NOTICE OF SALE OF PUBLIC UTILITY FRANCHISE

In pursuance of a resolution adopted by the Fiscal Court of Rockcastle County at a meeting of said Court held on July 1, 1947, the undersigned Judge of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court will, until 1:00 P.M. on said Monday, the 20th day of July, 1947, in the County Court room of the Court House in the city of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, receive sealed bids for the purchase of the franchise mentioned in the resolution following, and at 1:00 o'clock P.M. on said date will publicly open said bids, and will award said franchise to the highest and best bidder. The purchaser of said franchise will be required, upon said award being made, to pay to the Treasurer of Rockcastle County the amount of his bid. Said resolution heretofore adopted by the Fiscal Court of Rockcastle County is as follows:

CASLE COUNTY, KENTUCKY, AND STATE PRIMARY ROADS THEREIN. IN SO FAR AS THE COUNTY HAS THE RIGHT TO AUTHORIZE THE USE OF SAME NECESSARY FOR THE PURPOSE OF ERECTING, CONSTRUCTING, MAINTAINING, REPLACING AND REMOVING POLES, WIRES, BRACKETS, SUPPORTS, GUYS, AND ALL NECESSARY APPENDAGES THEREON, AND THEREON, FOR THE PURPOSE OF CONDUCTING ELECTRIC CURRENT LINE OVER AND ALONG ANY AND ALL LAND, ROADS AND HIGHWAYS IN ROCKCASTLE COUNTY, NO WORK OPENED OR TO BE OPENED FOR A PERIOD OF TWENTY YEARS FROM THE DATE OF THE ACCEPTANCE OF THE BID OF THE SUCCESSFUL BIDDER.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE Fiscal Court of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, as follows, to-wit: That the County of Rockcastle, through its Fiscal Court, here by offers to grant and sell, at public bidding, a franchise over the public roads of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, hereinafter named and designated, to the highest and best bidder, to erect poles and string wires thereon, and to conduct, distribute and carry on said wires electric current for light, heat and power, and to erect on such roads such appliances of any and all kinds as

may be necessary for the purpose of conducting and distributing electricity on and over same, and to make such contracts for the use of electricity as may be agreed upon, subject to such rules and regulations as are now in effect and approved by the Public Service Commission of Kentucky as to the right of said company to operate and carry on business within the State of Kentucky on the following terms and conditions, to-wit: 1. The purchaser thereof, and his or its successors and assigns shall be granted a franchise to erect poles and to string wires thereon, and to conduct, distribute and carry on electric current for light, heat and power, and said purchaser shall have the right to erect such appliances as may be necessary for such purposes on said roads, to enter upon and use all of the public roads and highways of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, necessary for the purpose of erecting, constructing, operating, maintaining, repairing and removing poles, wires, brackets, guys, and all necessary appendages thereto, and therein suitable and proper to construct and maintain high voltage electric current over and along the roads and highways of Rockcastle County, Kentucky; and to make such contracts for the use of electricity as may be agreed upon, subject to the rules and regulations in effect and on file in the office of the Public Service Commission of Kentucky. 2. The roads over which this franchise shall be granted shall be all roads and turnpikes in the County of Rockcastle, State of Kentucky, including primary state road systems and highways, in so far as the County of Rockcastle has the right to grant the privilege of using the same. 3. Nothing herein shall require the purchaser to erect its poles or string its wires on all of the pikes or public roads in said county, nor to erect its

poles or string its wires on any portion of said roads, or any of them, it being understood that the purchaser may exercise such portion of the franchise herein granted as it desires to exercise at any time, and its failure to make use of any portion of the franchise or public roads in said county shall not work as a forfeiture of any portion of the franchise or any of the pikes or public roads herein mentioned. None of the poles, wires, brackets or cross arms shall be so placed, replaced or maintained as to interfere with travel on or the use of said roads for highway purposes. 4. Various Sandwiches Make Good Picnic Suppers

It's estimated that sandwich eaten at the rate of 30 million daily here in the United States, and it's no wonder because they are the simplest, most nourishing foods to eat.

Simplest of all sandwiches is the slice of meat between two pieces of bread; but it tastes even better if you add some toothsome spread or accompaniment to it, such as:

- 1. Cover with a thin slice of cranberry jelly, especially ham or roast pork.
- 2. Cover with thinly sliced sweet or sour pickle or mustard.
- 3. Spread with horseradish mixed with mayonnaise and lettuce on whole wheat bread.

When you have leftover meat, chop it or put it through the meat grinder and serve in any of these ways:

- 1. Mix with mustard and season with chopped pimiento or green pepper.
- 2. Mix with equal parts of finely shredded cabbage and serve with chopped pickle or onion.
- 3. Season with chow-chow or pickle relish and season with enough boiled dressing of mayonnaise to mix through.

Barbecued Hamburgers (Makes 6)

- 1/4 cup milk
- 1/4 cup soft bread crumbs
- 1/2 pound ground beef
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce

1 tablespoon elder vinegar

Combine bread crumbs and milk and let stand 15 minutes. Add ground beef, salt and pepper. Form meat into patties, then brown on both sides in two tablespoons of fat.

Combine seasonings and vinegar with catsup and pour over meat. Cover and simmer slowly about 10 minutes, or until sauce is very thick. Serve hot between heated or toasted bun halves.

The above sauce also may be used for sliced, cooked beef roast or for frankfurters as barbecues.

LUXURY OR NECESSITY?

Representatives of nations where there is no freedom of the press and where the people enjoy no privileges of personal liberty have often remarked that the American system of individual freedom is a luxury only a rich nation may afford. This is a flimsy excuse for the brutalities of dictatorship. But would we be so different from these other nations if we were to bog down back into the dark ages. If we were hard pressed by economic chaos? Not if we are to listen to some of our most notable self-styled liberals who claim with fearful urgency that should another depression descend upon America, she too would abandon the "luxury" of freedom. Some of them would even jump the gun by setting up a planned state now-fixing prices, rigging supply and demand to artificial standards, controlling production, and in effect, establishing government as a spurious God. When this country was founded, the going was tough. Freedom was the first goal of life. It was not achieved easily. The privilege of going to the church of one's choice was not considered a luxury, nor was ownership of property and the right of assembly and free speech. These things were vital as air. To infer, no matter how flimsy the excuse, that they become luxuries at a time when millions of people over here and all over the world are looking to the United States to keep a light on the torch of civilization is an inexcusable luxury.

Very likely there will be depressions in this country in the future, as in the past. They can either be short pauses in the march forward of a great nation—or any one of them can be the jumping-off point for state socialism and the subjugation of the people. It will depend upon our point of view—whether our freedom is a luxury or a necessity.
