PETER COMFORTS PERSECUTED CHRISTIANS

LESSON TEXT—1 Peter 3:12-17; 4:12-16; GOLDEN TEXT—For it is better, if the will of God be so, that you suffer for well doing, than that you should be persecuted for doing evil. 1 Peter 3:17.

What shall we do? Where shall we turn? Is there no help for us? Such are the natural and understandable cries of those who bear the heavy burden of persecution. God's Word has the answer, for from the very beginning the followers of Christ have had to meet that problem.

I. Do Not Be Afraid—Christ Is Lord (3:12-17)
By doing good the Christian will escape much suffering (v. 13), but even then it comes, he is not to be afraid (v. 14). He is to sanctify himself in his heart, that he fully recognize the holiness of Christ and all that He is and can do for him. This is to be done in his heart, not to mean the exercise of full faith in Christ the Lord as the indwelling Presence. Who then can be afraid? Note that this is not just a selective spiritual exercise for his own enjoyment—it will show in his "good works" and in his "good character" put his persecutors "to shame" (v. 16). How effectively that has worked only recently in Germany, Norway and elsewhere.

II. Do Not Be Surprised—The Enemy Will Attack (4:12, 13)
Surprise attack is effective. Remember Pearl Harbor? Satan is an expert in strategy, and is eager to keep Christians in an easy and comfortable mood, so that he may strike a vicious blow which is not expected. We best prepare to meet him when we recognize that persecution and suffering will come.

We are to be a joyful people, it is not some "strange thing" which has happened; and who suffer as Christians are "partakers of Christ's sufferings" for His glory (v. 13). Christ's sake may be ever rejoicing. Can you not see that "the spirit of glory and of the Spirit of God" are sitting (v. 14) even now on our vest in prisons and concentration camps? What a glorious picture of His grace!

III. Do Not Be Ashamed—You Suffer for Christ (4:14-16)
Sadness and depression rest on the lips of those who suffer for Christ's sake may be ever rejoicing. Can you not see that "the spirit of glory and of the Spirit of God" are sitting (v. 14) even now on our vest in prisons and concentration camps? What a glorious picture of His grace!

IV. Do Not Worry—He Careth for You (5:6, 7)
Worry! Worry! How it does crowd itself into our thinking. Yes, we know we are Christians, that we are unjustly accused or persecuted, that we are suffering for Christ's sake. That's all true, but how is it all coming out? Will they harm my children? If I do survive will I be able to start life anew? Will I be able to get out-ent; and, as it comes the corroding touch of worry.

What shall we do? The answer is plain. Cast all your anxiety on Him—"He careth for you" (v. 7). That takes an act of faith just as it does to become a Christian in the first place, but it works.

The cure for all anxiety is right there—but it can only be reached by the path of humility. "Remember yourselves" (v. 6). There is a gateway to comfort, and to true exaltation in God's own good time (v. 7). (See 4:10-12)

V. Do Not Waver—God Is Your Strength (5:8-10)
Steady, perfected, established in Christ, sure of His eternal destiny and I should not let the eyes of glory to come—such is the man who is ready and able to meet the devil when, like a roaring lion, he seeks to disturb and devour God's people. The believer should be ready and equipped.

That does not mean that the Christian with his hands folded waiting in a fatalistic way for the "in the end" to happen. Never! He is in the alert" with his spiritual ears attuned to hear the approach of the enemy's "harmers." He is "sober and watchful" against the "roaring lion" (v. 8).

Satan is unusually busy in our day. Alert Christian people see his onslaughts on their children, who are possibly more severe now than for many years. He is seeking to break their down physically, mentally and spiritually—to make them fearful, to make them timid about work for Christ, to limit their usefulness, and to so exhaust them their victorious assault. He is busy—let us be alert against him.

WHY TEETH DECAY

At the beginning of the last war the regulations regarding teeth were so strict that I had a sergeant examine the mouths of recruits before they were inspected by the medical officer. The simplest requirement was that the man must have one upper molar (grinding) tooth immediately above one lower grinding tooth, on each side of his mouth, yet about 7 in every 20 could not meet this requirement.

