

NOTICE OF SALE OF PUBLIC UTILITY FRANCHISE

In pursuance of a resolution adopted by the Fiscal Court of Rockcastle County at a meeting of said Court held on July 1, 1947, the undersigned Judge of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court will, until 1:00 P.M. o'clock on Monday, the 28th day of July, 1947, in the County Court room of the Court House in the city of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, receive sealed bids for the purchase of the franchise mentioned in the resolution following...

CASHEL COUNTY, KENTUCKY, AND ALL STATES PRIMARY ROADS THEREIN, IN SO FAR AS THE COUNTY HAS THE RIGHT TO AUTHORIZE THE USE OF SAME NECESSARY FOR THE PURPOSE OF ERECTING, CONSTRUCTING, MAINTAINING, REPLACING AND REMOVING POLES, WIRES, BRACKETS, SUPPORTS, GUYS, AND ALL NECESSARY APPENDAGES THEREON, FOR THE PURPOSE OF CONDUCTING OVER AND ALONG ANY AND ALL LAND, ROADS AND HIGHWAYS IN ROCKCASTLE COUNTY, KY. OPENED OR TO BE OPENED FOR A PERIOD OF TWENTY YEARS FROM THE DATE OF THE ACCEPTANCE OF THE BID OF THE SUCCESSFUL BIDDER.

BE IT RESOLVED BY the Fiscal Court of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, as follows: That the County of Rockcastle, through its Fiscal Court, hereby offers to grant and sell, at public bidding, a franchise over the public roads of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, hereinafter named and designated to the highest and best bidder, to erect poles and string wires thereon, and to conduct, distribute and carry on said wires electric current for light, heat and power, and to erect on such roads such appliances of any and all kinds as may be necessary for the purpose of conducting and distributing electricity on and over same, and to make such contracts for the use of electricity as may be agreed upon, subject to such rules and regulations as are now in effect and approved by the Public Service Commission of Kentucky as to the right of said company to operate and carry on business within the State of Kentucky, on the following terms and conditions, to-wit:

1. The purchaser thereof and his or its successors and assigns shall be granted a franchise to erect poles and to string wires thereon, and to conduct, distribute and carry on said electric current for light, heat and power, and said purchaser shall have the right to erect any person owning property or residing along or near the roads in said county, provided the person desiring to use any such franchise shall agree to pay to the purchaser of said franchise, or its successors or assigns, the rates and charges thereon, as provided and allowed by and under the rules and regulations submitted to the Public Service Commission of Kentucky, and the purchaser of same shall have the right and privilege of establishing all reasonable rules, and regulations, and of discontinuing such service, provided same conform to the rules and regulations provided in and by the Public Service Commission of Kentucky.

2. The roads over which this franchise shall be granted shall be all roads and turnpikes in the County of Rockcastle, State of Kentucky, including primary state road systems and highways, in so far as the County of Rockcastle has the right to grant the privilege of using the same.

3. Nothing herein shall require the purchaser to erect its poles or string its wires on all of the pikes or public roads in said county, nor to erect its poles or string its wires for any particular class of pikes or roads, or any of them, it being understood that the purchaser may exercise such portion of the franchise herein granted as it desires to exercise at any time, and its failure to make use of any portion of the franchise or any of the pikes or public roads in said county shall not work as a forfeiture of any portion of the franchise on any of the pikes or public roads herein mentioned. None of the poles, wires, brackets or cross arms shall be so placed, replaced or maintained as to interfere with travel on or the use of said roads for highway purposes.
