables on a single platter—or you can slide over many meatless days. Then, too, they'll bring life-quickening vitamins and minerals to your diet to help get rid of whatever winter's coughs you may have accumulated in your system!

Speaking of salads brings up the problem of dressings, and with the scarcity of fats for salad oils. There are several alternatives, the first of which is lemon juice either alone or with a bit of sugar as dressing for fruit salads.

Many of you perhaps like simple vinegar dressing with just a touch of salt and pepper. This perks up flavors in vegetables, inexpensively, too.

Your french dressing of course can be made with mineral oil in the absence of other oils. Long used in reduction diets, mineral oil makes a nice dressing for light spring salads. It is not absorbed by the body, so if you're trying to gain weight, be sure to include other fats for body use.

If it's mayonnaise you like, here's a recipe which requires only a half cup of oil and a single egg yolk.

**Cooked Mayonnaise.**  
1 tablespoon butter  
2 tablespoons flour  
1/2 cup water  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
1/4 teaspoon mustard  
1/4 teaspoon paprika  
egg yolk  
1/2 cup salad oil  
1 tablespoon lemon juice

Melt butter, blend in flour. Add water slowly and cook until thickening is reached. Cook with salt, mustard, pepper, paprika. Beat in egg yolk, then add oil slowly, beating all the while. Last and lemon juice.

**Vegetable Plate.**  
Stuff tomato with cottage cheese and chives and place in center of platter. On either side place a mound of crisp carrot strips and asparagus, cooked and canned with tomatoes in cooled ring of lemon rind. Potato salad and crisp cole slaw complete the plate.

**Cole Slaw Dressing.**  
(For 2 1/2 cups cabbage)  
1/2 cup vinegar  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
1/2 tablespoons sugar

Avoid violent, furious boiling. This is modern, streamlined, protective cookery—to preserve valuable vitamins.

6 tablespoons cream

Combine ingredients in order given and mix thoroughly with cold slaw.

If hot slaw is your favorite dish, here is the ideal dressing for it:  
**Hot Slaw.**  
2 egg yolks, slightly beaten  
1/4 cup vinegar  
1/4 cup cold water  
1 tablespoon butter  
1 tablespoon sugar  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
3 cups shredded cabbage

Combine egg yolks, water and vinegar. Add butter, sugar and salt. Cook on low until thickened, stirring constantly. Add cabbage and reheat.

With the absence of pineapple often these days, we like something to use to give tartness to salads. In the following recipe you can use grapefruit to good advantage.

**Grapefruit and Carrot Salad.**  
(Serves 8)  
1 package lemon-flavored gelatin  
1 cup hot water  
1/4 cup grapefruit juice  
1/4 cup vinegar  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 1/2 cups grated carrots  
1/2 cup chopped grapefruit

Add hot water to gelatin and stir until dissolved. Add grapefruit juice and vinegar. Chill until slightly thickened. Add carrots, grapefruit and salt. Pour into mold which has been rinsed with cold water. Chill until firm. Serve on lettuce with mayonnaise or french dressing.

A heavy dinner calls for a green leafy salad with loads of crunchiness:  
**Lettuce-Spinach Salad.**  
(Serves 6 to 8)  
1 1/2 cups lettuce  
1/2 pound spinach  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
1 hard-boiled egg  
1 cup sour cream  
2 tablespoons vinegar

Chill and chop spinach and lettuce. Add salt, pepper, vinegar and chopped hard-boiled egg to 1/2 cup of the sour cream. Just before serving, add to spinach, lettuce and remaining sour cream.

**Apple-Cottage-Cheese Salad.**  
3 apples, coarsely diced  
1 cup diced celery  
1/2 cup diced cucumber  
1/4 cup sharp french dressing  
Lettuce  
1 pint cottage cheese  
1/2 cup chopped, salted peanuts  
Mayonnaise

Wash and dice unpeeled apples. Toss apples, diced celery, cucumber in french dressing, until well coated. On each salad plate place crisp lettuce, and then with a spoon shape 1/2 cup cottage cheese into a ring. Fill ring with apple mixture, and sprinkle with peanuts. Top with mayonnaise or a fluffy salad dressing.