In this war medical officers are finding just as many men with infected missing teeth as recruits before, but with an adequate dental corps men are taken into the army and the defects corrected.

What causes decay of teeth? Has the cause ever been discovered? In the Journal of the American Dental Association, Robert G. Kessel, D.D.S., M.S., Chicago, Illinois, and 271 investigators report that dental decay begins with the destruction of the enamel by acids. This is not a new idea as a writer in A. I. D. 1930 stated that decay of teeth was due to decomposed food and acid moisture.

There appear to be two factors in tooth decay, the exciting or immediate cause, and the predisposing or underlying cause.

The immediate or exciting factors are organisms on the tooth surface capable of destroying tooth substances, and material (food particles clinging to the teeth) which are converted into substances harmful to the tooth. Without these organisms and tooth material there likely would be no decay.

Yet, Dr. Kessel points out "that all living individuals have organisms on the tooth surfaces and most of them, at times, have upon their teeth materials that could form acids." Why then do not all teeth decay?

Teeth do not decay in some individuals despite the presence of organisms and acid forming material on the teeth, because these individuals do not have the predisposing or underlying conditions that cause the organisms and acid-forming materials to start the process of decay.

Six Pointers on Neurosis Prevention

While the curing of mental ailments has reached the highest point in history, nevertheless it is remembered that many mental cases are not cured by our present methods including the shock treatment.

Why should there not be some method of preventing the development of mental ailments by preventing those with a tendency toward mental ailments becoming mental patients?

Today we see smallpox, diphtheria, scarlet fever, pernicious anemia, typhoid fever, diabetes prevented or controlled. Why cannot mental ailments be prevented, particularly in the young, just as diphtheria and scarlet fever are prevented?

In an article in Boston Journal of the Medical Clinics of North America, Dr. Merrill Moore, in pointing out what psychiatry can do to prevent neurosis—patients whose odd behavior symptoms are not due to organic causes and change in brain structure—says:

1. Parents should not overexert their children.
2. Children should be taught to relax and to concentrate (put their minds intently on a subject) when necessary.
3. Parents should remember that children are not their playthings to be poked and teased about.
4. Children are assets; raising them is a serious business.
5. Parents should give their children a sense of security in the child's own mind.
6. All along the production line the parent should guide the child and try not to let him go off the track of normal development. For example, it is important for a boy (or girl) to be able to avoid his group and be able to do what his friends can do—in school, playground, or elsewhere—Even if a little extra coaching is necessary. This prevents an inferiority complex in the child who does not hold his own in his own world, he may sink off on the sidelines and become critical or dejected. He may then become a neurotic or become a neurotic or an alcoholic.

HEALTH BRIEFS

Get Your Protein!

There's no reason why you should not be getting your necessary protein into your daily menus, or why using meat alternates, i.e.—foods you use alternately with meats—should become a dull or difficult problem.

Here's your opportunity to show your family what a really smart homemaker you are—for you can keep up their admiration for you by serving an endless variety of good eggs and chicken dishes, and fish in all its variety. These foods are protein-rich and with a little ingenuity you can make a star performer out of many of them.

Chicken comes beautifully to the rescue for it's a good, complete protein and the supply is good, especially at the present time. Use it wisely, however, a little bit of it combined with other foods can make a meal or more out of one chicken. Here's an example:

- *Chicken Chowder (Serves 6)**
 1 cup cooked, diced chicken
 2 cubes salt pork, finely diced
 4 tablespoons chicken fat
 2 to 4 tablespoons onion, finely chopped
 2½ cups potatoes, diced
 1 cup celery, diced
 2 cups chicken stock
 1 No. 2 can kernal corn
 1 tall can evaporated milk
 ¼ teaspoon paprika
 ¼ teaspoon ginger
 ¼ teaspoon salt
 ¼ teaspoon pepper
 2 tablespoons chopped parsley

1. Cook salt pork in sauce pan over low heat until lightly-browned. Chicken and onion, and cook onion until not browned.
 2. Add potatoes, celery and chicken stock. Simmer until vegetables are tender. Add corn, milk, and seasonings. Heat thoroughly, stirring occasionally. Season to taste with additional salt and pepper, if desired. Serve very hot with crackers, hard rolls or toast.

Tidbits of Kentucky Folklore

LOCAL IGNORANCE
 Since the war started in 1941 and so many titles appear daily, I have been reminded of other times when titles were dear to the heart. After actually earned titles were all but unknown. I know now what a distinction it was that my father was called "Doctor" by right. Some of the school kids thought Doctor was his name and sometimes prefixed Mr. just as they would talk about Mr. George Lawson. One of our neighbors, whose funeral I have mentioned elsewhere in this series, had been a lieutenant in the Spanish war, but by the time he was very young—old age, he was "Captain" to everybody. To most of us he would have seemed equally great if he had been called "Colonel." If anybody had so much as served one term as a magistrate, he became "Squire" for life. If he did not actually become "judge," sometimes a mere candidate acquired a title, especially if he had a shingle at the county seat announcing himself as an attorney. A teacher or any considerable experience became automatically "Professor," to indicate dignity. Many of the names now known to acquire dignity were not yet discovered, but we used the ones we had to the best advantage.

The rather funny thing about this is that we were not the only ones who stretched this giving of titles. The town I live in is probably the worst on giving titles to people who do not have them. A college town for more than a generation, it goes to think that everyone who comes to it has at his disposal the world's knowledge. It is thought to be a mark of great respect to call a man "doctor," though he may not have a degree of any kind. A small private school always gave the title to its presidents, though only one has a degree warranting such. There are leftover documents and pictures of Dr. So-and-So, "A.B." about former presidents. When one of our teachers is introduced, great care is taken to call him "doctor," as if that would confer a multitude of sins. This funny practice has many roots. The letters after my name in this heading are not there because I wanted them placed on the cut. There has also been a custom in my home town of calling all teachers "doctors." It is true that several of the pastors of the larger churches have honorary D.D. degrees, but not a third of those who are commonly honored by the titles have any right to it. Similarly all druggists are "doctors," though they may have never seen inside a college of pharmacy. It sounds big.

Since it has been a custom to honor Tom, Dick, and Harry, not to mention their wives and children with a Kentucky cologne, the title "Colonel" is everywhere in the state. If all the people who bear that title were actual military officers, we could command all the legions in the county and have a few to export. Auctioneers or just anything, but especially of real estate and tobacco, has this same august title. When one walks down the streets of my town without calling some one by a title, he shows rank disregard of dignity or a forgetfulness of distinguished people who share with him the glories of his place of residence.

The chief difference between "Colonel" and the rest of the world is to let me see, just what is it?

Table Appliances

Go back to boiled coffee and burned toast? Not if you keep your automatic toaster and electric percolator in tip-top shape! Just give them the proper care—use them but don't abuse them—and they'll last you for years!

POINTERS ON TOASTER CARE

- Keep toaster clean by wiping outside with damp cloth, using a mild abrasive powder if necessary. Heating element cleans itself when current is on.
- Use small soft brush for removing crumbs from base if toaster has no crumbs tray. Never use knife or fork in contact with heating elements as they are easily damaged.
- Never immerse toaster in water. Keep dripping rags away from heating elements and electrical connections.
- Do not put buttered bread or bread with cheese spread in toaster. Spread these on hot toast after it is made.
- Be careful not to drop your toaster. You may damage thermostat or heating elements.

TIPS ON PERCOLATOR CARE

- A clean percolator is the secret of good coffee. Wash inside with warm soapy water, rinse and dry. Wash out

- side with damp cloth and mild scouring powder. Never immerse percolator in water.
- About once a week substitute a tablespoon of baking soda for coffee and percolate as though making coffee. This will get rid of rancid coffee oils that cling to metal.
- Always make sure you have put in water before connecting percolator. Otherwise you will blow out tube in base of percolator.
- If you have a glass coffee maker with cloth filter, rinse filter cloth thoroughly after each using. Between usings keep cloth in glass of cold water.
- Guard against dropping glass coffee maker bowls. Do not let cold water come in contact with hot bowls.