**Carrot, Cabbage, Peanut Salad**  
(Serves 16)  
4 cups carrots, shredded  
3 cups cabbage, shredded  
3 cups diced, unpeeled apples  
2 cups peanuts  
Cooked salad dressing

Have all ingredients cold. Combine in order given and add just enough salad dressing to combine lightly together. Garnish with sprigs of parsley and chopped peanuts.

### IMPROVED UNIFORM INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

#### THE APPEARANCES AFTER THE RESURRECTION

LESSON TEXT—John 20:1-31.  
GOLDEN TEXT—I am alive for evermore.—Revelation 1:18

The most important day in all history was the first day of the week following the crucifixion of Christ. Then He appeared to His disciples as they risen Lord. All the hope of all mankind, for all eternity depended on His victory over death.

By eventful news had come to the disciples of His resurrection, and half in hope and half in uncertainty they had gathered to talk over these matters. Fearful of the Jews, they were behind closed doors. At once He was there—the Lord Himself. What a wonderful change came over them as He made Himself known to them. They went to L. I. From Fear to Gladness (vv. 19, 20).

Their eyes had been upon their enemies and they were afraid. Now they "were glad when they saw the Lord." We need to learn that lesson. If we look within we are ashamed and discouraged. If we look around us we are confused and fearful. If we look to Christ we are glad and strong.

Notice that the joy was not based only on an emotional impulse. They saw Christ in His resurrection body—the very One who had died. The evidence came before their eyes. Now they could understand the things He had said to them. The whole realm of spiritual truth was now in focus again, and they were glad. So are we when we really see Christ.

**IV. From Weakness to Strength**  
(vv. 21-23).  
The disciples who were called to be witnesses for Christ had lost their testimony when He died on the cross. Unbelief and discouragement had weakened them that they were in hiding instead of being out proclaiming the good news.

Now the risen and victorious One sent them forth with the Father's blessing. They were empowered by His Spirit and given great authority (v. 23). Note that it was given not to one man or to the leaders, but to all the disciples. It was "a declarative right" and it belonged to every true disciple. Those who have received the gift of the Holy Spirit in a personal declaration to men that their sincere repentance brings forgiveness" (Douglas). The opposite is also true.

**Thomas, Who Doubt's** (vv. 24-28).  
Thomas, who had doubts and who cultivated them by his stubborn attitude (v. 25), did himself and his brethren serious disservice by being absent from the meeting on the evening of the first Easter Day. When he did appear he not only doubts to contribute. Let those who make a custom of absenting themselves from the place and hour of service, beware lest they do likewise.

His doubts were honest ones—and God will accept such questions, honestly and intelligently. When the evidence was before him, the heart of Thomas leaped the chasm from doubt to faith in the cry of complete devotion (v. 28).

It is significant that down through the ages many doubters have been healed by Christ by the proof of the resurrection of Christ, which is by the testimony of historical scholars the best authenticated fact in all history. The risen Christ stands before men today and says, "Be not faithless but believing." May many respond with Thomas, "My Lord and my God."

**IV. From Death to Life** (vv. 29-31).  
Christ arose from the dead not just to show that He had power, but to do so, as Paul puts it, "for our justification" (Rom. 4:25). The reality and dependability of the entire plan of salvation hinged on the return of Christ from the dead. Had the grave held Him, His claims of deity and of ability to forgive sin would have been entirely discredited. Because He lives we shall live.

The experience of regeneration is therefore likened in Scripture to passing from death to life (John 5:24). Thomas saw the Lord, and believing, passed from doubt to faith. We cannot see Him now, but we have the blessed privilege of believing, and thus receiving life (vv. 29, 31).

This was the message which the now radiant and empowered disciples went out to preach. The book of Acts tells us how effectively they did it, and shows how much of their preaching centered on the fact of the resurrection.

The command and the commission was not to them alone, but also to all of us who believe in Jesus Christ. We are to be the "first-fruits" of men, overcome out of the fear of men, and send us out with renewed faith to make this life-giving message known to our fellow men.
